


JOANNA WRIGHT



NHCRWA Water Rate Pass-Through Increases

Effective April 2018, the North Harris County Regional Water Authority (NHCRWA) pass-through fee on your water bill increased by 50¢ per 1,000 gallons used. The NHCRWA rate is mandated, assessed annually and has increased significantly. However it's important to note our local MUD (Bammel UD, MUD #20 and MUD #44) tiered water rates have remained constant for years. The increase in cost impacts both our community landscaping expenditures and your individual home water bills. While the Board continues to work on reducing our shared water costs, here are some tips for you at home.


It seems like cruel irony to be inundated with too much water and suffer flood effects while simultaneously getting clobbered with ever increasing water costs. But that is the reality. So if you favor trying to save money, take a hard look at how you use water and take measures to conserve. Some suggestions for landscape irrigation include: check irrigation timing systems, hydro zone, fix leaks promptly, integrate water barrels, complete watering cycle before 4 a.m., utilize the "cycle and soak" technique, eliminate overspray. Naturally it would also pay to favor hardier, less water guzzling plants, and perhaps even work on reducing your "watering needed" landscape design to begin with.

Mindful household water usage include: shorter shower times, not running water while brushing teeth and such, investigate mini-water heaters at key points to get hot water quicker, efficient full loads for clothes and dishwashers, replacing old toilets with water efficient ones, etc. When you go on vacation consider turning off water at sinks and toilets as even tiny leaks and running toilets will add up to big water bills during your absence.
