Pastor's Ponderings

In like a Lamb...Out like a Lion.

March has never been my favorite month. Sure, there are a bunch of important days in March: Ash Wednesday (2nd), International Women's Day (8th), St. Patrick's Day (17th), the first day of spring (20th), and of course, Linda and my 38th wedding anniversary on the third. Still, March just seems like a month we need to trudge through in order to get to April showers and May flowers. It's gloomy, cool or cold, and we just want to move beyond the month and get to something better.

Adding to our gloomy outlook is Lent. Surely, it is the gloomiest liturgical season. In this season, we remember Jesus being in the desert 40 days and nights, fasting, praying and being tempted by Satan. Throughout this season, we move closer and closer to Jesus' death on the cross. It is not a joy-filled time as we focus on Jesus' suffering and death, on our account.

I view Jesus entering this time as a lamb. After his temptation in the desert, pushed around by Satan, Jesus begins his public ministry. He starts like a fresh, newborn lamb but exits into Holy Week and Easter as a lion- strong, courageous and triumphant.

Engaging in such practices helps us all to be better focused on our relationship with God and more in tune with Jesus' challenges. As we do this, I pray that we will arrive at Easter triumphant, with renewed strength and courage as Jesus' faithful disciples.

During this past month, our church had addressed the gift from Jacob of his house located in north Payson. Jacob would come to church with his little dog and his motorcycle jacket emblazoned with a big cross on the back. Some of us would talk to him, and others seemed to ignore him. When Jacob died a year ago, he gave the church all he had: his house, his truck, his motorcycle and his gun collection. Once our Pastors had met with attorneys regarding Jacob's estate to make sure we truly inherited all these things, Council and the Pastors talked about getting the house ready for sale. The car, collections and motorcycle had a guicker turn around,

with offering Jacob's son the truck and motorcycle since it was his father's legacy. The collections were cleaned up and sold, the son was somewhat reluctant to pick up the items we offered him, and so subsequently the truck was sold and the motorcycle is in parts to be repaired and either sold or given to the son.

Now for the real work. Our Pastors, Gary & Sharon Vaplon, Tony Andretta, Ernie Kellett, and others emptied the house and yard of junk. The Thursday morning Property Committee with John Prescholdt, Tony Andretta, Bob Walker, Bill Petrie, Ron Nelson and others cleaned up the yard. Lance Kittleson repaired the front porch and painted it. Then came the big day! On January 29th the team of both Pastors Hanus, Linda & Ray Wiebe, Nancy & Ernie Kellett, Scott Stallard, Mary Havenor, Tony Andretta, Ron Nelson, Sharon & Gary Vaplon, and Alice Natale came to the house armed with buckets, cleaning supplies, vacuums, mops, brooms, polishing and scrubbing tools, and a table to assemble everything. Trash bags, putty knives and other items were also included. OUTSIDE, rebuilding the back deck were Tony Andretta and Bob Walker; plus Bill Petrie helped the previous day.

All of this is an example of what God's Work, Our Hands can do. By the end of the day, the house was spotless. The deck needed a sealant, which was done the following Monday. The trash was hauled off. The buyer did the walk through and had to be reminded that the house was AS IS, so any further repairs would be his issue. We had made sure the heater and air conditioner were working and a new water heater was also installed. It was hard work, but the "Amazing Mount Cross" again showed its spirit.

On our digital sign along Highway 260, it states "Kindness Matters." Are any of us guilty of not always remembering this? As we approach Lent, let's take time to Let God, not us, drive our lives.
