Pastor's Ponderings

Journeys with Angels Looking up

You are invited to join the Women's Bible Study as <u>we gather in spirit</u> on January 14th at 10:00 a.m. The complete devotional can be read in the "Gather" magazine or obtain a copy at the church building by the mail boxes.

If you received the January-February "Gather" magazine, please note that it has two lessons in it, one for each month. The one for January starts on page 24 and says "Session One" under the top heading. Angels are not a major focus of Scripture, nor are they ever mentioned in our Christian creeds. Yet they show up with frequency at pivotal moments in the Old and New Testaments. This first study introduces us to some glimpses of angels in the Bible and the meaning of various words used in the Bible to describe angels. We will also challenge ourselves to look for angels who inspire us to honor God's awesome works throughout nature.

Angels are numerous (329) in the Bible, but they are not a uniform bunch. They move between heaven and earth sometimes with wings and sometimes with words and sometimes with ethereal ladders (Genesis 28:12). The Hebrew and Greek words for angels do not refer to wings at all. Angels are known for carrying messages from God to humans. Their existence tells us something about the immensity of God, the universe God has created, and our own human place and potential in relationship to God's cosmos.

Psalm 8 paints a grand, multisensory, panoramic portrait of creation, asking us to first raise our eyes to the heavens, then attune our ears to the cry of an earth-bound baby (v.2), then again gaze upward to the stars of the night sky (v.3) before planting our human feet firmly among the creatures of earth and sea in the psalm's second half. In the middle (v.5) is the fulcrum: a dance of humans with angels. On this side of eternity, we earthlings are situated a little lower than those angels. On earth, it is our mission to glorify God.

Job 38:1-7 reflects a place where God honors Job by speaking directly to him – no angel intermediaries are employed – and yet God demands that Job pay attention to the angels. God reminds the long-suffering Job that human beings are cosmically younger than the angels and have much to learn about human purpose and destiny in the broad context of time and eternity.

Revelation 1:16a and 20 indicates that each star in 1:16a represents an angel. John has a vision of the risen Christ holding seven stars in his right hand. In *The Physics of Angels: Exploring the Realm Where Science and Spirit Meet,* published in 2014, theologian Matthew Fox and biologist Rupert Sheldrake write about the remarkable parallels between the new discoveries of modern science and the traditional theological exploration of the roles of angels. "We now have a vastly expanded view of the heavens, with countless galaxies, quasars, pulsars, black holes, and 15 billion years of cosmic history. . . I think one of the things we need to do is recover a sense of the life of the heavens so that when we actually look at the stars (and) at the sky, we become aware of this divine presence in the sky and of the intelligences and the life within it (p. 17).

After Psalm 8 and Job 38: 1-7, the author writes that the third major time we meet cherubim in the Bible is in a vivid, downright weird vision given to the prophet Ezekiel. (Ezekiel 1: 5-14; 10:15-20) Scholars believe much of the symbolism of the descriptions is simply lost to us. Maybe that's the point—they are strange enough to make us realize that we aren't in relationship with a tame God, a God our human minds can comprehend. These bizarre cherubim awaken us to awe and wonder.

The first angel on the scene in the New Testament is Gabriel who also first appears in Daniel 8:16. The only other named angel is Michael, who appears three times, all in the book of Daniel. Gabriel means "God is my strength." He fulfills his messenger role admirably as he delivers stunning news to Zechariah, and then to young Mary. Gabriel assures Mary that God is her strength, and that her impossible pregnancy will result in the gift of a Savior for the whole world. It is unclear which angel appeared and terrified a group of earthy shepherds while delivering the most beautiful news in the world: "To you is born this day . . .a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord."

This first session helps us begin the spiritual exercise of looking for angels above us (Psalm 8), beyond us (Job) and among us (Luke 2). Next month, we will come up against angels who *confront* us.

As we look towards a new year, a bit jaded, a bit exhausted, and with feelings of loss, the usual catch phrase of Happy New Year just does not ring quite as easy as in the past.

Being a glass half full person, the thoughts of what this new year will bring are challenging. We have the rebirth of hope, with the possibility of a COVID vaccine around the corner, and we have new opportunities to look forward to in our walk with Christ. We have the rebirth of joy as the world starts to recover. We have the survivors guilt to deal with as we celebrate those who now live in heaven. All in all, let's hope this new year brings us to terms with what God wants us to do in this world he created.

I read an article from the Order of St. Luke magazine at the November Council Meeting about our lives with God. It reminded us that if we are not praising God, as well as asking for his blessings and intercession, we are not in a close relationship with him. That relationship is so important to us, but like a friendship it requires us to thank God, to praise God, and to appreciate all he has done.

In addition in a recent Bible study with several ladies who do not attend our church, we had a lesson devoted to "spiritual dryness." What are the signs of our being in this situation? Briefly we have seasons of such dryness. For instance, we pray as a habit. We are not praying out of joy, but with a feeling of duty. We may be overwhelmed with tasks, or grieving, or hopelessness, but we pray while on empty. The suggestion with this is to read Psalms 51.

When we neglect prayer or conversation with God, he feels distant. He is still there, but we have drifted away from the one thing we need the most...God. It is <u>our</u>job to reconnect. Talk to God. It does not re quire a beautiful prayer, just a conversation. Soon the reconnection is there.

Many of us have dealt with considerable loss in this past year, with the result of negative thinking creeping into our lives. The next step can be judging others, etc. Stop the press. Read Romans 14. Just throw that negativity down the drain, and pick up the cup of joy in a long talk with God. Rejoice, look for possibilities, and take a few steps to restoring your soul. Sing the doxology. Praise God from whom all blessings flow....sing it until you feel it.



EPIPHANY - JANUARY 6TH



Epiphany is celebrated every year on the first day after the Christmas season – January 6th. On the festival of Epiphany, we celebrate the arrival of the magi at Jesus' home. This event established Jesus' worldwide significance. As a result, Epiphany is a time to celebrate the presence of Christ as the light of the world.

Though Epiphany celebrates the revelation of Christ to the nations and the arrival of the three kings, we should note that tradition has expounded upon what is actually recorded in Scripture.

The second chapter of Matthew does not indicate that the magi were kings, nor does it indicated how many magi visited Jesus. The Old Testament reading for Epiphany (Isaiah 60) speaks about camels coming from three different places (Midian, Ephah, and Sheba) and this, along with the mention of three gifts (gold, frankincense, and myrrh) is what has given us the tradition of the three kingly wise men.

Regardless of the accuracy of our traditional story, that three foreign kings would come such a long distance to bow down and worship a child is a powerful story. That a child of such humble origins can be the focus of so much attention requests our wonder-filled consideration.
