The Northeastern Iowa Synod continues to live into its calling as part of the global body of Christ through the Global Church Together Network, a vibrant expression of our Companion Synod relationships with churches in Namibia, Angola, and Hungary.

## **Upcoming Visits from Companion Synod Bishops**

This fall, September 28 – October 10, we are honored to welcome several bishops from our companion churches:

Bishop Tamás Fabiny of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Hungary will visit congregations and ministries across Northeastern lowa, sharing insights from the Hungarian church's witness in a secularizing Europe and deepening our shared commitment to theological education and refugee support.

Bishops from Namibia and Angola will also be visiting, including leaders from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Namibia (ELCIN), the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the Republic of Namibia (ELCRN), and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Angola (IELA). These visits follow the joyous installation of two new bishops in Namibia earlier this year, attended by NEIA pastors and leaders. The celebrations included vibrant worship, deep theological exchange, and heartfelt reconnections with Namibian leaders who studied or served in lowa

through Wartburg Seminary and Ewalu Bible Camp.

These visits are more than ceremonial—they are opportunities to walk together in accompaniment, sharing stories, challenges, and prayers as we build mutual understanding and solidarity.

## Worship Resources for Epiphany 2026: Glory Revealed

As we look ahead to the Season of Epiphany 2026, the Global Church Together Network will release a set of worship resources designed to help congregations celebrate the light of Christ revealed across cultures and continents. These resources, part of the "Glory Revealed" series, include:

Calls to worship and prayers that reflect global voices and themes of justice, reconciliation, and hope.

Liturgies that invite congregations to see Christ's light in unexpected places and people.

Reflections and benedictions written by leaders from around the world, including voices from Africa, Europe, and North America.

These materials will be available to congregations in late fall and are ideal for use through the Epiphany season.

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### Meet the Mission Table: A Shared Ministry of Evangelism and Vitality

In the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), we believe that the Church is not confined to buildings or boundaries—it is a living, breathing community of believers called into relationship with God and one another for the sake of the world. Our ecclesiology, our way of being the church in the world, is rooted in the understanding that we are the Body of Christ, called to live out our baptismal vocation together through Word, Sacrament, service, and justice. This shared calling is expressed through our interdependent structure: congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization working collaboratively to embody God's mission.

In this spirit of shared ministry, the Northeastern Iowa Synod has launched a new network—the Mission Table. This team, composed of both rostered and lay leaders, partners with the Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM) to support mission, outreach, congregational vitality, and evangelism across our synod. While some synods call similar groups "Outreach Committees" or "Evangelism Teams," many use the term "Mission Table," inspired by Pastor Stephen Bowman's book The Mission Table: Renewing Congregation and Community.

Bowman writes:

"Table is about relationships and community... Mission tables take shape when kitchen and altar tables merge with new and renewed tables in the community locally and globally—where new relationships of mutuality and reconciliation are formed for the life of the world."

This vision aligns beautifully with our Lutheran understanding of Church: a community gathered by grace, sent into the world to listen, serve, and proclaim the Gospel. The Mission Table embodies this by practicing the "three great listenings"—to God, to one another, and to our neighbors."

In August 2025, the DEMs and Mission Table members from Region 5 (lowa, Illinois, Wisconsin, and Michigan's Upper Peninsula) gathered at Wartburg Seminary for a retreat funded by the **God's Love Made Real Initiative** and an **Evangelism Grant** from the ELCA Churchwide offices. This retreat was a powerful example of our Church's collaborative spirit—synods learning from one another, sharing resources, and exploring new ways to engage in evangelism that is traumainformed, culturally aware, and rooted in deep listening.

Participants experienced creative worship models like **Dinner Church** and **Messy Church**, and engaged in playful, Spirit-led activities designed to spark holy imagination. These experiences remind us that evangelism is not a formula—it's a faithful response to God's love, expressed in diverse and contextual ways.

As the NEIA Mission Table begins its work, it will focus on sharing these resources and learnings, supporting congregations in both traditional and innovative ministries. It will also oversee the distribution of grants from our synod's **Outreach Fund**, designed to support new ministries. We are grateful to be working with **Deacon Jessica Hacker**, Senior Director for Institutional Giving at Churchwide, to develop grant guidelines that reflect our shared commitment to mission.

This is how we live out our ecclesiology in the ELCA: not as isolated congregations, but as a connected Church, collaborating across expressions—local, synodical, and churchwide—to make God's love real in the world.

## The Busy Season for the Synod Bishop & Staff

Late summer through early November is busy season for bishops and Synod staffs. For me that has meant Region 5 meetings, ordinations, congregational anniversaries, Board meetings for LSI and Wartburg College, and Conference of Bishops meetings, professional boundary training for synod clergy, and some planning "retreats" with my staff and Region 5 colleagues. This year I am adding the installation of the new Presiding Bishop and visits from five companion Synod Bishops from Hungary, Namibia, and Angola. When I am not in attendance in one of these places, I find that my mind is in a couple other places:

## Reconsiderations of Bound Conscience

In August the Churchwide Assembly (CWA) passed editorial revisions to the 2009 Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust social statement. The revisions reflected updating wording and clarifications that brought the social statement into congruence with subsequent social teaching in the ELCA. Over 94% of the CWA voting members approved the changes.

Here in September, the Task Force turned our attention to the reconsideration of Bound Conscience as requested by the 2022 Churchwide Assembly. At our meeting we learned about personal conflict styles and preferences from the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center. We renewed conversation about what each of us brings to this conversation. We met with three members of the Task Force that created the 2009 social statement and listened to their understanding of Bound Conscience

and why they included it. We heard a presentation by Rev. Dr. Timothy Wengert about the use of Bound Conscience by Martin Luther and other Reformers at the start of the Lutheran Church. We dwelled on the parable of the Ten Bridesmaids, wondered about grace, befuddled by those who would not share, and curious about the fear of not having enough leading to the response to, in so many words, "go get your own."

I came away from our meetings with cautious optimism. There is a sense that we are waiting for something new to emerge, something beyond and either/or choice. We are exploring ways to bring the whole church along with us but aren't sure how to do that.

#### **Congregational Property**

It has come to my attention that there are rumors pertaining to church property ownership in and the Synod's intent to take it away. These are false claims. I can assure you that the Northeastern Iowa Synod (and the ELCA) are not requiring or requesting congregations to hand over their property. The constitutional provisions to take over administration of congregational property are there for extreme cases when a congregation can no longer do so on their own. (For example: When a congregation has fewer members on the roll than the number their constitution requires for a quorum at a congregational meeting.) In these cases, it is the Synod Council that authorizes the administration of a congregation's property. I can also attest that the Synod staff are not interested in property management. In fact, we have informational resources and stand ready to assist

congregations in caring for their property the best they can in both active ministry and when a

congregation reaches the end of their ministry.

To be fair, there are examples in the ELCA that lie outside of this example. In cases where the larger church has significantly invested in building and supporting a congregation, there may be reasons to protect or recoup that investment. Here in Northeastern lowa, the vast majority of congregations were self-funded or supported by one or two other congregations when they began. It makes no sense to me to use money meant for ministry to enter into lengthy and costly legal battles over property ownership.

Finally, this is not something the bishop has the authority to do. The Synod Council has the authority to do this. These are lay people and pastors from among our congregations. They are your neighbors. They are responsible for what we hold and do together as a Synod. I can't imagine how hard it would be for them to approve the forceful takeover of property of a neighboring congregation.

We are called and gifted by the Holy Spirit to be loving, gracious, and supportive of one another. Let us not grow weary of doing good things so that all may know the love of Christ Jesus.

## Immanuel, Cresco Hosts Clothing Closet

Immanuel Lutheran Church is in the small town of Cresco in Northeast Iowa. We aren't a large congregation but enjoy doing projects outside our church. We just concluded our 14th year of the Back to School Clothing Giveaway. This began as a small project which we held on a Saturday morning in August. It has now grown to a 3 day event with 250 to 300 area people showing up to select clothing. We began it as clothing for school aged children only, but we always received a lot of adult clothing. We soon realized that there were a lot of adults and grandparents that were in need of clothing and coats, also. Visitors can take as much as they need, with many leaving with boxes or large bags of clothing. Everything is free with no questions asked. We also have towels, sheets, blankets and bedspreads available from local motels.

Each year we begin in the spring by advertising with posters downtown or in surrounding communities along with the local radio station asking for gently used clothing, shoes and boots. We usually have 10-12 women show up each Wednesday morning beginning in May to sort clothing. We hang up shirts and coats on racks we have acquired over the years, using our Sunday School rooms as closets. Each rack is labeled with a size and gender to make it easier in August. All shorts and jeans are folded to be laid on tables later.

The Sunday before our giveaway, church members help carry clothing to our basement. We then meet on Monday to unpack boxes and arrange the jeans on tables and the tops on racks.

Since this project has grown over the years we now have all male clothing upstairs in our classrooms or in any other room available and all female clothing in the basement. A lot of labels and signs in English and Spanish are used to make it easier for visitors.

After closing on Saturday, workers select clothing and pack boxes for the elementary school, preschool, school daycare and nurse, school sports shirts for the high school "School Closet", two other surrounding schools for their clothes' closets, onesies for baby kits, foster children's parents, a homeless Veterans center and a Correctional Facility in nearby towns. We also contact a Mission along with Home Providers, Community Action, and our nursing homes. All the workers agreed that the time involved with this project is so worthwhile when seeing

the smiles on children's, parents' and older adults' faces.

Each year we see returning shoppers along with many new shoppers. Grandparents come to select clothing for their grandchildren whose families are going through tough times or who are raising their grandchildren. Many older adults also select needed clothing. We find our visitors very polite, respectful and thankful, including the children.

If your church is looking for a meaningful project, this involves no money- only your time. It affects so many in a positive way and sends them home knowing their children will have appropriate sized clothing for the coming year. We feel this is God's work through our hands.



## Living Abundantly: A Fall Reflection on Generosity
