As I have mentioned before, new members are invited to join the group. We meet monthly except for the June through August period.





# Well, it's that time of year again ... mosquitoes are increasingly making their presence known!

The Harris County Mosquito Control District was created to control mosquitoes such as the culex that spread malaria, encephalitis, and Dengue fever and now the new threat of West Nile Virus. Visit their website at www.hcphes.org for helpful information on personal protection and some proactive measures we should all follow to help hold down the mosquito population, such as:

- Don't feed the storm drains. Sweep up lawn clippings, leaves and tree limbs from sidewalks and driveways.
- Remove/empty containers that can hold water such as flower pots, buckets, tires, toys and plastic swimming pools. Birdbaths and pet water bowls should be changed at least twice a week.
- Keep rain gutters clean and draining, and repair any outdoor household leaks.
- When watering the lawn, be aware of any excess water that may accumulate. Fill in low areas around the yard.
- When mosquitoes are noticed in your yard, spray with an outdoor mosquito spray. Be sure to use according to directions on the label.

Our community has contracted Cypress Creek Pest Control (CCPC) to provide mosquito spraying at least weekly (the frequency varies per contract season). The current season includes spraying two times a week. Cypress Creek Pest Control is the largest private mosquito control operator in Texas and is an active member of the Texas Mosquito Control Association and other industry organizations. Spraying occurs after 9 p.m. via their dispatched truck which is contracted to go down every street dispersing a fog from a ULV (Ultra Low Volume) fog generator. Such spraying is done from the curb toward the front of each home. CCPC indicates the spray does have some effect toward the back of the property. The service is designed to control pest mosquitoes, but in no way can any mosquito program totally eliminate them. A mosquito control program can only keep the population in a specific area at an acceptable level.

Individual conditions, particularly in the backyard, may require additional measures by the property owner. According to CCPC, "during periods of high rainfall in the summer, the mosquito population will increase, but will usually not decrease during drought because people begin to water their lawns and create artificial breeding areas in sewers. Communities adjacent to underdeveloped land with standing water can expect to have a constant supply of adult mosquitoes ready to invade."

Spraying can be done easily with sprayers available from Home Depot, Lowe's, etc. as a do-it-yourself project (carefully following all directions on the label) or via monthly spraying and misting systems. There are many local companies, including CCPC, that offer services ranging from misting services to monthly and one-time spray applications. For example, a hand fogger application is available if you are planning a family event and need to ensure a pest-free event.

# HARRIS COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT HCFCD Storm Sewer Repair Project

The Harris County Flood Control District posted and said they are committed to keeping residents informed about flood damage reduction studies, projects and maintenance efforts on bayous, creeks and ditches throughout Harris County. The storm sewer outfall reconstruction project will replace failed outfall pipes and erosion on Cypress Creek near Olde Oaks and Northgate subdivisions, and Northgate Forest Golf Course. Harris County Flood Control District and Harris County Precinct 4 Commissioner R. Jack Cagle are partnering on the project.

As of April 28, work is progressing on the Flood Control District's Cypress Creek/Storm Sewer Outfall Reconstruction Project, but frequent rainstorms have been a major cause of delay since the project started in February. With the access route and project site remaining continuously saturated, the Flood Control District's contractor has not been able to take delivery of key materials needed to do the repair work. The contractor is waiting for dry weather conditions in order to resume work on the site.



# Volunteer Interfaith Caregivers, Southwest

"You are the key to your neighbor's independence"

Many frail and elderly people face an excruciating choice either to spend their last years in an impersonal institution or remain at home, isolated and housebound with the decrease in mobility. Volunteer Interfaith Caregivers – Southwest (VIC-SW) was organized in 1994 by concerned people of faith who had experience in the provision of health and human services, particularly for the frail and elderly. The founders understood the isolation and fear often experienced by these people, and they envisioned a volunteer effort to address those needs. With the help of VIC-SW, a third option is available to Houston's frail and elderly population; they can live independent lives in their own homes with the assistance of VIC-SW's volunteers providing life sustaining services and a link to the larger community (www.vic-sw.org).

Volunteer Interfaith Caregivers – Southwest (VIC-SW) is a faith-based nonprofit whose mission is to promote senior independent living, health, and safety by providing free transportation and other services. In the last 20 years, VIC-SW has built a coalition of congregations that believe that the power of a collaborative effort will accomplish more than any one church acting alone. Congregations show their support by providing outreach for VIC-SW programs, providing volunteers, and monetary and in-kind funding to VIC-SW. Our service

area includes 28 ZIP codes in southwest Houston and has expanded to 11 ZIP codes in northwest Houston through a partnership with Northwest Assistance Ministries.

Through a network of volunteers, VIC-SW provides free services to elders who are at least 65 years old and ambulatory (small walker or cane is acceptable), live in our service area, and have not been diagnosed with a mental disease or Alzheimer's, that include transportation to doctors and clinics, pharmacies, grocery stores, to attend religious services, and to run errands. Our volunteers remain with a client throughout the appointments to reassure them. Other services include minor household repairs, light home management, minor yard work, telephone reassurance calls, and companion visits.

In 2013, VIC-SW volunteers drove over 26,000 miles and contributed more than 3,700 hours to help the elderly in their community. No other agency in our service area provides this valuable free transportation service to the elderly population helping them stay engaged in their communities and to be able to go to the doctor's office and to maintain the best possible quality of life. We are always looking for valuable volunteers to help with the services that we provide as well as clients that meet the requirements of service.

## **Firework Safety Tips**

4th of July is a fun-filled time with lots of fireworks being sold. KVFD wants to help keep you and your family safe this Independence Day.

- If you want to see fireworks safely, the best option is to go to one of the many local public shows available in the area.
- If you choose to use fireworks at home, be aware that there are dangers and statistics that you might not realize.
- Using fireworks at home seems like fun. However, more than 15,000 fires are caused by fireworks each year.
   Countless injuries also occur due to home fireworks use.
- At least 18% of fireworks related injuries are caused by small firecrackers.
- Sparklers cause 24% of fireworks injuries. They burn hot enough to cause third-degree burns.
- The risk of fireworks injury was highest for young people ages 15-24, followed by children under 10.



 On Independence Day in a typical year, far more US fires are reported than on any other day, and fireworks account for two out of five of those fires, more than any other cause of fires.


