

"Footnotes"



A nonfiction choice is on the agenda for the October 23 book club meeting at the home of Virginia McGriggs. She will also be the discussion leader for America's Women by Gail Collins.

The book jacket states it very well that "America's Women tells the story of more than four centuries of history. It features an array of personalities from women who came on the Mayflower to feminists protesting beauty pageants and bridal fairs. Courageous, silly, funny, and heartbreaking, these women shaped the nation and our vision of what it means to be female in America. Collins charts the journey of how women lived, what they cared about, and how they felt about marriage, sex, and work. She starts with the lost colony of Roanoke, the pioneer days, the fight for suffrage, spans the wars, the Depression, the era of Rosie the Riveter, the civil rights movement, and the feminist rebellion of the '70s."

The history of American women is about the fight for freedom, "but it's less a war against oppressive men than a struggle to straighten out the mixed message about women's roles that was accepted by almost everybody of both genders."

"This book is told chronologically through the compelling stories of individual lives that, linked together, provide a complete picture of the American women's experience. *America's Women* is both a great read and a landmark work of history."

Gail Collins is the editorial page editor of the New York Times and is the first woman to hold this position. Before that she was a columnist for the Times op-ed page, a member of its editorial board, and a columnist for the New York Daily News and the New York News-Day. She's also the author of Scorpion Tongues: Gossip, Celebrity and American Politics.

Homeowners' Insurance: A Primer

We all do it ... we renew our homeowners' insurance policy year after year, stuff the policy documents in a file, and don't give it another thought. Do you know what is covered and what is excluded under the terms of your policy? Do you have the right amount of coverage? Waiting until disaster strikes is not the time to find out — be a smart consumer and know your policy before you need to use it.

Types of Coverage – Texas homeowners' policies are generally some combination of five categories of coverage. Dwelling covers your home and related structures like fences and garages. Personal property covers your possessions. Liability covers you if you are sued and found to be responsible for someone else's injury. Medical pays toward the medical bills of someone hurt on your property. Loss of use pays for essentials like housing and food in the event you must move out of your home due to damage covered by your policy.

What Is Covered? Some policies are known as named perils policies because they specifically name the losses they cover; other policies are all-risk policies because they specifically name the losses they don't cover. Generally, all-risk policies cover more kinds of disasters.

In general, insurance policies cover losses caused by fire, lightning, smoke, theft, vandalism, windstorms, hurricanes and hail. Insurance policies typically do not cover losses caused by floods, earthquakes, animal pests, mold, or normal wear and tear. Flood insurance is sold as a separate policy through your insurance agent and is surprisingly affordable.

Payment of Claims – Some policies pay replacement cost, the amount you would have to pay to repair/rebuild/replace at today's costs. Other policies are actual cash value, meaning that they pay the replacement cost less depreciation based on age and condition.

How Much Is Enough? Your insurance agent can help you determine what it would cost to replace your home. You can add endorsements, or extra coverage, to your policy for an additional premium. You may need an endorsement if you own things like a pool, a pond, a trampoline, or certain dog breeds.

As far as personal property is concerned, make a written or photographic inventory of all of your possessions. Include


brand name, date and place of purchase, price, and serial/model number. You can keep the photos on a flash drive and add to them when necessary. Keep receipts to prove the cost of major purchases like furniture, electronics, jewelry, etc. Don't forget to inventory the garage!

How Are Premiums Determined? Insurance companies use a process called underwriting to determine whether to insure a home and what rate to charge for the policy. Some factors that influence your premium include the age and condition of your home, the material your home is built from, the crime statistics and storm activity in your area, your claims history, your credit score, and your home's proximity to fire protection.

Discounts – There are lots of ways to save on homeowners' insurance. Discounts are usually available if you have an alarm system, a relatively new roof, automatic fire sprinklers, a good claims record, or if your auto or other insurance policies are with the same company.

Shop Around – Insurance premiums and coverage vary from company to company, so shop around to find the right policy and the right agent. Keep in mind that your agent will be the person you look to for help in the event of a loss, so make the effort to build a positive relationship with your agent.






