Pastor's Ponderings

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

It's nostalgia time! As I sit down to write this article, I have a copy of the January/February issue of Living Lutheran on the desk. The cover story is about the wonderful animated series Davey and Goliath, which is celebrating its 60th anniversary this month. Wow! Where have the years gone? Perhaps, you can **remember** watching it yourself or with your children. I remember watching the show every Sunday morning before leaving for Sunday school. As a small child, I was amazed that it was a Lutheran church production that aired on one of our local television networks. I knew that because of the show's theme song, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God," which I had sung in church, and also because of that funny looking flower thingy (the Luther rose) that appeared during the credits. I recognized it because one of them hung on a wall in my Sunday school classroom. I felt connected to that show. Many of the lessons that were learned by Davey were also lessons that I learned at church: faith in God, kindness, love of neighbor (all neighbors, especially those of different backgrounds and beliefs), compassion and values. When I was just starting out in pastoral ministry, I purchased two VCR episodes of the show to use as teaching aids in my First Communion Classes and Confirmation Classes. The kids loved them. I think I finally donated my tapes to a church library when DVD's came into being, Sigh... Still, the warm and fuzzy memories that I have of this fabulous cartoon series live on and bring a smile to my mask-covered face.

Enter the season of Lent, which begins on Ash Wednesday, February 17th. This year, we find ourselves in Year B of the Lectionary. So, our Lenten time will be one of **remembering** and reclaiming our identity in baptism as children of God, as we prepare for Easter. The readings from scripture will be filled with rich baptismal imagery. Our *Sundays and Seasons Guide to Worship Planning* suggests "that in each of the gospel readings we will hear a word of grace in the midst of the fears that we face: angels accompany Jesus during his temptation in the wilderness; Jesus calls Peter to move from confession to discipleship; the corrupt temple cannot throw Jesus off his mission; even the cross becomes a sign of healing; and death is a precursor to new life."

During this Lenten season, our daily morning devotions from the Hanus house will cover a Lenten theme. Because of COVID, we will not be offering midweek services or suppers, but we will be joining our Payson ecumenical church pastors to piece together and offer a virtual Ash Wednesday worship service, like we did for Thanksgiving. It's hard to believe that it has been one year since we gathered together in-person to celebrate Ash Wednesday here at Mount Cross. Hopefully, we will be able to do it again next year! Stay tuned for more information regarding Ash Wednesday 2021.

As we enter this Lenten season, may we spend time in God's word, **remembering** and reflecting on what it means to live in community with God, with creation, with the world, and with one another and deepening these relationships.

Wishing you and yours a meaningful season of Lent, **remembering** your baptismal identity as children of God, as well as, some of the lessons you may have learned from our pals, Davey and Goliath,

Journeys with Angels

Turnaround Angels

You are invited to join the Women's Bible Study as we gather in spirit on February 11 at 10:00 a.m.

The complete study can be read in the "Gather" magazine or obtain a copy at the church building by the mailboxes. If you received the January-February "Gather" magazine, please note that it has two lessons in it, one for each month. The one for February starts on page 36 and says Session Two under the top heading.

Angels are known for carrying messages from God to humans. Their existence tells us something about the immensity of God, the universe God has created, and our own human place and potential in relationship to God's cosmos. This month we will learn about "turnaround angels," who confront and accompany people to a change of direction in their lives.

This month we enter the season of Lent, a season traditionally associated with repentance. The Greek word for repentance is *metanoia* which literally means to "change one's mind." In the parable of the sweeping woman, *metanoia* is associated with being physically pulled up from the cracks of life. This is an experience where angels abound as in Luke 15:8-15 where the woman sweeps the floor for a lost coin and rejoices with her friends and neighbors when it is found. Jesus says this is just like the party God throws with God's angels in heaven, over a sinner who's been retrieved.

The "cherubim" like those who guarded Eden and the Tree of Life from Adam and Eve functioned as messengers of warning. The question can be asked, do the cherubim east of Eden still hold a turnaround warning for us today in regard to the plunder of our environment? The author includes an example from her experience in Myanmar. What other "angels" stand guard today?

Do we see the beginning of repentance from Jacob when his self-centered world is pierced by a ladder of angels? As Jacob decides to journey hundreds of miles back to his home, he hears that Esau is coming to meet him with 400 men. It was a fearful experience for Jacob. That night, God's angel comes to Jacob in the form of a mysterious "man" whom Hosea later interprets to have been an angel. This night is a turning point for Jacob who receives a new name: Israel, meaning "One Who Wrestles with God." After that, Jacob walks with a limp.


Moses is confronted with an angel in a flaming bush. Moses "turns aside" to marvel and suddenly hears—for the first time—the compelling voice of God. Has an unusual feat of nature carried a message from God to you?

Sometimes motivation for change comes by way of shock and laughter. The story of Balaam involves a famous seer who can't see, and his humble donkey she-ass (translated from the original Hebrew) points out what her boss doesn't notice – a fearsome angel in their path, brandishing a sword. Balaam had been hired by Balak, the king of Moab, for the job of prophesying doom to the Israelites. God had other ideas and sends God's own most distinguished representative, an angel with a sword to "restrain the prophet's madness." Balaam, hilariously, doesn't see a thing. It takes not only his donkey's brave stubbornness, but also human speech coming from her mouth, to open his ears and eyes to the danger at hand. The angel would have killed Balaam if it weren't for his donkey's "turnaround" behavior. Read the story in Numbers 22:21-34

Angels, the messengers of God, appear even more often in the New Testament than in the Old. One of these "turnaround angels" shows up three times in the first two chapters of the New Testament. Joseph is known as a "righteous man," and when he finds out his fiancé is pregnant – and it's definitely not his baby – the path forward is clear: He will, as discreetly and calmly as possible, take the legal steps to end the relationship. We can imagine him being quite sure of his plan, and maybe congratulating himself on handling the situation with both kindness and firmness. That's when an angel steps in to turn Joseph completely around from divorce to instant fatherhood. (Matthew 1:18-21, 24-25.)

Joseph's second encounter with angels brings a warning that they should go to Egypt where they became refugees. His third and final encounter with an angel turns him and his family around to move back to their homeland. Mary (apparently) gets to speak to an angel face to face while Joseph only gets to hear from angels in dreams, and apparently has no opportunity to talk back or ask any questions! Why to you think this is? Have you ever dreamed about angels? Or received a warning through a dream?

2020 has been a tough year to run a church (gym, restaurant). With that being said, I am grateful that we closed out 2020 with a loss of \$31,157.44. Two areas are major contributors to that negative number. On the income side, we had multiple members who did not fulfill their pledges and on the expense side, operating expenses increased by 50%.

As we move into 2021, I ask that you remain committed to your pledges, as well as to the church...we need an active congregation to pull us through round two of this pandemic environment. The church is applying for the 2^{nd} round of PPP to offset staff wages and looking for creative solutions to re-engage membership, ministry and contribution.

Please note: The Congregational Meeting Part II has been postponed until Sunday, February 14th, after the service to approve a 6 month budget for the first half of the year.
