### Community Garage Sale - continued from cover

- Position yourself where your neighbors can see you from the street as they drive by.
- Keep your cash close. A money belt, fanny pack or small cross body purse works well.
- Always keep a cell phone with you.

If you are not participating in the community sale make sure that you keep your garage doors and gates locked regardless of whether you are home or away. Don't leave things out that might attract criminal attention and can be quickly grabbed. Be watchful for your neighbors. This is just good everyday advice and even more so when there is extra activity in the area.

As always, report suspicious activity to the non-emergency Sheriff's number at 713-221-6000 and emphasize Olde Oaks/WP has a deputy contract. Program that number in your cell phone for quick dial!

### After the Community Garage Sale

Whether or not you participated in the community sale but went through the trouble of pulling things together, less clutter is good so don't lose ground. Consider extending your effort to keep that stuff from creeping back in. There are many nearby options to donate items and many venues to sell, such as eBay, Nextdoor, Facebook and consignment shops.

Some groups or nearby churches may be accepting items for their fall and holiday events. For example nearby St. Ignatius usually accepts "nice" items for their Fall Festival (October 1-2) silent auction baskets and rummage sale, so drop-offs will probably be getting accepted right after our community sale (https://ignatiusloyola.org). This is just one venue very nearby that comes to mind. You can check websites and dates for other organization-related opportunities and be sure to share them on Nextdoor.

# **Increase in Monthly Telephone Bills**


Effective August 1, 2022, telephone customers may notice an increase in their monthly bills due to a recent court order requiring the Public Utility Commission of Texas



(PUC) to fully fund the Texas Universal Service Fund (TUSF). A recent court order now requires the PUC to take steps to fully fund the TUSF, paying back more than \$200 million owed to rural telecommunications providers. In response, the PUC increased the TUSF assessment rate from 3.3% to 24% for all phone customers in the state – both urban and rural – to collect the money it owes. In lieu of charging the maximum 24%, your voice telecommunications provider can elect to raise it to various percents; 24% is the maximum it can be raised. The actual amount is at the discretion of your carrier.

# Book Club "Footnotes"

The book we'll discuss is *West With Giraffes* by Lynda Rutledge. Two giraffes survive a major hurricane in 1938 while crossing the Atlantic. 

# Time to Grow!

*Let's begin again!* September marks a new beginning as the extreme heat subsides, our energy is renewed and our plants are ready to grow again! Time to get out and garden!

Weed and prep first. It's time to weed and fertilize your vard and garden! Purchase mulch, fertilizer and my newest favorite, decomposed granite! It's cheap, helps break up our gumbo soil and holds and releases water when needed! I'm in love! The big sales usually start in September and you can plant/feed/mulch at the same time, saving you even more hard work and money! Get up early, get out your shovel, hoe, spade, gloves, sun hat and knee pads or gardening stool and get to it. Great exercise and a cathartic stress reliever! I'm a much nicer person after I have been weeding! For weeding areas like sidewalks, driveways and bed/lawn edges, use a mixture of 1/2 cup salt, 1 cup vinegar, and 2 cups water to kill the weeds. Use a squeeze bottle rather than a spray bottle for precision. Just don't use it near plants! As always, I suggest organic fertilizer and compost so as not to burn the precious life-giving microbes in our soil, leaving it depleted, dry and in need of even more water. It's a true time and money saver!

**Plan to plant.** If you're thinking of planting new trees and shrubs, now is the time! Now through the beginning of

November is a safe bet as the heat is no longer a factor and plants thrive in the moderate temperatures with water and food. Remember to plan ahead before going to the nursery by taking pictures of your beds so that you will have an idea of just what to plant and where. Choose tall plants for the back graduating to short plants in the front. Choose native species and those that have proven to survive our winters and summers. You may think that knockout roses are a good bet, think again; they don't have the aroma or beauty of traditional roses and though prolific, their blooms fade and drop quickly and they die easily.

**Plant flowers:** phlox, snapdragons, primroses, lobelia, alyssum, dianthus, mums, petunias, crotons, pentas, periwinkles, and dusty miller.

**Feed the birds:** Plant turk's cap, hamellia, shrimp plant, firespike, salvia, lobelia (cardinal flower), Mexican oregano, Pride of Barbados, anisacanthus, and cigar plants.

# **Understanding Your Water Bill and Water Saving Tips**

Your standard water bill for MUD #44 is going to be around \$58. MUD #44's sewer bill is \$40 a month (a set fee that includes the trash fee from Texas Pride Disposal). The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) fee is minuscule-just a few cents. The Northwest Harris County Regional Water Authority (NHCRWA) fees are the highest expenditure on your water bill. The North Harris County Regional Water Authority fee increases annually and it goes into effect April 1 each year. This fee is currently charged at a rate of \$5.56 per 1,000 gallons. More information on the NHCRWA and their programs is on their website, www.nhcrwa.org.



The NHCRWA assesses a fee for both groundwater and surface water usage by residents. This fee is used by the NHCRWA to fund projects intended to reduce regional subsidence and to meet legislatively-mandated surface water conversion goals. Your Municipal Utility District does not set this fee and has no control over it. This fee will fluctuate depending upon your water usage during the respective billing period.

Both MUD #20 and MUD #44 have smart meters and you can sign up and access the eye on water app at https://eyeonwater.com to keep an eye on your water usage.



### Tips for saving on your water bill:

- When watering your lawn a general rule is that, in the absence of normal rainfall, you should provide 1 inch of water per week. To learn how much water comprises 1 inch, the next time you water, put a couple of flat-bottomed pans or tuna fish cans at various distances from the sprinkler. Time how long it takes to get 1 inch. From then on, you will know how long to water. Watering for longer periods, fewer days a week (rather than short daily watering) allows the water to soak in longer, strengthening the grass roots. Watering early in the morning (before 10 a.m.) allows the water to soak in before the sun comes up and burns it all off or the water evaporates without benefiting the lawn. The worst time to water is after dark. Watering after dark soaks the lawn overnight; and a soggy lawn invites fungus and other diseases to invade your grass.
- Limit vehicle washing and power washing.
- **Repair leaks and drips** of indoor faucets, toilets and irrigation systems.
- Adjust sprinkler heads to avoid over spraying onto pavement.
- Do full loads in the dishwasher and the washer.
- When filling your pool or spa, make sure to turn off the water before it overflows.
- Limit shower times. A one- to two-minute shorter shower can save 700 gallons per month.

# **Voluntary Water Use Restrictions**

Olde Oaks and Waterford Park have been under voluntary water restrictions (Drought Stage 1) effective June 28, 2022. As of the submission date of this article to the printer, I don't know if the restrictions will still be in effect in September. If conditions should worsen, you will be notified of more stringent restrictions. Voluntary water use restrictions include, but are not limited to the following:

- Irrigation is limited to the hours of 7 p.m. and 5 a.m. on (i) Sundays and Thursdays for customers with an address ending in an even address number (ii) Saturdays and Wednesdays for water restrictions with a street address ending in an odd number and (iii) Tuesdays and Fridays for all other customers.
- Use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle is prohibited except on designated watering days between the hours of 7 p.m. and 5 a.m. Such washing, when allowed, shall be done with a hand-held bucket or a hand-held hose equipped with a positive shutoff nozzle for quick rinses. Vehicle washing

may be done at any time on the immediate premises of a commercial car wash or commercial service station.

- Use of water to fill, refill or add to any swimming pools, wading pools or Jacuzzi-type pools is prohibited except on designated water days between the hours of 7 p.m. and 5 a.m.
- Operation of any ornamental fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes is prohibited except where necessary to support aquatic life or where such fountains or ponds are equipped with a re-circulation system.
- Customers are requested to check for, and repair all leaks, dripping faucets, and running toilets.
  - »The following uses of water are defined as non-essential and prohibited:
  - »Wash down of any sidewalks, walkways, driveways, parking lots or other hard-surfaced areas;
  - »Use of water to wash down buildings or structures for purposes other than immediate fire protection;
  - »Flushing gutters or permitting water to run or accumulate in any gutter or street; and
  - »Failure to repair a controllable leak(s) within a reasonable period after having been given notice directing the repair of such leak(s).

The summer months can be uncomfortable to both you and your pet. The heat and humidity affect our furry friends in very similar ways to humans. We can help keep your pets safe and cool during the hot summer months.

Never leave pets unattended in a parked car... not even for a minute! On a warm day temperatures can reach dangerous levels quickly. Even on a mild summer day, interior car temperatures can rise up to 116 degrees in 10 minutes, even with the windows cracked open and parked under shade. This can lead to heat stroke and is considered illegal in several states.

### Headed outside with your pet during the summer?

Try early morning runs or evening times at a dog park. Look for areas with lots of grass and shade and close to a water source for plenty of hydration! The bottom of dog's paws are very sensitive to heat. Asphalt and concrete temperatures increase during the heat of the day, sometimes upwards of 60 degrees over the outside temperature... This can lead to pets burning the pads of their feet on the heated surface, much like when humans touch a hot pan. Ouch!

**Hydration, hydration, hydration!** Our pets need plenty of water on a normal day. Be sure your animals are well hydrated when kept outside. While dog houses are great for those colder winter months or rainy weather, during the summer they don't provide much ventilation and often trap in more heat. Make sure your outdoor pets have a covered area with lots of comfy grass, airflow, and water.

**High humidity can have an effect on dogs too.** Canines pant to evaporate moisture in their lungs which removes heat from their body. If the humidity is high, they are unable to cool themselves and their temperature can skyrocket very quickly.

Watch for signs of heatstroke: heavy panting or breathing, glazed eyes, rapid heartbeat, difficulty breathing, excessive thirst, lethargy, fever, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, seizure, and

unconsciousness. If you notice any of these symptoms, please call your veterinarian or go to your nearest animal emergency clinic. Senior pets, puppies, overweight pets, or pets with heart or respiratory conditions are more at risk for heat stroke. Certain breeds like Oxers, Pugs, Shih Tzus and other dogs and cats with short muzzles have a harder time breathing in extreme heat and are also at greater risk.

If your pet suffers a heat stroke move them into the shade or air conditioning. Apply ice packs or cold towels to their head, neck, and chest or run cool room temperature water over them. Let them drink small amounts of water and call your veterinarian.

If you have a thick double coated dog breed such as Siberian Husky, Akita, Shiba Inu, or Bernese Mountain Dogs, you may be worried they will overheat with all that fur... You may even be tempted to shave them, but don't worry! Their coats are specifically designed to keep warm in the winter and cool in the summer. They naturally lose their undercoat when the weather starts to warm up. This lets the guard hairs stand up and allows for the air to circulate near the skin and shades them from the sun's harsh rays. It can take up to two years after a double coated dog is shaved for their shedding cycle to get back to normal.

**Summer months can be fun for both you and your pets!** You can make DIY "pupsicles" for them to enjoy on a hot day! Many boarding facilities or dog parks offer water play days and splash pads. Dogs love to splash and play in the water too! So, lather up on the sunscreen, bring plenty of water, and a picnic blanket and enjoy a hot summer day safely with you and your pet!

# Be A Considerate Pet Owner

Don't let your dog bark for hours. Your dog will be happier and your neighbors will really appreciate this! Please make sure your fence is secure so your pets don't escape your yard.

Please be considerate and pick up your dog's poop when walking your dog. No one wants to step in dog poop!

Please remember your pets and **don't** leave them in your hot vehicle. If it's too hot for you to sit in your car without air-conditioning, it's too hot for them. At this time of year, the sidewalks can be hot, so don't expect your dog to be able to take very long walks comfortably midday.

Make sure your pet has a form of ID on their collar with your contact information. Key tags are available cheap at most hardware stores and work fine for pet IDs. A rabies tag is a great ID, but many veterinarians are not contactable 24/7 and the finder may not be able to keep your pet for several days.

If you have your pet microchipped, make sure you register on their database and keep your information current. Pets have been found wandering around the neighborhood and, when taken to the veterinarian, they found out they were microchipped but the information was obsolete, thus making it harder to contact the owner.

Have a current picture of your pet and, if lost, post the picture and contact information on websites such as Nextdoor.com and pawboost.com.


