### **Litigation Committee Update**

On July 14, 2015, Williams ACMI Ventures, L.P. ("ACMI") filed a lawsuit against Olde Oaks Community Improvement Association, Inc. (the "Association"). In its lawsuit, ACMI claimed that the Association breached its contract with ACMI by terminating ACMI. The Association retained legal counsel and filed a response to the lawsuit on August 10, 2015, generally denying all allegations.

From the beginning of this lawsuit, the Board of Directors has adamantly denied ACMI's allegations and has sought a resolution that is in the best interest of the Association. After careful consideration and advice from counsel, the Board determined the decision that was in the best interest of the Association was an early resolution. Among the factors the Board considered were the uncertainty of litigation and the substantial cost (including attorney fees and expenses) that the Association, win or lose, would incur in defending itself. Therefore, the Association and ACMI have agreed to settle this lawsuit for \$11,188.34, an amount substantially lower than the amount ACMI was seeking in its lawsuit, which was estimated to be over \$150,000.

Though the decision to settle is never easy, in this case the Board determined that a settlement was the best decision for the Association. Now that this lawsuit is behind us, the Association can focus its energy and resources on other issues important to the continuing growth of the community.

# **ACC reminder**

Apply for approval before you start your project.

Are you thinking of taking on an exterior remodeling project? Do you feel it's time to change out your windows, install new siding, replace your fence or cut down a tree in your yard?

Don't forget to apply for approval for **all** exterior remodeling or improvement projects **before** starting. Whether you are painting your home the same color, installing a new door, or replacing your roof or cedar fence, the deed restrictions and bylaws require approval of the Architectural Control Committee (ACC).

Depending on the project, actual samples may be required with your application, such as roof shingles, paint swatches or photos and specs of a door or windows. Not obtaining ACC approval beforehand could result in a deed restriction violation and cause you to have to redo the project in accordance with ACC and deed restriction standards (and no one wants to repaint their house after just undertaking the expense or install a new door twice).

The ACC application can be found on the Olde Oaks Community Improvement Association website at www.oocia.org under the "Architectural Control" tab on the left-hand navigation menu.

Trash is collected on Mondays and Thursdays. Recycling is collected on Thursdays. Please do not set out trash or recycling receptacles before 7 a.m. on Monday and Thursday mornings. Remember that we have "backdoor" trash service, but yard waste and recycling must be hauled to the curb. Heavy items are picked up on Thursdays. Any combination of up to eight (8) bags or bundles of yard waste will be picked up at the curb each collection day. Branches (three inches diameter and less) need to be bundled in four-foot lengths. No yard waste bag or bundle should weigh more than 40 pounds.

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

This month we will meet on the November 17 at my house. Susan Muirhead will be discussion leader for Milan Kundera's *The Unbearable Lightness of Being.* Since Thanksgiving is in the fourth week, we will meet a week early. Besides discussing the book, we will also choose books for **January** through **May 2016** and discuss our Christmas luncheon plans for probably the first week of December. So it will be a full meeting.

Milan Kundera is a Czech-born novelist, short story writer, playwright, essayist, and poet who was born in 1929. He had been living in exile in France since 1975 and was naturalized in 1981. Sources say he sees himself as French and wants his work to be studied as French literature and classified as such in bookstores. His writings combine erotic comedy with political criticism and philosophical speculation. He was in and out of the Communist party and finally his works were banned, he was fired from teaching, and ousted from the Communist party. It was then that he and his wife immigrated to France.

The Unbearable Lightness of Being seems like an odd title perhaps, but pertains to the lightness of inconsequential living, living above true compassion and concern for others versus the

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heavy weight of responsibility when one chooses the opposite course in life. Which is compatible with freedom? Weight or lightness?

Tomas, an intellectual Czech brain surgeon, conquers scores of women sexually in a vain attempt to find a meaningful life. He can't commit and has no aptitude for love. He doesn't woo women or flatter them but commands them, and they comply. Sounds like room for discussion right there! Other characters are involved too to enhance the plot, which takes place in Prague.

## Spring ISD Mentor Program

The Spring Independent School District is beginning a new mentor program at five schools this fall. Spring Forward: Supporting Our Scholars is designed to empower preteen and teenage students to make positive life choices that will help them maximize their personal and academic potential. The program's greatest need right now is adult volunteers.

"We need trusted adult role-models to serve as mentors to our students," said Dr. Laquita Carter, executive director of family and community engagement. "We are looking for adults within our community who are willing to volunteer their time to establish a consistent, caring relationship with a student or students at our schools."

The mentor/mentee relationship focuses on the student's academic, social and emotional needs and encourages them to develop to their fullest potential based on their own goals and vision for their future.


According to the National Mentoring Partnership, school mentor programs have a significant impact on the dropout rate and attendance rate among high school students. "Students who have a positive adult role model are more likely to stay in school, graduate from high school, and make better and healthier lifestyle choices," Carter said.

During the program's first year, it is being initiated at Dekaney, Spring and Westfield high schools and Bammel and Claughton middle schools with funding provided by the Spring ISD Education Foundation.

Volunteers must successfully complete a screening process that includes an application, background check and reference check and then complete initial training before being assigned to a student. Training will be ongoing with additional workshops held throughout the year.



The 2015 total tax rate of \$1.47 per \$100 valuation includes a maintenance and operation (M&O) tax rate of \$1.04 and an interest and sinking (I&S) tax rate of \$0.43.

"We are very pleased to be able to decrease the school district's tax rate – helping offset the increase in appraised values and resulting increase in property taxes that the Spring community has recently seen," said Spring ISD Chief Financial Officer Ann Westbrooks. "While property owners may not see a decrease in their overall tax payment, they will see a decrease in what they pay to Spring ISD. The district's ability to reduce its tax rate is largely due to a new priority-focused budgeting process that was implemented this past year. Re-evaluating how every district dollar is spent, Spring ISD advanced several priority projects as well as increased teacher salaries while also bringing forward a budget that did not require it to request additional resources from the public."

In June, the Board of Trustees adopted the 2015-16 operating budget that included increased salaries for teachers, expanded transportation services and the development of an in-district Disciplinary Alternative Education Program. Funds were also set aside for various other priorities, including improved curriculum and a strengthened technology infrastructure.

According to Westbrooks, the two-year savings to property owners with a house valued at \$100,000 in 2013 would be \$187. Individual increases in values may adjust the total savings taxpayers actually see.

Naturally, the increased property values seen in Spring have also influenced the district's ability to propose a reduction in the tax rate. Year over year, Spring ISD has seen a 17-percent increase in overall property values, including the increased taxable value from ExxonMobil, which completed its relocation into the Spring community this year.

The Harris County Appraisal District suggests that the value of residential property in the county rose 15 percent and almost 90 percent of the homes in the county increased in value since 2014.
