### Issues to consider for future discussion and action.


#### 1) Tree Planting on NFOW

The worst flooding anyone can ever remember occurred in the spring of 2017. Several watersheds were decimated. The North Fork of the White River (NFOW) was hit exceptionally hard and the fishery is in poor condition. The stream bed and the banks were scoured and invertebrates destroyed. The fish are slowly making a recovery.

The Mid-Mo TU club with the help of MDC has taken on a project of planting trees along the banks of the river in predetermined locations. There are other fishing clubs in the state coming forward to assist their help as well. We, as a conservation minded organization could offer help with this project, just as we did several years ago on Mill Creek.

Our BPRSTWA tree planting project in the Elder Piney area at the end of Wyoming Road will take place on Saturday, March 7, 2020. The U.S. Forest Service identified and mapped two areas of about eight acres each. We selected one of the areas on the above map. Prep work has already begun. A tree plow will be used to plant the seedlings and 3-foot squares of weed barrier will be stapled around each tree. ### Fishing Report by Sam

With several streams still up and off color it is a great time to throw streamers for trout and smallmouth. Winter is also a time of the year when I like to finesse fish for smallmouth. I like to fish when most people are at home near a warm fire and out of the elements. Cloudy, cold days in the snow and rain gives me a lot more water to myself. Usually several species in the same day can be caught with the method I use, and I enjoy that too. I would venture to guess that I am probably catching 30-40 fish per trip. There are a few nice smallmouth and trout over 15 inches mixed in, but most of the fish are smaller. Last week in the snowstorm I caught 6 different species on the same fly and used that one fly all day to catch about 40 fish.

## MDC Fly Fishing Workshops

### Reports by Herb

On 1 February Lou, Sam, and Herb of the Roubidoux Fly Fishers helped in the instruction 12 participants in the skills of fly casting. The casting course is the first of three MDC Discover Nature workshops managed by Dwight Warnke the Conservation Educator South District. The workshop took place at Bray Conservation Area in Rolla.



Instructional techniques from the International Federation of Fly Fishers Casting Program and “Fly Fishing A-Z” by Mark Van Patten. By the end of the day all participants were making great progress with their overhead and roll casts.

Saturday 8 February Todd and Herb assisted with an MDC Discover Nature workshop called “Match the Hatch”. This workshop was managed by Dwight Warnke the South District, Conservation Educator. The workshop is the second of three workshops focusing on fly fishing. The goal of this workshop was to help beginning fly fishermen figure out flies to improve their success on the water.



Missouri Stream Team Biologist Jenna Stiek added details about macro-invertebrates which added depth to the participants knowledge of the actual organisms that various flies mimic. All participants received many stream team handouts and a copy of “Fly Fishing A-Z” by Mark Van Patten as future references to be used on their local waters. Also, all participants worked on their casting skills at Meramec Spring Park.

Lou, Todd, Sam, and Herb were at Maramec Spring Park Saturday (15 February) working as primary and assistant instructors of an MDC Discover Nature workshop. The workshop was managed by Dwight Warnke (Conservation Educator South District) and was a fly tying workshop. Basic tying tools, materials, and techniques were covered. The main reference was Mark Van Patten’s “Fly Fishing A-Z”.



There were eight participants so there was a lot of one-on-one assistance. The group started with a Woolly Buzzer, then the American Pheasant Tail Nymph (a little more challenging than expected), the EZY Pheasant Tail Nymph, and finished off with a Peacock Soft Hackle.

Nineteen Phelps Health staff and family members turned out for the “Meet and Greet” 26 February. The Roubidoux Fly Fishers support the event with tying stations, a casting station, Jerry Cook had information about his shop, Sam highlighted his guide service, Dwight provided information on MDC upcoming events. Lou, Karen, and Todd ran the tying stations while Herb and Charlene networked the crowd.

The “Meet and Greet” resulted in a sign up seven (7) individuals that are interested in starting tying at Phelps Health. This is a wonderful opportunity for club grow and an additional night of tying for the club.

Oktoberfisch – My annual Southern Migration to the Texas Hill Country. This last year I went without a kayak so the game was afoot to find some water that was wadeable with fish that haven't seen every fly in the known universe. OR beat my buddies to the river first!! Except for that pesky Guadalupe Bass – I think my largest of the trip was all of an 8" whopper – whereas my friends were catching some solid 15 – 17" fish. My other two favorite freshwater fish of Texas, the Rio Grande cichlid and Redbreasted Sunfish did not disappoint. Catching both in the 9-10" they gave me a tussle on my 4wt. rod. Friends & fishing – that's what it's all about!!

### Streamer Lovfest 2020

I didn't know what to expect when I headed down to Dally's Streamer Lovfest in Cotter. I had been told it was like no other fly tying show I had ever been to and boy were they right!! If you like to tie streamers – both articulated and not; talk about tying streamers; watch people tie streamers; talk about streamer fishing - both articulated and not; talk about fishing for big brown trout; OR talk about fishing for BIG TOOTHY FISH like muskie Streamer Lovfest is where you need to go.



The anticipation was palatable at 5 o'clock when Dally's tried to close their doors so they could set up for the evening because no one wanted to leave! As soon as they got everybody out a line formed on the outside of the building – swag bags would be handed out and of course everyone wanted one. A strange thing happened though - as the line grew so did the camaraderie. We were all there for the same purpose – a celebration of big honking streamers. When the doors finally opened just after 6:00 everything was moved off the main floor and four tables with 2 chairs apiece were arranged in a square. The first round of tiers grabbed a seat and started tying one fly. Yes – one fly per tier would be put in a box and raffled off at the end of the evening. Once each tier was done with their fly they got up to let the next tier sit down. There was no taking 2 hours to tie a fly here – most were done in 20 minutes or so and the only slowdown was tiers heckling each other or by questions from the crowd.



Those of us on the outside of the tables could stay and watch one tier or walk around and pick up tips from as many of the tiers as we chose. At the end of the evening after all the tiers were done the drawings were held – certificates for food, Yeti coolers, beer (I think) and of course the box of flies. It was one of those “leave no fly behind” suit case type boxes that was chock a block full of some streamers from the best in the country. Sad to say I didn't win it but it sure was cool to be there!



I think the greatest thing about the evening was who we were doing this for – all proceeds went to The Mayfly Project, a non for profit that takes children in foster care and teaches them how to fly fish. From putting the rods together to tying on a fly to identifying bugs to learning about conservation they get to do it all. AND they get to keep the rod and reel outfit they used during the classes. I recently published a book titled "From Northern California to the Ozarks of Missouri: How Rainbow Trout Came to the Show-Me State." **Roubidoux Fly Fishers Monthly Meeting Report****Report by Lou**



You would think that after a few decades of throwing flies there wouldn't be any firsts that would happen. But there is always the potential no matter how many times we take to the water. That is one of the joys of flyfishing various waters for various species.

On a recent fishing trip to the Big Piney for smallmouth I added a First to my long list of species that I have caught. The take was solid and then I saw a silver flash as the fish turned and headed down stream. I immediately thought trout but convinced myself that it must be a shad. It fought harder than any shad I have ever caught but guessed it could just be one with a little more get up and go. As I slid the fish to me, I realized that if this was a Shad, I didn't recognize it. Walking it over to the gravel bar I took photos and measured it, and as I was reviving it decided that it must be in the shad family. Skipjack like minnows and fast water

### **Fishing Report Sam**

Fishing a local creek for smallmouth last week I was walking back after a successful afternoon and decided to cut through a little bottom land to shorten the walk. The trail ran parallel to a large pond/small lake depending on your interpretation of each. I noticed movement on the surface near the bank. I eased over quietly and saw that they were fish sucking on the surface. Having seen this before I knew they were carp. I changed my fly and with the brush and trees as thick as it was I was only able to poke my rod through an opening and dangle my fly about 3 feet off the end of my rod and wait. It only took a couple of minutes before one worked its way toward me. I dropped the fly inches in front of it and it turned and took immediately. It was the only fish I caught all day that actually pulled hard enough to take line and that included a couple of 16 inch smallies.



About a 2 pound Grass Carp.

With temperatures cooling off it is a good idea to remember that those crawly critters are looking for places to stay warm. Stones, roads that are paved or gravel, opened garages or anywhere they can take advantage of the sun warming the ground.



**River Conditions:**

Streams conditions are getting a bit lower and clear but are still good now compared to years past. The flow this year has been excellent although in the past couple of weeks or so I have had to walk the drifter through the low spots a lot more often.

Terrestrial fishing is still good but winding down as the temps also begin to slide down. I had a Japanese Beetle land on me a couple of days ago while fishing a local stream, which is very strange. I have never seen them this late in the year.

The fall caddis hatches are in full swing if you are in the right place at the right time.

The smallmouth bite has been excellent this month, but they are beginning to transition to winter holes and will be scattered, so finding them can get a little tricky.

### Fishing Report Sam

Fishing for migrating fish can be extremely rewarding and extremely frustrating. The key is to be on the water in the right location when there are good numbers to be caught. Get it right and the reward is tremendous get it wrong and it can lead to some long nonproductive days. A week and half ago the Steelhead and Coho Salmon were all over the river that I fish in Michigan. This past week the river dropped several hundred CFS and cleared. The migrators were gone. Yes a few remained, but the numbers were severely depleted.

Day One: Temperature 27 degrees in the morning the guides were freezing up, water temp was 41 color gin clear, skies were cloudy, which is a good thing, but it still didn't make a difference to our success. I had a total of 1 hook up from sunup to sundown. My partner had 0 hookups. Fish in the boat 0. Number of casts made, too many. Number of other boats fishing the same water we were fishing, way too many. We decided to finish the float early row it out and walk-in to another area in the afternoon. It didn't make any difference.



Day Two: Our day started out just like the first day 27 degrees but warming in the afternoon and turning into a blue bird day. The night before we decided to do a long float, 9 miles to be exact, to try to find fish. I suggested that we concentrate on deep north facing holes because of the clarity of the water. As my partner rowed the drifter I stood and watched for fish wherever I could see the bottom. Some holes were far too deep 8+ feet and

too fast to see the bottom clearly. Some holes were too deep and shaded to see the bottom. This system has worked in the past for us. When I would see Steelhead, we would pull over and fish them. Or we would find Coho salmon spawning and fish the holes downstream from them. Unfortunately, on this drift I was not seeing anything but small trout. We did find a few Coho spawning, but no Steelhead feeding below. As we came to north facing water with depth we pulled over and fished them. The result was better, but still not good. I hooked up 3 times and landed one nice hen. My partner hooked up 4 times and landed 2 of them. Not even close to the number of Steelhead we have found in past years.



This is about a nine pound female starting to color up so she had been in the river at least a couple weeks. All the steelhead we caught had color. We didn't hook any Chromed fish fresh out of the lake on this trip.

### Day Three:

Having limited success on day two, but success none the less we decided to do the long float again. Temps started out in the low 30s but warmed to 60 by 4 PM. Clear blue skies warranted fishing the deep shaded north facing holes once again. Our day was about the same as day two. I went 1 for 3 and my partner was 2-4 with another nice hen. I did however hook my first spawning colored male Coho on day three. I caught some Coho salmon several years ago on the Platte River in Northern Michigan, but they were not in spawning colors. They were all silver fresh out of the lake. I have always wanted a photo of a male Coho in spawning colors but until this day it has eluded me. They do not eat much when they enter the river to spawn, but they will on occasion hit a spoon or spinner or fly. I'm not sure why, but they do. Chinooks, (King Salmon) will hit if they are annoyed enough and usually if they are fresh out of the lake. I learned how to catch them a long time ago from a older gentleman that showed me how to tease a dominate male into striking.



Not as big as Kings, especially this little guy that I caught, but still colorful.

#### Day Four:

Still trying to find more Steelhead than we had found on day two and three, we decided to move further up the river in hopes of increasing our opportunities. I didn't happen. Very warm temps, extremely clear water and bright sunshine with lower water in the stretch we fished made conditions worse. My partner hooked and landed one really nice fish and my only fishing reward came at the very end of the day when I was winding in my line quickly with the rod tip pointed straight to the line when I was cut off by either a Steelhead or a Pike. That was it. I didn't have another fish on my line all day except for several rainbows and browns. Probably 20-30 of those little guys, but not much fun on a steelhead rod. It was new water for me to see and fish and for that I was thankful because it was beautiful water, but better suited for small trout than big steelhead.



**River Conditions:**

Stream conditions are, as far as I know, the same as they were when I left. Clear

### Fishing Report from Lou

Todd and I went fishing at Montauk on Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup> and I was running late, as usual, when Todd texted there were a lot of people in the park. Well, the parking lot was almost full when I got there, and I got dressed with a bit of trepidation - I don't care for crowds while fishing. Something was afoot though because as I made my way down to the creek there were only a few fishermen. And the only one on the rearing pool branch was Todd. ### **River Conditions:**

Stream conditions are clear with average flows for this time of the year. Some strains of rainbows we have in Missouri will spawn in December (notice the spawning redd photo above that Lou took) and some of them will spawn in late November. I have seen redds in January and as late as early February. In Montauk Park the area below the handicap ramp at the campground is closed during the winter catch and release season, that section has always been a spawning area.
