

Recycling: Size Matters

Keep in mind that the grey and yellow bin we all received at the end of May from Royal Recycle & Disposal is for recycling only. Bins filled with yard waste or household trash will not be emptied by Royal. For a list of the recyclables Royal will accept in the bin, see page 5 of this issue.

We have had our bins for over a month now, and you may feel that a 96-gallon bin is too large for your family's needs or too cumbersome for easy use and/or storage. If so, call Royal at 713-526-1536. They will pick up your 96-gallon bin and replace it with the 60-gallon version.



If you are not currently using the bin, I challenge you to try it out for a week or two. There's no sorting or bagging required – just toss all recyclables in together. It is amazing how much of what is typically thrown in the trash can be recycled. Many families are finding that by Thursday, the recycle bin is full while the trash can is not, and *that* makes an impact on the environment!



As usual there will be summary and author information on each selection in upcoming newsletter issues.



OOCIA Monthly Meeting Notes

The OOCIA Board held its monthly meeting on Wednesday, June 13. About 12 residents were in attendance. Topics of discussion included the following:

- In addition to the usual Deed Restriction Notices sent out in May, 85 letters were sent to homeowners thanking them for keeping their properties so neat and tidy. Starting next month, we will feature photos of some of these top-notch yards!
- Residents Joseph Davidson and Caleb Summers were approved by the Board for volunteer service on the Architectural Control Committee (ACC). As the weather has warmed up, the ACC has received an increasing number of proposals. If you are considering improvements to the exterior of your home, visit the OO/WP webpage and click the "Architectural" tab to print a Property Improvement Request form and to view the OO/WP Architectural Standards and Guidelines.
- The Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) has ramped up in force. Committee members have made contact with business owners along Walters Road to discuss regular clean up and maintenance of their properties, security concerns, and the possible closure of the alley leading from Walters Road to Wal-Mart. The committee is also working with Precinct 4 to place new monuments at the TC Jester/Cypresswood entrance and to consider building sidewalks on TC Jester. A lot of exciting projects are in the works look for a feature article on the SPC next month.
- The Communications Committee will be developing an interactive website for OO/WP in the coming months.
 This will be your source for deed restrictions, OOCIA documents, back issues of the newsletter, helpful links, and a whole lot more.
- The OOCIA will host a Town Hall style meeting on August 8 at 6:45 p.m. Residents are encouraged to attend to ask questions and provide constructive suggestions.





A Discussion with ACMI

ACMI has now been working with Olde Oaks and Waterford Park for more than six months. Several residents have requested that we detail the deed restriction issues we see most ten as a guide to what we are looking for during an inspection.

Let me first mention that the Board and ACMI are very pleased to see the steps everyone is taking to improve their property and thereby improve the community's appearance. Every small action taken adds up to create a very positive impact on a cumulative basis.

About 20% of notices we have sent provide positive feedback to the homeowner. These notices we have issued in recognition of the significant number of owners and residents who take pride in their property and it shows.

Some of the most common items for which notices have been sent mentioning areas in need of improvement are listed below:

- Landscape Maintenance includes proper care of the lawn. replacing dead grass, mowing and edging, cleanup of debris as well as removal and replacement of dead bushes. This is the most frequently encountered issue. If the lawn is overgrown, a force-mowing notice will be issued. If plants are dead or missing, the owner will be asked to replace the plants as required to maintain the appearance of the property.
- Home Maintenance is also a frequently encountered issue. Homes needing paint, repair of shutters, replacement or repair of wood trim, repairs to the roof or gutters, fence repair, replacement of cracked drives, etc., will receive a notice asking that the necessary repairs take place.
- Garbage and Refuse Disposal Trash and recycling must be kept in proper containers, and at all times, save for Mondays and Thursdays, those containers must be stored out of view of the street. Owners with lingering refuse containers or refuse laying about their properties will receive written notice to hide containers or pick up the litter.
- Miscellaneous Issues Notices are also sent regarding issues such as basketball goals in need of repair or removal (no net, broken rim, broken or missing backboard, etc.); mailboxes that are leaning badly or need replacement or repair; and mildew stain removal from the home or mailbox. Additionally, owners are often asked to remove or relocate an inoperable vehicle or a vehicle, trailer, or boat stored on the driveway or street in front of the home.

Green to Clean for Much Less!

Update on Olde Oaks Greenbelt Preservation Association

The Olde Oaks Greenbelt Preservation Association (OOGPA) conducted a Town Hall meeting on Wednesday, June 6, which was open to all Olde Oaks homeowners. A report on the status of the greenbelt acreage of approximately 30 acres along Cypress Creek was led by Board president Bruce Ganer. (And no, Bruce does not have a twin brother. "Tom" Ganer was a misprint in last month's issue.)

This meeting had the best turnout to date. Approximately 20 homeowners were present and contributed to important discussions pertaining to future potential development plans for the acreage as a recreational facility for Olde Oaks homeowners. Emphasis was placed on addressing the need to stimulate significantly more homeowner interest and participation in the planning and approval process of any potential developments for the acreage. With approximately 1,400 homesites in Olde Oaks, it was suggested that it would be important to get at least 20% representation (280 homesites) to participate in Town Hall meetings or via the OOGPA website (www.oogpa.com) before the Board would be comfortable with making expenditures.

Rufi Natarajan spoke to several points of interest specific to detailed plans for various facilities and developments that she, as well as several other homeowners, considered desirable.

Rufi volunteered her husband, Raj Natarajan, to lend his expertise and present the OOGPA Board with a detailed plan of development including cost and timing requirements. The Board will review this plan and attempt to determine sources of funding and adherence to the rules and regulations affecting the OOGPA acreage. Following that presentation, another Town Hall meeting will be announced to solicit homeowner endorsements of, or modifications to, the proposal.

During the meeting several types of improvements were suggested, but the common theme across all three of the Town Hall meetings held in the last two years includes walking trails, park benches, a simple pavilion, and perhaps a separate biking trail. The acreage is in the floodplain, so care would need to be taken to avoid construction that would be susceptible to damage and excessive maintenance costs.

As current Board president, I don't think I can emphasize enough the importance of getting direct feedback from Olde Oaks homeowners; specifically, what do you want to see done and what will you support in spirit and in finance? Get the straight facts from us and tell us what you want. We will endeavor to get it done. Go to our website and come to future Town Hall meetings, which will be announced in the newsletter and on the website.

Are You Prepared?

Here we are in the dog days of summer ... and squarely in the middle of the Gulf Coast's hurricane season, which lasts from June 1 through November 30. Hurricane season has been uneventful in Houston since Ike in 2008. However, a little preparation on all of our parts now can save lives, money and time in the event that Houston's number is up in 2012.

For 2012, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is predicting an average season, with somewhere between 9 and 15 named storms (top winds 39 mph or more), with 4 to 8 of those storms becoming hurricanes (top winds 74 mph or more), and 1 to 3 of those hurricanes becoming category 3, 4 or 5 events (top winds 111 mph or more).

Now is the time to make a plan for your family's safety. Will you stay put and "hunker down," or will you seek refuge with relatives or at a hotel further to the north or west? What will you do with your pets? Do you have a medical condition that would make it hard to evacuate without assistance? While we all hope for the best, here are some tips to help you prepare for the worst:

- Talk to your insurance agent and make sure you understand your homeowners' coverage and the claims process before you are forced to use it. Make sure you have the proper documentation in place to substantiate the repair or replacement of household items if they are damaged or destroyed.
- If you intend to buy a portable generator or plywood for window shutters, do it now. These items become hard to find when a storm enters the Gulf.
- Make an emergency kit. Use a clean 40-gallon container to house your kit it can double as storage for non-potable water. Make sure you have some cash and change, extra clothing, shoes and rain gear, flashlights and extra batteries, battery-operated portable radio, corded telephone for your land line, small fire extinguisher, pliers, duct tape, matches, plastic storage bags or storage containers, a can opener, a pen and paper, automotive signal flares, plastic sheeting, hammer and nails or staple gun, toilet paper, disinfectant, first-aid supplies, a supply of all prescription medications, blankets and sleeping bags, diapers, wipes and formula. Make sure to store enough water to have one gallon per person for at least seven days.



- Each time you shop for groceries during hurricane season, add a couple extra items to the cart like peanut butter, crackers, tuna, granola and cereal bars, canned veggies, instant coffee and powdered drink mixes.
 - Buy a portable, waterproof storage box for important documents such as wills and powers of attorney, insurance policies, deeds, birth certificates, marriage certificates, passports, Social Security cards, a list of important phone numbers, a list of bank account numbers and companies, credit account numbers and companies, and an inventory of household items.
- If you evacuate, turn off water to your home at the main valve and shut off electricity at your breaker box. Shut off propane supplies to appliances like outdoor grills, but do not turn off your natural gas supply unless instructed to do so by local officials.
- Clear your property of all loose items like toys, building materials, flower pots, statues, bird baths, patio furniture, bicycles and trash cans. These objects can become projectiles in high winds.
- Leave your swimming pool filled. Securely cover the pump, filtration system and intakes with plastic sheeting.


Fine Arts Contest and Sale


