Pastor's Musings & Ponderings

"Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord..." (Acts 3:19, NIV)

This year, Ash Wednesday is on March 5th. This marks the beginning of Lent. Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient Jewish practice, that is mentioned in both the Old and New testaments. Beginning with the early Christian Church, this practice then became an external mark of penitence. Ashes also remind us of our human mortality. When we receive the ashes in the sign of the cross on our foreheads and hear, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return," we are reminded of our human mortality. Likewise, we are also reminded of our baptism when the sign of the cross was made on our foreheads. Ashes also serve as a reminder of our need to repent as well as a sign of cleansing and renewal.

The ELCA says this about Lent, "Lent is the forty-day season (excluding Sundays) of penitence and preparation for the Three Days of Holy Week and Easter." Over the years, I have been asked why Sundays during Lent are not considered to be part of the forty days. I think the easiest answer is that Sundays are always celebrated as feasts of the Resurrection.

"Burying the alleluias" usually occurs during or at the end of worship on Transfiguration Sunday, which we will do on March 2nd. Alleluias will return on Easter Sunday. But why do we "bury" the alleluias? We do this to symbolically remind us that the time of Lent is a time of repentance and meditation. It serves as a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice on the cross for our sake.

On Ash Wednesday, we will host a noon service which will include communion and the Imposition of Ashes. Then, at 7:00 p.m., Mount Cross will host the Ecumenical Ash Wednesday service which will also include communion and the Imposition of Ashes.

During Lent here at Mount Cross, we will have soup suppers and the Holden Evening Prayer service on Wednesdays with supper at 5:00 p.m. and worship at 6:00 p.m. This year, we will also hear powerful dramatic monologues during Wednesday worship. We will first hear from the paralytic who was lowered through the roof, followed by Peter's mother-in-law, Martha, Lazarus, and Mary Magdalene.

Palm Sunday/Sunday of the Passion is on April 13th and Easter on April 20th. If you would like be a participant in reading the gospel on Palm Sunday, please let me know as soon as possible.





This year, Mount Cross' participation in the SouperBowl collection on Superbowl Sunday resulted in \$1,317.33, an increase of \$421.33 over last year's \$905.00. The money collected will be sent to the Deacon's Food Pantry.

Non-perishable food in the amount of 35 items were delivered to the Deacon's Food Pantry. This was an increase of more than double from the 2024 donations.







Lent begins on Wednesday, March 5th. We will again use the pink pigs as a vehicle for you to donate checks (written to Mount Cross with World Hunger in the memo line) or cash as gifting sources during the 40 days of Lent. <u>Our gifts will be collected</u> on Palm Sunday, April 13th.

The entrance table just inside the sanctuary has copies of the *Lent Study 2025* and pink pig boxes for depositing "World Hunger" money and be found on the fellowship tables in the back of the sanctuary.



This is the last "WELCA News" as we are no longer involved in this group. It is due to lack of interest and attendance at our meetings. Catching Up on News from 2024: On the Move (Again)

I have been serving as an ELCA global missionary since 2016. It is hard to believe it has been nine years since I first packed three suitcases to begin a new life in Senegal, West Africa. As a pastor and global missionary, I have





committed to go where God and the church call me. In 2023, God and the ELCA once again called me to a new country and to be in relationship with a new church. In February 2024, I arrived in Madagascar to begin a new call as the ELCA Country Representative. I will also be the Young Adults in Global Mission (YAGM) Country Coordinator when the program resumes in Madagascar. In my nine years as an ELCA global missionary, I have served in Senegal, Zambia, and now Madagascar—all in the Africa region.

Over the past year, I have travelled through -out Madagascar to get to know the people and ministries of the Malagasy Church. I have been welcomed into Church Council meetings, witnessed leadership elections at the National Church Assembly, learned from seminaries, inclusive schools, and vocational training centers, visited healthcare, development, and gender justice projects, preached sermons, and ate many shared meals.

The Malagasy Lutheran Church has five million members and is one of the fastest growing Lutheran churches in the world. Madagascar is also one of the poorest

Madagascar is also one of the poorest countries in the world. So, the church is focused on their mission to share the gospel holistically. Over the past year, it has been wonderful to learn from the faithful leaders in Madagascar, as we walk together in the God's gospel mission.


