#### **Pastor's Musings & Ponderings**

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." Matthew 28:19-20 (NIV)

For some reason, I cannot think about Easter without thinking of these gospel verses. Many may recognize the above passage as the Great Commission. This occurs after Jesus' resurrection and is the command Jesus gives to the disciples to go out and spread his teachings to all the nations, making them disciples and baptizing them. However, Jesus doesn't just give them a pat on the back and wish them the best of luck. He assures them that he is always with them to the end of the age. This command and promise is for us as well.

This command serves as the very foundation of evangelism and all missions in Christian theology. Remember, "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

# GL BAL MISSIONS



A long time, active member of Mount Cross, Jerry Carlson, was the creator of the cross that currently stands in the altar area of the church. Many are not familiar with the story that brought about this cross. The following pages had been written by the creator of the cross and provides that story. A physical copy is also available on the entrance table in the sanctuary.

## "For God So Loved The World . . . ." The Story Behind Our Cross

For many years I have made canes for my dad, uncles, and friends; first finding them in the woods as dead branches, always sanding them to perfection, staining them to bring out the character of the wood, and finally, a coat of polyurethane to protect them. My dad made the statement "I don't need it yet, but maybe someday I will." Later, he found other people in the community that needed a cane. Once it was made, he would proudly give it to his friend saying, "My son made it for you."

The cross I have given to our church comes in a miraculous way. The day after our 38<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary, my wife and I traveled to Pine to look at a cabin that was for sale. The little old lady that owned it had cinnamon buns baking in the oven . . .need I say more.

The following day, I received word that my wife had been killed instantly in a car accident. This tragic news was devastating to my family, myself, and many close friends and neighbors. I knew I needed to buy the cabin for our family; it would help with the healing process. Meanwhile, with the little old lady seriously ill and confused about the move, I thought it would be best to allow her to continue living in the cabin until her home was built.

One day she called and said that there was a lot of activity of the two lots below the cabin. I remembered that they were for sale. I called the realtor and found out that he had an offer on them.

I remember telling him, "Before we conclude this call, you will have two offers." Needless to say, I bought them.

After moving up from the Valley, I found a majestic alligator juniper tree in the middle of a small wash on one of the extra lots I had purchased. I noticed that it had many dead branches that would eventually need pruning. Three years later, with help from my neighbor, Darrold, and his new chainsaw, we finally cleaned it up. Most of the twisted branches would become firewood, but there was one branch that stood out from the rest with future possibilities. It was about 9 feet long and straight. I remember telling Darrold, "I might be able to make a cross out of it." I vividly remember thinking, if it turned out well, it could be given to our church. We have so many people that give of their time and talents, surely I could do my part.

I had no idea how many hours it would take, but somehow it didn't matter. Nearly a year and a half later it began to take shape. During that time, I had helped Bill and Edie Morris as

they prepared to move. Bill and I had served together on the Call Committee and we had accompanied one of our pastoral candidates on a tour of Main Street prior to the required interviews; it was a memorable experience for all three of us. That candidate became our new pastor, and Pastor Elaine has become near and dear to us. Bill was a strong motivating force as he encouraged me to complete the cross before his move. It was his desire to be present when Pastor Elaine was given the cross. I wish Bill could have been present during the services on Palm Sunday, Maundy, Thursday, and Easter Sunday. His gentle prodding was necessary as I struggled to complete the cross only about two weeks before he moved.

The hugs, handshakes, and sincere appreciation shared by so many have made it all worthwhile. I had finally given something back to the church family that has given me so much throughout my healing process for the past six years. I feel honored and privileged to have done this for all of you and to see how the cross added to the inspirational services of this past Holy Week. I feel as a congregation, we have just begun. Many friends, neighbors, and relatives will gain from our witness of a life-size cross as THE STORY is told for many years to come.

You are a gifted congregation in a community that has many people struggling through life without the benefits of a church family. May this cross help you share the good news of the gospel with these people.

Jesus was crucified and died on a cross very much like this one.

For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life.

May God continue to bless you as you go forward in your ministry.

Thanks to the many people who helped make this possible: Darrold Mahlman, Bill Morris, Jim Potter, Jim Bailey, Tom Backe, our musicians, the Altar Guild, Pastor Elaine Watskey, but most of all to God himself for His inspiration along the way.

The tree that produced this branch is now older than our country. For 300 years, it has overcome fire, drought, and severe weather conditions, while this branch remained strong enough to become the cross that you now see. So then, should this writing stop here? Why was this tree singled out and saved for 300 years? Why was this branch saved among the twisted branches that became firewood? "Why me, Lord?" Why Payson and Pine? Where do we fit? Why Mount Cross?


