FISHING TRIPS

No Fishing trips were reported to me. So I will share a couple of recent trips to the Meramec for smallmouth. The only smallmouth I found, were small guys and they were difficult to get to take my flies. The river was very clear and low, the sun was shining bright and the river was 37 degrees so as you can guess the fishing was not good. Why did I even go? The temperatures were in the 40s and a friend of mine asked me to go. It was a good thing I brought along some of my trout dry fly rod. (I had

experienced this the week before and didn't have what I needed) The rises started about 10 and lasted for 3 or 4 hours. It wasn't a huge hatch and not a lot of rises, but enough to keep fish on the end of my line for half a day.

Carrying some extra gear on trips, just in case may save a day for you. An extra rod and reel, and a few fly boxes doesn't take up that much room

Yesterday, the 31st, I went back over to the Meramec looking for smallmouth and once again the only ones I caught were small. The river was crystal clear and the spring branch was just a little off color. The sun shining and clear water wasn't a good combination for a winter smallmouth bite. I just took my 10ft 6wt and smallmouth flies and my winter float/jig rigs. I didn't want to catch trout, had no interest in catching trout on dry flies or anything else. I was also trying out some new inner layer clothes for winter fishing conditions. I get to do that for manufacturers every now and then. In order to give them a good test, I needed to be in cold water and for a few hours. The river temp was 34.1, with shelf ice on along the banks where there was very slow moving water. just right for freezing your butt off. I can tell you the layers I tried worked great. I was in the river for about 4 hours in temperatures between 34.1 and 42. I caught a few smallies, a longear and at least a dozen to fifteen rainbows that ate my smallmouth flies and jigs. The day that would have been perfect to fish was around Christmas eve and Christmas day for catching smallmouth, but I was, as I'm sure you were, attending to more pressing matters at the time.











Needless to say, I didn't have any other

fisherman crowding in on me where I was fishing. I guess there weren't any other fools around.

Lions and Tigers and Bears, Oh My!

The time finally came around... time to break the cycle of just one more cup of coffee and having one's butt Superglued to the recliner. It was time to square away the tying bench, root through the detritus of being too lazy to put stuff away properly, and to dig into and organize the fly boxes, the rods and reels, and to start to tie the replacements to fill the voids. I decided to lay out the boxes, make the appropriate arrangements (nymphs together in one box, dries in another, wets in a third, and so on). Gratuitous example: size 14 black Goddard Caddis; half dozen of same. There are flies tied by Chuck and/or Sharon, I'm sure at least some from Mark, and a raft of size 24 red chironomids that I just knew I had to tie for my first trip to the San Juan. That was probably 1993, and they have never been drowned either. As I recall, most everything Randy and I caught that trip was by either on RS2s or WD40s with the occasional Disco Midge thrown for good measure. I must have danced a Disco at least once 'cause there's an uneven number in one of the midge boxes, and I only tie in even amounts (4, 6 or a dozen) because I'm a little bit OCD.



Wretched Excess

In sorting the rods and reels, I discovered that one has gone AWOL. It probably got liberated from the top of my truck. As you wander the pawn shops and you stumble across a Cabela 5-piece 5-weight with a Ross reel it's probably mine. Sigh. That was my every day, keep-it-rigged, it-might-get-stolen but it's a cheap enough risk to take, rod. Now that it's gone I miss it like an old friend who moved away....

A Year of Trial by Debacle

Among the results of the bench-top cleanup I stumbled across a small notebook. It contained odd lists ("eggs, butter, milk") and two pages of rough notes for my journal. It was an article I never wrote, probably because the subject was either too painful, or I got lazy, or most likely I just lost the notebook under all that crap. I'll share just the notes since after all this time the details are a little fuzzy and I don't need to bore y'all with minutia. The tale concerns the year I retired—2007—and was intended to be titled "A Year of Trial by Debacle."

2007. By way of introduction this was the year I pulled the pin from government service, I had a lot of recreation to catch up on, and so I planned a mess of trips and bought two boats. One was a "proper salt water boat" of 19-feet with a big Merc outboard, and later, a 17' paddle jon. Since I already owned two canoes I was well on my way to starting my own navy. The big boat I found on the internet and drove all the way to Tampa to pick it up. At that time I was driving a full-size Dodge Ram pickup that was almost but not quite top heavy with a slide-in camper and which severely limited rear and side-view vision. Add on about 25 feet or trailer and boat. Got the picture?

Herein begins the list:

Note: Driving back from Tampa. Laid over at a State park in Mississippi that had a lake for me to try out the boat. Backed it in, got it almost off the trailer and noticed an excess of water. Forward up onto the trailer and put the garboard plug in once the water ran out. Second launch successful and dry.

Note: Previous boat had been a jon with a jet drive. They run much shallower than a fiberglass 19-foot center console with a saltwater Merc. Learned this the hard way by breaking a prop blade on a rock. Just luck, I guess—it could have been the lower unit.

Note: Offered to take my Canadian friend for a fishing trip on Pomme de Terre. Pulled into gas station to fuel both the truck and the boat. Filled truck, realized gas filler on boat was on other side and hose not long enough. Moved to other side of the pump island but forgot about turning radius of trailer which I ripped apart and almost from under the boat. Many days later finally found replacement trailer for \$900 plus tow and storage fees. Got Triple-A soon after.

Note: Went to Louisiana for the first Gulf Coast Council conclave. Too lazy to hand crank the camper's rear stand all the way up; backed up into a post and ripped the jack off the back corner. Oops. That was after the petty annoyance having to leave the boat some distance away because the campground didn't allow boat parking.

Note: Refused to pay Louisiana's insane salt water license fee for non-residents. Watched people who were not so cheap catch some nice fish.

Note: Took boat westward from LA to Galveston to fish Galveston Bay and the surf. Constant strong onshore wind made surf casting flies more work than digging a ditch with a short handle shovel. Same wind roughed the shallow bay to the point I could boat or fish, but not both. Frustrating. Singular memorable event was non-water related and involved the two young ladies in the tent next to my camper. They were apparently exceptionally good friends and probably should have blown out their candle before settling in for the night.

Note: Made an early morning departure from Galveston in order to beat the traffic. Timing was perfect—to put me into Houston (big truck, camper, boat, et al) for the morning rush hour and then added just enough drive time put me into downtown Dallas just as every idiot in Texas left their offices for lunch.

Note: Lake Texoma for stripers. Great fishing and fun boating once there, but the \$25 nickle-and-dime item trip from hell. Two swarthy men pulled alongside on a long stretch of lonely road in Oklahoma waving and gesticulating. OK, so it was profiling on my part, but the word "banditos" came to mind and the 1911 slid under my thigh just in case. The circular gesture they were making finally dawned on me as "tire." Trailer was dual axle so managed to limp into next town and bought two used replacements for \$25 each. Next issue was \$12 hat with \$12 glasses attached being lost overboard. With tax that was close enough to \$25. Then some sort of engine alarm sounded. Figured out it was the low oil alert. Surprise—outboard motor oil at a marina in Texas costs \$25/gallon. Last day on the water. Tied off the boat to the pier to load onto trailer, leaned over to experience the joy of hearing my phone splash out of my shirt pocket into the lake. As a crowning blow this note shows that (but not how or when) I broke a Sage rod. It does show the \$85 repair cost.

Note: Wyoming with Randy—got caught in but escaped a flash flood on a high mountain stream. No details recorded. Also got into a mountain hail storm that resulted in a Scott 3-weight being broken by a hail strike. [By the way, Charlie still has that rod for repair to this day. It's become a joke between us] While hiking in to fish Hog Park Creek passed three groups on the trail. Two had large pistols, the third had two cans of bear spray each. I was confident in my 40 calibre (they're only black bears, after all) until I realized I had left it in the truck. This was made more poignant by the large pile of still steaming bear poop I almost stepped in. Oh, and driving into the meadow the microwave broke free

inside the camper and snapped the Tommy Hargrove dressed, 5-piece, 2-wt Winston I just casually tossed onto the bunk. Tommy had it repaired with a week. Sigh.

Note: Took the German liaison officer and his two young boys for a boat outing on Lake of the Ozarks. Memo to self: tip up trolling motor before accelerating on main motor. If you don't the trolling motor pops off the transom into 85' of water.

Note: Texoma trip number 2. In the midst of a heavy rain is no time to discover the new, bigger, more efficient and effective bilge pump I just installed I miswired and only works on the switch but not the auto trigger. Also, experimented using 5-horse outboard from the paddle jon as a kicker. GPS showed 5 mph over the bottom in still air. Any head wind over 6 mph (aren't they all?) results in making way to the rear. The good idea fairy struck again.

Note: Thankfully, it got too cold for any more adventures.

I went fishing with friends a couple weekends ago to Bennett Springs and did alright swinging wooly buggers in the A.M. and then dry flies and pre-emergers in the afternoon. I would have done a lot better in the afternoon with the pre-emergers except the water was so clear I could see the fish and became so infatuated watching the trout approach then swipe at it I forgot to set the hook. Next time!

We will also be doing a show and tell on rods, vests/sling packs etc. It's always nice to look at someone else's stuff to see if the problem we are having someone else has already solved.



White River fishing report from Lou

I wish I had a real good fishing report for you from down on the White but I don't. Boot and I went and tied at Sowbug Roundup. They generated water on both the White and the Norfork all day every day except on Friday afternoon they shut off Norfork. I heard it looked like Bennett Springs on opening





day it was soooo crowded. We did do that old fisherman's trick of eves dropping on a conversation at dinner and got so so directions to an access that sounded like we could wade if we could find it. We finally found the wide spot in the road with the faint fisherman's trail running down the cliff to some really good looking water. We raised nary a trout, minnow or heron.





Brett's fishing trip to Michigan

Lots of rain in upper lower Michigan last week. "Good streamer water" was the theory, not in practice, someone forgot to tell the trout, the streamer bite SUCKED. Brought only one brown (photo attached) and one steelhead to hand stripping/swinging streamers for two days. The nymphing however was pretty good.

There were still fresh steelhead heading upstream, which is late for this river. In between bouts of pounding the banks and deadfalls with streamers for brown trout, we parked the boat and fished any runs with steelhead present. My brother was using a 7wt "running line" rig, otherwise known as "chuck n duck". He stuck a lot and landed a few. I threw an indicator rig with a point and dropper nymph on a 7wt switch rod, stuck a few and landed fewer. All fish landed hit a particular nymph pattern which I've sworn in blood not to disclose. (Not san juan worm or eggs)

And lunch! (my favorite part) First day: Medium rare venison steak with sauteed morel mushrooms, wild rice, ceasar salad and garlic bread. Second day: Grilled marinated center cut pork chops, sauteed green beans, boiled new potatoes and butter, butter lettuce and arugula salad, garlic bread. (We like to rough it when we fish hard).









Lou's Smallmouth Rendezvous and Bluegill Binge 2014

What a GREAT week! I received an invitation to tie at Smallmouth Rendezvous this year and since it was the week prior to the RRWFFC gathering in Broken Bow I accepted. As usual the Rendezvous was pretty cool. I saw old friends and maybe made a new one or two but probably my favorite part was seeing what everyone was tying for warm water. I sat next to a gentleman named Harvey Ragsdale who in my humble opinion makes some of the best poppers around and you all should know by now how I love throwing poppers. Always a tip or trick or three I learn from Harvey.

Saturday pinnacled with the fly tying contest. You'll never guess who won. Me! It was crazy. They give out an envelope with a bunch of tying materials in it and you have 15 minutes to tie a fly. This year's envelope had a large heart shaped piece of 2mm foam, a size 5 stainless steel hook, a piece of mylar tubing and a bunch of other "oversized" stuff in it. So I tied a diving floatin' please don't hit the back of my head type fly. And won! Now I have to make up the envelopes for next year. Any suggestions?





The week between the two events was filled with what a few friends and I call the Bluegill Binge. We start fishing early that Sunday and rarely stop until the following weekend. This year we took a break on Thursday to move from Tahlequah to Broken Bow. Meanwhile we fished 3 different pond/lakes in 4 days – one was so good we did a repeat! On Wednesday I happened to mention we probably had a 100 fish day for the boat and of course there were doubters. The next day the other boat pulled out a fish counter and just in the afternoon the two gals caught 34 fish apiece, 68 total for the boat. They guessed if they had counted the ones they caught in the morning to it would have been 100+.





The weekend following the Smallmouth Rendezvous the River Runner Woman's Fly Fishing Club was having a gathering at Broken Bow. It is one of those lakes that even when flooded – it was up 8 feet above normal - not only produces fish but remains so clear we probably could have put a large print book down around the 3' mark and been able to read it. The only hard part was picking a cove near a boat ramp to fish. The fish were there but so scattered because of the recent rains they were hard to pattern. We did bring just enough to hand (including a few 15" largemouth bass) to keep us out there all day. Some of the other gals in the River Runner's went to the Lower Mountain Fork for trout and I dare say I will be hard pressed on which I will go after next time – warm water in the main lake or trout in the stream!

Our species of choice was bluegill but we were after anything with fins that swims. Species caught were bluegill, redear, longear, mean green sunfish, crappies, catfish, largemouth bass, Kentucky bass and even a smallmouth bass. It was a hoot!

A trip to Todd's family cabin





Fishing report South Prong of the Jack's Fork

Thursday I went to the South Prong of the Jack's Fork River. I forgot how long it has been since I fished this section of the river. WOW! The hole under the Hwy Y bridge was deeper — by a lot — then before. How deep? How about a dark turquoise green deep with no bottom in sight deep. The river below that seems not quit as clear but still deceptively clear enough I got in up to my chest by accident. Hmmm same thing happened last time. Tiptoeing thru a hole - although refreshing with these summer temperatures was not my cup of tea. Accompanied by two different kinds of minnows, one school about an inch long and neon blue in color and the other a little bigger but light colored green, this time I made it all the way down to the South

Prongs junction with the North Prong. I caught the usual suspects – a bunch of longear sunfish, a few rock bass and two smallmouth bass. Yes TWO! I had to laugh though – I had cast a new popper into a slough and caught one and as I was bringing him in three others came along trying to get the popper out of his mouth! Of course none of them would bite after that. The neatest catch was a rock on a yellow BUB fly. Yes a rock. It had a caddis fly larva on the other side from where I caught it so that was pretty cool. All and all just another pleasant day on a river.

Fishing report from Lake Rinqualin and TA 250

What a crazy day. No one and I do mean no one was on Lake R when I arrived and it was Saturday! What a pleasant surprise. And that wasn't the only surprise — the mean greens were just as mean as last time I was there and the bass were just as fat and sassy too! The bluegill and redear looked like they had put on some weight — I figured no one was catching them, LOL! Or so it seemed. Once I set up the kayak I tied on a JR's Predator and made a few practice casts from the boat ramp to the local weeds and WHAM! A Mean Green Sunfish came to hand. It was going to be a great day!





I launched and since the dam was right there started fishing it first. There seemed to be fish at regular intervals all the way down with slightly better concentration in the corners of course. The far cove didn't really produce but as I fished my way around a boat showed up and of course they made a bee line for their spot in the standing timber right away. I figured they

were fishing for supper so didn't get too close. Hop scotching my way across the lake I picked up a mixed bag of bigger largemouth bass and bluegill.



Then I spotted the carp. After I fished my way over towards them I tried throwing a Briminator at them but then just stopped and sat and watched. How fascinating! They didn't notice my presence till I moved or made a noise. They would root around for a while — tails splashing and then stop and float. One half of a tail was so big if I had been in the ocean I would have been paddling my hiney off trying to get back to shore! I finally quit watching and paddled my way across the lake once again to try the far shore where the guys had been. Retying on a Predator (I really like that fly!) I am happy to report they had left a few for me. As more folks showed up I headed back to the dam, the wind cooperated and I was able to do a nice float down the dam to the boat ramp, picking up a few bluegill, more mean green sunfish and a few more largemouth bass along the way.

I came home, rested up and then went out again to try my hand at some night fishing. I had wanted to catch some of the bigger largemouth bass out on TA 250 but after fishing a big old frog pattern I caved and switched to a Size 4 Predator. I was getting a LOT of really good hits on the frog pattern but with the size 1 hook no one was able to take it and keep it except one lone bass. I know I shouldn't have because of the old "big fish - big fly" theory but I couldn't resist giving the mean greens and such a chance too!



And I am glad I did! Not only did I bring some chunky mean greens to hand and a couple nice bass I also caught Mr. Whiskers! I think he was cruising the shallows for a meal when my Predator splashed down like, well a frog and WHAM! The fight was on! Catfish do not like to jump and as this one bulldogged down trying to find something to wrap up in under my kayak I was straining to bring it up and praying everything from my knots to the rod would hold. Thank goodness I brought the 6 wt 'cause we had us a tussle! I WON! That Predator fly catches just about everything — I wonder how it would do in the salt?

There are thrills and chills that accompany night fishing. One of the thrills is to catch a fish and not know what it is until it comes to the boat. The possibility of catching a really big bass that only feeds at night is another. The chills can be just as invigorating. Noises seem to be amplified (or maybe our hearing just gets better?) when night comes and we are floating inches from the top of the water and can't SEE anything. From fish jumping to the voices of our fellow fishers everything either gets real loud or real quite. A big fish jumping out in the middle of the lake can sound like it's right beside you. Something stamping a hoof on shore because you startled it sounds like it is right next to the kayak. But when you feel something bump the kayak – THAT'S can be a thrill! And I'm not talking bump it from the side like something ran into it. I'm talking bump it from underneath and lift the kayak with me in it up. Now that's a thrill! Never saw it, didn't see a wake leaving, nothing. Just bump, up I went, then all was still. Now understand TA 250 is a training lake – they dug down about 8 feet and leveled it out all the way around. There are no stumps, logs, big boulders or anything else for the boats to get caught on out there, nor for me to "float over' causing my kayak to raise up like that. That's when I paddle over by the other guys fishing and well just talked a bit. Yes I did a little more fishing but I was through, having spent most the day on Lake R (or that is my excuse and I am sticking to it!)



FISHING REPORTS

Steelhead Trip to Michigan by Sam

This was the least productive trip I have taken for fall fishing. Spring time can be slow because the steelhead are spawning and they aren't too interested in eating. They will eat, but not like they do in the fall.

I fish with a friend that I met up there about 6 years ago. In the past we have always had excellent success for our fall trips, but instead of hooking up over a hundred times in a week and landing half of them, we only hooked up a little over 40 times and landed 16. There were not very many steelhead in the system while I was there. Reports on the Salmon run that precedes the fall steelhead run were also dismal. All of the other fishermen that we saw were having the same lack of luck. I lost considerably more than I landed and for the first time, I had one straighten a hook. I only have to assume that it was hooked by the tip of the hook in a solid place, OR it was a weak hook to begin with. I had one that I hooked near a tree that had fallen into the river, dash upstream and jump up and over a limb that was about three feet off the water. Needless to say it broke the tippet. My largest steelhead landed on this trip, was a 13 pound male that I hooked in the early morning hours of the fourth day. The second largest was a 12.5 male I landed on the second day.

Ah the Texas Hill Country. A far piece from here but oh so nice! October is my chosen month –mostly because it's not too hot yet and secondly because the rattle snakes have usually gone into hibernation by then. Here is the tale of this year's trip.

The excuse to go was a little fly fishing show put on by the Fredericksburg Fly Fishers called Oktoberfisch and held in a little town called Junction. Four years later I am still going! Days are easy – 6:30 or so is coffee call outside Don's trailer where we shoot the doodoo and talk fishing – when, were and what we caught since the last time we saw each other; then on to more important things like where we going next, when and to chase what. Once most folks start getting up around sunrise it's time to rustle up some breakfast or go fishing or both. Breakfast could be leftovers from the night before with some eggs thrown in or Mimosas or breakfast burritos or.......

The fishing is easy – the campground is on the river and a short paddle upstream puts me on a great little bend that usually holds some fish that we call Don's Hole since he caught a whopper in there a few years ago. I got a Hill Country Grand Slam in there this year – a Rio Grande cichlid, Guadalupe bass and a red breasted sunfish all in the same run.





With some effort one could actually paddle all the way up to Flat Rock – about a good 2 miles or so upstream. But – if one wants to do a longer float it's better to arrange a shuttle such as state park back to camp or 1st Crossing to 2nd Crossing or if you really want a humdinger of a float there is a place to put in WAY UP above everything. No time to fish on that float it is an all-day paddle plus some!





The river is gorgeous here – spring fed it has a light green ting to it that belays just how clear it is. The farther upstream the clearer the water gets. Paddling upstream from Second Crossing there is some really deep clear water. The river bottom ranges from large boulders to pea gravel and everything in between. Weed beds can be pretty extensive and threading my way thru them going upstream can be a little tricky, but well worth it. The current is easy – there is some woohoo water in a few places but not much where we float. When the wind lays down it's a nice gentle float back to camp or the pick-up area.


I usually start fishing the river by the campground, working the bank across from it and then paddling upstream to this really nice back eddy. I caught my largest ever Rio Grande cichlid there this year. I hope he is still there next year. I was told the first time I ever catch one I would say "What the hell is that?" when I brought it in and sure enough I did.

Upstream past Don's Hole there is another nice deep run that can be tricky to cast in – high weeds on the bank behind you and the stream picks up a bit right in there. Don's Hole –now that can be interesting to fish but when you find them it is full of fish, mostly red breasted sunfish, Guadalupe bass and one of my all-time favorites – long ear sunfishes. Casting can be tricky here to – not so much the back cast but getting the fly into the deepest shade available and the closer to the bank the better. The overhanging trees provide both the shade and the challenge of skipping a fly way up under next to the bank while the current keeps everything heading down stream. Sometimes any shadow will do – I have caught fish in the itsy bitsy shadow of a small bush right on the bank! This year's rule was "Find the shade and cast as deep into it as possible while hitting the bank is best!"

I helped do a sampling of the river with the Texas Parks and Wildlife folks this year and was pleasantly surprised by the number and size of mayfly nymphs we found. Think plenty and SMALL as in size 22s. Sorting and picking through those

samples reminded me of doing the critter count on Crane Creek. I also took a few classes on fishing for my next to favorite fish –the Guadalupe bass. Actually any native fish in its native waters is my favorite! I also got a few flies from the vendors for the Hill Country that I think will quite easily catch some of our Missouri smallmouth. A nice tidbit that came out of the TPWD class was the Texas state record (and thus world record) Guadalupe Bass is 17". A few years ago when doing a river survey they shocked a 18.25" Guadalupe from this river.

On my last day there our group did a float from 2Nd Crossing to 1st Crossing. I am happy to report I caught the second largest fish of the day and my largest of the trip, a Guadalupe bass. I love those guys 'cause when they want it, they go after it with a vengeance! We had us a good tussle before I brought it to hand. Guesstimating it went almost 15" but it was fat and pretty sassy. All too soon it was time to go. Next year I am staying for two weeks!

Freeze your Trout Off by Lou

Well, luckily we didn't freeze our trouts or anything else off at Freeze Your Trout Off on 22 November. I invited a friend from SMFF, Sharon, to tag along. Sad to say I think she out fished Todd and I both! Might be the last time she gets an invite but anyway, the temperature was tolerable and the sky held off dropping the rain the weather man had been predicting for all day till almost midafternoon. For a while I thought it was going to be one of those one fish one fly type of

days but the fish finally settled down a bit. There was some itsy bitsy midge hatch coming off the water that had the fish stirred up pretty good in the morning – until you cast a fly to them and then they were having nothing to do with nothing. Even Y2Ks only worked for a short while before the fish got lip lock on those too.



Most interesting thing was after a wonderful chili lunch Todd decided to go big. How big? One of those honking huge articulated streamers he's been messing with big. Did he catch anything? YES!!! Crappie and Bluegill winter fishing by Sam

It isn't often that I kill fish to eat, but when I do they are crappie or walleye and an occasional large bluegill or sunfish. Catching them out of cold water makes a big difference in firmness and taste. I always look for at least 3 warm days in a

row during the late fall, winter or early spring to head out to my favorite crappie lakes. The warm sun will raise the surface temps and draw them in closer to the banks where I can reach them without casting my arm off. Today was the 3rd warm day in a row, so I did what I usually do this time of year, catch crappie. I kept enough, 15 and one large Green Sunfish, for four meals for my wife and me. 8 fillets in a freezer bag is just the right amount for one meal for the two of us.



These Crappie are 11-12 inches and the Bluegill is about 10

inches. I released around 20 to 25 smaller crappie, bass and bluegill. I didn't start fishing until the sun got up high enough to start warming the water at 11:00. Once the clouds came in and the temps dropped around 3:00 so did the bite. Crappie are not much for fighting, but the great eating makes them worth the effort. They will always be in schools during the winter months, so when you find one you will find others and they seem to hang around with fish their own size. IF you are catching small ones look for another spot until you find the larger ones.

<u>River Conditions</u> Area streams are still running low and clear. Smallmouth are in their winter holding water. As we get into winter fishing, look for warm afternoons with the sun on the water to get the bugs going. Just a couple of degrees increase in surface temps can help a hatch. I have had some excellent dry fly days in early December. Being in the right place at the right time can pay big dividends. If you are nymph fishing, remember that during the winter months they are very small, with the exception of hellgrammites and some stoneflies.
