T.C. Jester Corridor Project Impending Impacts

Before and after drawings for the three intersections where streetlights will be installed are posted on www.oocia.org. Essentially, there will be left turn lanes from TCJ at each intersection which will result in some loss of trees on the TCJ median.

As ground work on the traffic signals progresses, properties on the four corners of each intersection (Kennonview, Aspen Bend and Chapel Bend) and certain others will be specifically affected and such residents should prepare to take measures as necessary. At this time it is our understanding Harris County Precinct 4 will not provide complete remediation or repair of damages caused by the work. Despite our current lack of sidewalks, standards dictate addition of handicap ramps and sidewalk (about 5 ft. wide and 15 ft. long) at each corner of each traffic signal intersection. Pedestrian crossing controls will be installed as well. In some locations, power cables will be installed parallel to TCJ in the right-of-way near the street and likely will require trenching there. Such work along the right-of-way will cause disturbance to plantings, irrigation systems or anything else residents have installed within that area. Certain residents have started getting alerts from the subcontractor and our management company. ACMI will provide additional notifications to ensure messages are conveyed adequately. Affected residents are urged to take the initiative to relocate plantings/installations beforehand and consider measures to deal with irrigation system disruption.
