#### The Birth of Jesus Christ

2 In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. <sup>2</sup>This was the first registration when[a] Quirinius was governor of Syria. <sup>3</sup> And all went to be registered, each to his own town. <sup>4</sup> And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, <sup>5</sup> to be registered with Mary, his betrothed,[b] who was with child. <sup>6</sup> And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth. <sup>7</sup> And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

<sup>8</sup> And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. <sup>9</sup> And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. <sup>10</sup> And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. <sup>11</sup> For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. <sup>12</sup> And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger." <sup>13</sup> And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying,

14 "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

<sup>15</sup> When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." <sup>16</sup> And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. <sup>17</sup> And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. <sup>18</sup> And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. <sup>19</sup> But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. <sup>20</sup> And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.











#### Kindergarten



#### Introduction to the Arts Classes

The children have enjoyed working on their art projects that were influenced by such artists as Dale Chihuly and Vincent Van Gogh. We are now turning our attention to the artwork of Charles Pratt.

Charles "Charlie" Pratt, of the Cheyenne-Arapaho tribe in Oklahoma, was an award-winning, self-taught American Indian sculptor and metalsmith. The Indian Arts and Crafts Association named Charles Pratt its artist of the year in 1985 and 2004, and he received its lifetime achievement honor in 2002. He earned more than 400 awards during his career, and his work is in private and public collections around the world. One of his sculptures was on view in the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building during the 1995 bombing. The wood and metal piece survived and is displayed in the administrative offices of the Oklahoma City National Memorial.

Ms. McNair and I are enjoying the children and their introduction to the arts. What a blessing it is to see the twinkle in their eyes when they share and tell about the artwork that they made!



#### What is Advent?


The church divides the year into different seasons that emphasize the life of Christ and the life of the church. Beginning on Sunday, December 1, 2024, we will enter the season of the church year called Advent. Advent is the season of preparation and anticipation leading up to Christmas and continuing to Epiphany January 6, 2025.

The focus of Advent is two-fold. On the one hand, we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who came into the world as both God and Man so that our sins might be forgiven. On the other hand, we anticipate the day when Jesus will return to Earth and bring an end to this world. Those will be scary days, but we can look forward to the end of the world with hope because through faith in Jesus, the end of this world will mean the beginning of a new life with Christ for eternity.

Advent, then, is a time for us to repent and believe. Knowing that Jesus was born to forgive our sins, we repent (admit our failures to God) and believe that we are forgiven because of the death and resurrection of Jesus on our behalf. Also, knowing that Jesus is coming back, we repent and believe that when He returns, He will give us eternal life.

## Raising Our Children in the Faith

Following a recent bout of minor illness, we found ourselves working through a collection of mathematics worksheets, reading comprehension pages, and spelling lists with our first-grade daughter. We came to an exercise that asked about our family's holiday traditions. Our daughter recalled that our family's Christmas tradition is to go to church on Christmas Day. Thanks be to God.

Bringing little ones to church week after week is not always easy. In fact, at times, it is downright difficult. Has everyone had breakfast? Are my pants ironed? Where are my son's dress shoes? They are lost again...

Reading devotions at home brings similar challenges. There is homework to be completed. Dinner dishes to be washed. Instruments to be practiced. Emails to be returned. The list goes on...

Yet, God has trusted these little souls to our care for their time here on earth. The psalmist tells us in Psalm 145:4, "One generation shall commend your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts." So, we teach them the faith at home. We read them the Bible. We point them to Christ at every opportunity. And we take them to our Lord's house where our precious children can hear our faithful pastors preach the Word.

I think this is why we were overjoyed with our daughter's homework answer. Our family's teaching, our pastor's preaching — despite the daily distractions — had commended Christ to her and made it obvious that He is the most important part of our holiday. As sinners, praise God that His Word and Spirit are working.

When our children were small, our pastor shared with us that for his family, God's gifts come first on Christmas morning. No gift under a tree can compare with the gift of eternal life given freely to us through Christ's death and resurrection. In whatever traditions we instill, that's exactly the message we want to communicate and the faith we want to pass on.

Celebrate the Nativity of our Lord in God's House. Hear His Word, which makes us holy. Receive the Sacrament and bring your children. Going to church is not leaving your family's holiday behind. Tell them at home the reasons behind the traditions and make it your tradition not just on Christmas, but every Sunday. Let your week start with Divine Service and center your life on it. Center your children's lives on it.

Is there a greater gift you could give them?
