# Heat-Related Health Dangers for Older Adults Soar During the Summer

### ***NIH Tips Help Reduce Risk of Hyperthermia.***

As we age, our ability to adequately respond to summer heat can become a serious problem. Older people are at significant increased risk of heat-related illnesses, known collectively as hyperthermia, during the summer months. Hyperthermia can include heat stroke, heat edema (swelling in your ankles and feet when you get hot), heat syncope (sudden dizziness after exercising in the heat), heat cramps, and heat exhaustion.

Experts at the National Institute on Aging, part of the National Institutes of Health, say knowing which health-related factors may increase risk could save a life. Those factors include:

- Age-related changes to the skin such as poor blood circulation and inefficient sweat glands
- Heart, lung, and kidney diseases, as well as any illness that causes general weakness or fever
- High blood pressure or other conditions that require changes in diet, such as salt-restricted diets
- Reduced sweating, caused by medications such as diuretics, sedatives, tranquilizers, and certain heart and blood pressure drugs

- Taking several drugs for various conditions (It is important, however, to continue to take prescribed medication and discuss possible problems with a physician.)
- Being substantially overweight or underweight
- Drinking alcoholic beverages
- Being dehydrated

Lifestyle factors can also increase risk, including extremely hot living quarters, lack of transportation, overdressing, visiting overcrowded places, and not understanding how to respond to weather conditions.

Older people, particularly those at special risk, should stay indoors on particularly hot and humid days, especially when there is an air pollution alert in effect. To stay cool, drink plenty of fluids and wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothes in natural fabrics. People without fans or air conditioners should keep their homes as cool as possible or go someplace cool. Senior centers, religious groups, and social service organizations in many communities provide cooling centers when the temperatures rise. Or visit public air conditioned places such as shopping malls, movie theaters, or libraries.

Heat stroke is a severe form of hyperthermia that occurs when the body is overwhelmed by heat and unable to control its temperature. Someone with a body temperature above 104 degrees Fahrenheit is likely suffering from heat stroke. Symptoms include fainting; a change in behavior (confusion, combativeness, staggering, possible delirium or coma); dry, flushed skin and a strong, rapid pulse; and lack of sweating. Seek immediate medical attention for a person with any of these symptoms, especially an older adult.

If you suspect that someone is suffering from a heat-related illness:

- Call 911 if you suspect heat stroke.
- Get the person out of the heat and into a shady, air-conditioned or other cool place. Urge them to lie down.
- If the person can swallow safely, offer fluids such as water and fruit or vegetable juices, but not alcohol or caffeine.
- Apply a cold, wet cloth to the wrists, neck, armpits, and groin. These are places where blood passes close to the surface of the skin, and a cold cloth can help cool the blood.
- Encourage the person to shower, bathe, or sponge off with cool water if it is safe to do so.

### Attend the Monthly OOCIA Board Meetings

When was the last time you attended a monthly Olde Oaks Community Improvement Association Board Meeting? # Book Club “Footnotes”



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


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# The Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Arts

## My Hero! Exhibition, Summer Camps Through August 17

The Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Arts is delighted to announce its Summer 2019 exhibition: *My Hero! Contemporary Art & Superhero Action*, as well as its *Heroes and Villains* themed summer art camps.

With more than 130 pieces, *My Hero!* is a “POW-erful” exhibition for all ages that is being presented exclusively at the Pearl Fincher Museum of Fine Arts this summer, for Houston-area residents to enjoy. The exhibition explores

what it means to be a superhero and celebrates the possibilities when you have a magic cape, lasso, or superhuman power. This intriguing collection features work by contemporary artists from around the world, in a variety of media including sculpture, printmaking, and photography.

The exhibition includes a series of photographs by Dulce Pinzón of Brooklyn, NY, depicting the lives of immigrants as society’s superheroes, such as an image of Catwoman working as a nanny, and Superman delivering pizzas on his trusty bike. Several artists ponder what happens to superheroes when they get older, and San Francisco artist Lizabeth Eva Rossof created a 6’ 7” tall, 420-pound statue of Batman as a historic Terracotta Warrior.

Fans will recognize their favorite superheroes in the exhibition, including Superman, Spider-Man, Batman, Robin, Captain America, Wonder Woman, Supergirl, Catwoman, Hulk, Iron Man and more—in “out-of-the-box” new and interesting ways.

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Arts through August 17. The exhibition is made possible in part through generous gifts from The Hamill Foundation and Houston Federal Credit Union.

## Architectural Control Committee Guidelines

As a reminder, homeowners planning to make improvements to the exterior of their home or elsewhere on the property must obtain written approval prior to beginning work on the modifications from the Architectural Control Committee (ACC). This includes painting and repainting of siding, trim, brick, front door, etc. even if repainting the home with the same colors. The goal of the ACC is to serve both you and the community by determining that your finished improvement will comply with the Deed Restrictions and Architectural Guidelines and enhance the value of your property and our neighborhood. Approval is not required for plans to remodel, paint, or otherwise alter the interior of a home.

The criteria followed by the ACC in making its decisions are outlined in the Deed Restrictions and the Architectural Standards and Guidelines, copies of which can be viewed or downloaded by going to the community website at [www.oocia.org/governing-documents](http://www.oocia.org/governing-documents). You can complete the online application, download an application to mail in with support, as well as obtain further guidance prior to completing your request for ACC review at [www.oocia.org/architectural-control](http://www.oocia.org/architectural-control).
