





Let's Go Native!

Well, this has been quite a year – a long drought, some rain, and more drought! Many folks are considering replacing some of their yards with hardy native plant species in order to reduce costly watering, fertilizing, lawn maintenance and pollution, yes, pollution! The great news is that there is plenty to choose from as most nurseries are providing more varieties of native species than ever before.

The average homeowner spends 30% of their water bill on their yards! Commercial and imported grasses have shallow root systems while native grasses have deeper roots and can sustain droughts. And according to PBS editor, Justin Stabely, the overuse of commercial fertilizers has created an excess of nitrogen which ends up in our bodies of water causing algae blooms. According to the EPA gas-powered mowers and leaf blowers produce a whopping 242 million tons of pollutants, 29% of all global carbon monoxide and 4% of all global carbon dioxide emissions annually! And to add to the problem, these grass lawns don't contribute to the diet of local wildlife or pollinating insects.

So, what's a homeowner to do? Nothing drastic! Replacing your entire lawn isn't necessarily the answer but reducing the size of your lawn, gradually replacing areas with native grasses, shrubs, plants and flowers can be a fun and ongoing project for you and your family. Start with an area of your lawn where you can create an oasis of natives with native grass borders or ground cover. There are so many wonderful online examples of folks who gradually converted areas of their yards. Less work, cost, water, fertilizer and more beauty! If you build it, the pollinators will come!

Here are some resources to get you started or visit a local nursery for suggestions.

The Native Plant Society of Texas promotes the conservation and use of native plants and provides educational resources/workshops for homeowners, npsot.org/wp/tnpw, or Landscaping with Native Texas Plants on Facebook.

Top 15 Suggested Texas Native Plants:

Shade: Turks cap, American beautyberry, rock rose; **Full sun:** Esperanza, cenizo, flame acanthus, mealy blue, sage salvia; **Ground cover:** Frog fruit, wooly stemodia; **Flower beds:** Fall aster, cora vinca, autumn sage, frostweed, Gregg's mistflower, cora vinca, gaura lindheimeri; **Trees:** Native texas oaks and pecans; **Berry trees:** Yaupon holly or possumhaw holly; **Flowering trees:** Texas mountain laurel, retama, Texas redbud, huisache.

Get cuttings from friends and neighbors.

Many of these species can be seeded or rooted from cuttings.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace "NO KID SLEEPS ON THE FLOOR IN OUR TOWN"

On December 17 and 24, approximately 30 delivery teams of the all-volunteer organization, Sleep in Heavenly Peace-TX Houston Northwest Chapter, will deliver 110 beds to kids 3 to 17 years of age who have no bed of their own – free of charge. By the end of 2022, SHP Houston Northwest volunteers will have built and delivered a milestone number of over 2,500 beds, serving over 900 families in North Houston. Bed components are assembled in the clients' homes and are fully furnished with all new mattresses, pillows, sheets, and comforters – specifically chosen for each child, based on age and gender.

Sleep in Heavenly Peace-TX Houston NW was established in mid-2018, by Olde Oaks residents, Gary and Nikki Akin. The local chapter is one of over 300 chapters in the U.S. and Canada affiliated with the national, non-profit organization, Sleep in Heavenly Peace, Inc. Since the beginning of SHP, Inc. in 2012, its chapters have delivered over 100,000 beds!

The bed components are built by volunteers at the SHP workshop located on the campus of theMet Church on Jones Road. No experience is needed and volunteers are needed and welcomed. For information, contact Gary at gary.akin@shpbeds.org. Bedding for each bed delivered is specifically chosen by the Bedding Angels. Donations of child-friendly bedding sets (comforter, sheet set) for kiddos 3-17 are always needed and welcomed. 



Controlling Water on Your Property

Controlling water flow around your property will add to the longevity and structural integrity of your home – protecting your investment for years to come. It is also critical to maintain your landscaping, and preserve your foundation. This article will discuss things on the exterior of your home. Look for a future article on controlling moisture on the interior of your home.

Eliminate Standing Water

Eliminating standing water helps to prevent mosquitoes from breeding. Consider replacing stagnant water vessels like birdbaths with fountains that will continuously recirculate the water.

French Drains

French drains can be very helpful if you have standing water in your yard. A French drain is a trench filled with a perforated pipe and gravel that allows water to drain naturally from your yard. Though the name implies some sort of connection to France, you may be surprised to learn that the French drain was named for a man, rather than after the country. According to *The Washington Post*, the French drain was popularized by Henry Flagg French, a Massachusetts lawyer.

Drains

People rarely use real French drains. Instead people will bury a pipe in the ground, connected to a grated drain in a low spot in your yard with the pipe running into the street. You can see where people have cemented the exit pipe into the curb. This is the most common form of drainage system in our neighborhood. The trick is to angle the pipe in such a way that the water naturally drains into the street. You want to make sure you do not install the drain on an easement. The drain should not be tapped into the sewer line. Depending on the size of your yard and the scale of your drainage issue, you can purchase the pipes and equipment to create a drain yourself, but it's not a bad idea to hire a professional.

Swales or Valleys

Swales or valleys are an alternative to French drains/drains. Swales are shallow ditches that do not contain pipes. You can usually find them along a property's edge, following the natural grade of the land to direct runoff to ditches or wooded areas.

Berms


Berms are another alternative. A berm is a rounded mound of soil or dirt built upon an otherwise level patch of land. The rounded character of a berm is what distinguishes it from a raised bed, which has a flat surface. One reason to build a berm is to improve drainage for plants that do not like wet soil. A berm can also be a good way to improve poor soil.

Sprinkler Heads

I often see sprinkler heads watering the pavement. If possible, try and find out the brand of the sprinkler head (such as Rainbird) then look for a video on the Internet on how to adjust your sprinkler heads to save water (and money). If a sprinkler head is broken, take the old one to a hardware store to find the exact match. If you are considering putting in a sprinkler, be sure and ask for a diagram that shows where the waterlines, electrical lines and zones are placed. This will help when you have digging or other work done in your yard.

Downspouts

Extend roof downspouts away from the house and foundation. Ideally, the extensions should take rainwater at least 10 feet away from the house.



Native Plants

Another suggestion is to replace lawn areas with native plants such as shrubs and wildflowers. These tend to develop more extensive root systems that take in and hold water much better than lawns. As an added bonus, they require less maintenance than a lawn does. Lawns are not particularly effective at absorbing and retaining water, especially during our heavy rains.

Rain Barrels

Rain barrels collect rain and can be used to water your plants and yard inexpensively. These will need to be kept out of sight of the street.

Water damage due to a neighbor's actions – or inactions – may lead to considerable and costly issues for adjoining neighbors. If your neighbor alters their property in a way that causes excess water to run onto your property (such as a pool with insufficient drainage), other than might otherwise occur naturally, you may have some recourse to recover for that damage. Be sure and check with our HOA for ACC approval before making any exterior improvements.


