Trash Talk 2.0

The OOCIA Board recently voted to change trash removal contractors, thereby saving the community nearly \$80,000 for the year. Beginning on May 1, 2012, Royal Recycle & Disposal trucks, instead of Republic Waste Services trucks, will be trundling up and down our streets. Because waste removal comprises nearly one-third of our community's annual budget, it is important to understand and utilize the services we are offered. Here's the scoop:

Pickup Days – Mondays and Thursdays, except for New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

- Setting Out Trash Do not set trash out any earlier than
 7 a.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays. This is a deed restriction!
- Backdoor Service Workers will not collect trash from behind your gate or fence, but instead of lugging household trash to the curb, please place your household trash container in an easily accessible spot on the driveway near the side of your house or garage door. This not only reduces the incidence of trash being blown over by a rogue wind or strewn along your yard or curb by a hungry animal, but also helps make our community look clean and neat.
- Yard Waste Leaves and clippings should be bagged and placed by the curb for collection. Pruned limbs should be bundled into 4-foot lengths. Bundles should be no heavier than 40 lbs.

- Heavy Trash Heavy trash (i.e., construction debris, old patio furniture, defunct appliances) is picked up on Thursdays. Like yard waste, it should be placed at the curb. This is limited to one item per week per home. Call Royal at 713-526-1536 to make arrangements for additional items.
- Recycling Place all recyclables in the designated bin at curbside. Recycling is picked up on Thursdays. Rinse out all food containers and break down all cardboard boxes before placing them in your bin. Please see page 3 for a handy chart of what Royal will take. Cut it out and tape it to the inside of your bin for future reference.
- Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Items such as household cleaners, paint and paint-related products, yard/automotive products, batteries, tires, aerosol containers, small propane cylinders, and mercury-containing items (e.g., thermometers, CFLs and fluorescent tubes) can be disposed of at the Harris County HHW Facility located at 6900 Hahl Road, Houston 77040 (Hwy. 290 and Gessner area) on Wednesdays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and the second Saturday of each month from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Call 281-560-6200 for more information. You can also check out www.Earth911.com for other facilities that accept specialized waste.

Discussion With ACMI

Let me continue this month with a discussion of issues that can impact the appearance of the neighborhood and related property values. Last month I discussed three aspects: (1) How do the entrances appear? (2) Does the community have an overall positive appearance? and (3) How do the individual homes and grounds appear? Finally, everyone was challenged to take a walk around their home and look for details that need attention and then take action. In our late February inspection we saw significant improvement; however, there are still a very significant number of areas of "opportunity."

This month I want to continue with a discussion of relatively common issues that detract from the appearance of some homes and steps the owner/resident can (and should) take to improve that appearance.

• Many owners and/or residents have not taken steps to control winter weeds. The result is many properties have become overgrown with weeds and present a very negative appearance. In late January and early February, 56 force-mow notices were sent to owners whose lawns were weed-ridden. The notice apparently helped – more than 30 of the properties were mown prior to the visit by the landscaper. The Association did, however, end up mowing 22 properties. This force-mow program will be continued. We hope there will be a general positive response with owners treating lawns with pre- and post-

emergent herbicides both this year and next so weeds do not reappear. Mowing during the winter months can keep weeds from going to seed, and it is far easier to control weeds before they sprout than once they go to seed.

- Mildew is out of control on some homes. In some cases
 it appears mildew has grown uncontrolled for several years.
 We will ask the OOCIA Board for approval to institute
 a special initiative on mildew growth on the homes,
 mailboxes, walks and driveways. In Houston, power-washing
 with an algaecide at least once a year is required if your
 home has any damp, shady area where mildew thrives.
- Mailboxes need attention, especially those on wooden supports. As many as 30% of the community's mailboxes are in urgent need of replacement or repair, and in their current condition, they detract significantly from the appearance of the home and the community.

Again, let me urge you to please take a few minutes to walk around your home and take a critical look for details that need attention. Then get out the power washer, buy a new mailbox and take other action to make your home present a more positive appearance to visitors as well as to assist in increasing the value of the Olde Oaks and Waterford Park neighborhoods.



Spring Spruce Up



Trees and bushes are in leaf. Bird song issues from the tops of our majestic trees. Lawn mower engines buzz in the distance like giant bees. There is no escaping it: Spring is upon us. As the weather gets warmer, spend an hour at your local plant nursery — I'll bet you won't come home empty-handed!

Lawn Maintenance – Now is the time to fertilize. Look for products with the general ratio 3-1-2 (for example, 15-5-10). The numbers tell you the ratio of nitrogen to phosphorus to potassium in the mix. Use a broadcast or drop spreader and follow the application instructions on the bag. Got leftovers? Don't worry – you'll use it again in late summer. If you have the me bare spots in your lawn, purchase St. Augustine plugs

and place them every 12 inches. Water them in, and they will have meshed together by mid-season. Mow, trim, and edge – the community deed restrictions require it!

Watering – Turn on and cycle your irrigation system. Replace broken sprinkler heads and make sure the heads are spraying where you want them to spray – not on your foundation, windows or driveway. Watering rates are unique to every different yard, so ask a professional for advice on how long and how often to water. In general, you want to keep your plants wet for the least amount of time possible. Watering just before sunrise, when plants are already wet from dew and will quickly dry in the morning sun, is the optimal time. This also reduces evaporative loss and doesn't give fungus a chance to start. If you don't have an automatic rain sensor shutoff, hit the "off" button when rain chances are high.

Trees – Harris County and the surrounding counties lost or will lose an estimated 66 million trees due to last summer's drought. This is about 10% of the total tree population. If one or more of these trees is on your property, have it removed. For living trees, remove dead branches or any that touch your house – this can be a pathway for pests as well as a hazard in high winds or storms.

Shrubs and Flower Beds – If you are unsure whether shrubs and bushes will come back after last summer's brutal heat, scrape the bark with your thumbnail. If you uncover (continued on next page)

green, the plant is still viable. If not, it is time to remove and replace. Rake out beds to remove dead leaves. Trim and/or prune bushes to tidy their appearance.

For sunny spots, consider juniper, sky-pencil holly or pittosporum. Plumbago and lantana are flowering options. Stands of iris sport elegant flowers in the spring and their lance-like leaves look great all year round.

For shadier areas, look for camellias, azaleas, gardenias or ferns. Variegated ginger is a stunning plant that does well in sun or shade and is drought-tolerant. Groundcovers are a low-maintenance way to add a manicured look. Vinca and verbena work well in sunny beds, while impatiens, begonias, coleus, caladium, and hypoestes prefer shade. Once you've cleaned out the beds and set your plants, add mulch to a depth of several inches. Mulch not only gives a neat, professional appearance, but also retains moisture in the soil beneath and retards the growth of weeds.

Potted Flowers — Nothing brightens up your property like flowers. Flank your front door or walkway with a couple of pots of seasonal color. Nurseries have some fabulous pre-planted pots — just add water. If you are more adventurous, make your own: Pick one upright spiky plant, one with tiny flowers, and pot them together with a third flowering plant that will trail over the pot's edges. Have fun with texture and color. Some plants to try: blue daze, licorice, impatiens, geraniums, petunias, Aztec grass,



OOCIA Monthly Meeting Notes

The OOCIA Board held its monthly meeting on Wednesday, March 14. About 20 residents were in attendance. Some of the topics of discussion included the following:

- Irrigation and water meter installation on eight cul-de-sacs has been completed. Landscaping will be the next step.
- 315 delinquency notices regarding the OOCIA 2012 annual assessment were sent out in March. Did you know that you can start making payments toward your 2013 assessment now? Paying \$55 per month to ACMI is a budget-friendly way to get your assessment out of the way!
- The Board has implemented an aggressive forced yard-mowing program. Mow, trim and edge on a regular basis to avoid a letter from the Board and potential fees for forced mowing.
- The beautification of the entrance monuments on Walters, Pebble Bend, Brightwood and Terrace Oaks was discussed - to restore the community's image, we need to work in conjunction with businesses and neighbors on the entrance streets. More information will be forthcoming.
- The Board voted to refurbish the sign boards on Walters, Pebble Bend, Brightwood and T.C. Jester.
- The Mosquito Control contract was reviewed. The Board voted to stay with Cypress Creek Pest Control. Fogging should begin around April 1.
- The trash collection contract was reviewed. The Board voted to change to Royal Recycle & Disposal. We will





keep our current level of service, including backdoor pickup, twice weekly service, heavy trash collection, but will gain an expanded recycle program.

- The Champions Printing contract was reviewed and renewed. Champions prints our monthly newsletter.
- The Board's bylaws allow the appointment of a Deputy Treasurer. Steve Hatcher was selected for the position and will assist Board Treasurer Linda Faulkner in putting together an investment policy proposal for the Board's review.

As springtime leads to planting season, it is important to be mindful of our furry friends during the plant selection process. While there are thousands of species of plants and flowers, only a small

percentage of them are truly poisonous to your pet. If you have pets, make sure you know which plants are most dangerous.

Outlined below is partial list of the most common and most deadly household and garden plants for pets. Ingesting even a small amount of the plant's seed or its leaves can cause severe reactions, such as vomiting, dehydration, kidney or liver failure, or even lead to death.

> Autumn crocus, azalea, cyclamen, kalanchoe, lilies, oleander, dieffenbachia, daffodils, Lily of the Valley, sago palm, tulips and hyacinths

If you suspect your pet has ingested any of these plants or any other questionable substance, call your veterinarian, SPCA or the Pet Poison Helpline for immediate assistance. Accurate and timely identification of the suspected substance is very important. Having the container, package, or label in hand wi save valuable time and may save your pet's life.






The Butterfly Project


