Your Curb Appeal Checklist







Security Camera Registration

A lot of homeowners, taking a proactive approach to their safety, are installing security cameras around their homes. Generally, they are placed with a good view of our cars, house entrances, and hopefully at least one with a good street view.


There was a local news item about a neighborhood that voluntarily pooled their information regarding homes with video cameras and made that list available to local law enforcement to help in investigating incidents. This information resulted in helping apprehend a suspect.

In another incident off FM 290, neighbors were able to compile videos which showed the same suspect breaking into cars and one video with him riding off in a stolen vehicle. Watching the videos, it was clear where the suspect touched the car, enabling the officers to take fingerprints. Now with an identity and picture, they could see the same suspect from another neighborhood hit, and are currently ready to apprehend him for both subdivision break-ins.

In a talk between the Safety Committee and our contract deputies, the idea of having a list by streets of those who owned security cameras in our community was very well received. We would like to be able to give our deputies this tool in investigating incidents in our area. As you can tell, it will make a definite and immediate impact on the safety and security of our homeowners here, and we don't have to worry at all about increasing our assessment fees to do it; it's free!

Our group will look forward to meeting again for the fall season starting on **Tuesday**, **September 26** at the home of







Fall Exhibits Open September 30


This fall, the Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Arts is thrilled to present an exhibition titled **Anat Ronen: Urban Legend**.

New Buses, Computers and Other Positive Changes for the 2017-18 School Year

Spring ISD administrators and staff have been working hard over the summer to prepare for the new school year, including several changes that will have a positive impact on students and families. The first day of school for Spring ISD students was Thursday, August 17.

Spring ISD started classes for students earlier than usual this year. During the past year, the district was designated a District of Innovation – a change that allows many unique opportunities, including the flexibility to design an instructional calendar that balances the number of days in each semester, allows students to finish their first semester before winter break and coordinates with local college schedules to enable students to accelerate their learning.

Adding 60 New Buses and Increasing Bus Transportation

Using funds approved by voters in the 2016 Bond referendum, the district has purchased 60 new buses needed to increase transportation services to 5,000 more students who live between one mile and 1.5 miles from their zoned campus of attendance.

Although the state funds transportation services for students who live within two miles of their school, Spring ISD has been working to increase the number of students served in the district. When transportation increased to the one-mile radius this August, about 22,000 students were eligible for services, increasing student safety and decreasing traffic congestion during arrival and dismissal times districtwide.

Computer Upgrades to Classrooms

Over 3,500 obsolete computers at campuses across the district were replaced this summer by Spring ISD's technology staff. The new Dell computers are attached to the back of the monitor, so that they don't take up space on or under the desks — a big improvement over the older models. This massive project is just one of the results of the Spring ISD 2016 bond referendum that was passed by over 70 percent of the voters in November of last year.

Breakfast in the Classroom Offered at all Elementary Schools

Breakfast in the Classroom (BIC) is now being offered at all Spring ISD elementary schools. The BIC program provides students the opportunity to start their day with a free, healthy and balanced meal. Breakfast is served to students in their classroom or the hallway. Students have access to both cold and hot breakfast foods that include healthy protein and grain items, fresh fruit and low-fat milk. They have the option to select which food items they take, and participation is not mandatory.

Full-day Prekindergarten Expanded to Two More Elementary Schools

In support of the district's commitment to expand full-day prekindergarten districtwide, two more schools — Anderson and Smith elementary schools — are offering full-day programs this year. This brings the total number of Spring ISD schools that offer full-day pre-K to seven: Clark Primary, Anderson, Heritage, Link, Lewis, Smith and Thompson elementary schools, while half-day classes are offered at all other elementary schools.

Thousands of Books Delivered to Spring ISD Schools

Spring ISD's focus on literacy continued during the summer in a big way with over 150 pallets of books delivered to schools across the district in preparation for the start of school. To build a strong literacy foundation, the district is working to provide elementary teachers and middle school and high school English teachers with an ample supply of good books that will appeal to students and promote a love of reading.

High School Football Fields Get New Artificial Turf

The football fields at all three comprehensive high schools – Dekaney, Spring and Westfield – have new artificial turf thanks to the 2016 Bond referendum approved by voters in November 2016. This will be the first time that Dekaney players have had artificial turf on their practice field.

School Day Hours Extended by Five Minutes

Five minutes have been added to the school day this year to allow more time for instruction as well as more time to accommodate staff development days that will greatly benefit student achievement.



We continue to see a need in our community, and we rely on volunteers to deliver these meals to hundreds of people who otherwise would go hungry. Volunteers are truly the lifeline these individuals have and we couldn't do what we do without them," Jackson said.

Prospective volunteers will also enjoy a video that highlights the scope of NAM's many programs and services. After the video, they will take a tour of NAM's four-story building, so they can learn first-hand from current volunteers, program directors, or NAM staff about current volunteer opportunities from each department.


Meals on Wheels delivers hot, well-balanced meals to the doors of seniors and other neighbors who are homebound because of disability or illness. By supporting their nutritional needs, this program helps participants maintain or improve their health, remain independent, and stay in their homes for as long as possible. During fiscal year 2015-2016, Meals on Wheels provided 134,011 nutritious meals to 1,034 homebound seniors and disabled adults, serving on average 600 each weekday and 91 individuals on Saturdays. Additionally, 93 low-income senior clients received monthly grocery deliveries to supplement their food budgets and 35 seniors received supplemental nutritional supplements as prescribed by their physicians.


