# **Pastor's Ponderings**

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace to you and peace, as we enter the month of April in all of its passion and splendor!

Easter arrives later this year. Please mark your calendars and join us for Holy Week worship services: Palm Sunday on April 10th at 9:30 a.m.; Maundy Thursday on April 14th at 6:00 p.m.; our Payson ecumenical Good Friday service (here at Mount Cross ) on April 15th at 7:00 p.m. and Easter Sunday, when we celebrate the resurrection of our Lord, at 9:30 a.m. Invite a friend to share the Holy Week journey with you.

Another important occasion in the life of the church, and the ELCA in particular, is the 35th birthday of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) on April 30th. Where have the years gone? I can still remember the many meetings and debates and studies and letters and publications and elections that took place leading up to the birth of "the new church." I attended the first ELCA churchwide assembly in Chicago the following year, in August, as a clergy voting member of the Allegheny Synod. The excitement and energy in the room was amazing.

The following is an overview shared with us by our Grand Canyon Synod, recalling the events throughout the past 35 years of this church. This may be new information for you, or perhaps, it brings back some old memories of where you were when all of this was happening.

"In the span of church history, 35 years is a very short period. Yet, for the ELCA, in terms of substantially lived history, the past three and a half decades have been highly significant.

On Thursday, April 30, 1987, in Columbus, Ohio, representatives of the predecessor American Lutheran Church, Lutheran Church in America and Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches approved the ELCA constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions, thereby giving birth to "the new church."

Historically, the age of church bodies has been counted from the date of their constituting. That practice stretches back to the first organized synod in North America in 1748 and was followed for all subsequent Lutheran church bodies.

Perhaps most people have forgotten the high level of expectations that accompanied the constituting of the ELCA. The thrill of greater Lutheran unity captured many delighted hearts. The ELCA represented at the time the fulfillment of the prayers and efforts of many years for moving toward greater Lutheran unity in North America.

The births of The American Lutheran Church in April 1960 and the Lutheran Church in America in July 1962 were significant milestones along the way, but those churches

clearly were seen by many as interim steps toward greater unity. Later, the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches was created in December 1976, in a separation from The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.

The life span of the ALC of 1960 was 27 years, of the LCA 25 years, and of the AELC just over a decade. The ELCA at 35 has lived through significant developments in its lived history throughout the past three and a half decades.

Public relations people with no knowledge of church history may date the beginning of the ELCA to January 1, 1988. That is inconsistent with the historical practice for Lutheran and other church bodies in this country. The January 1, 1988, date only marks the exact time that the predecessor church corporations were dissolved into the ELCA, specifically at 12:01 a.m. Central Standard Time on January 1, 1988, with the ELCA as the surviving corporation. Much already was under way in the ELCA in the months prior to that date.

Two recent periods in the history of American Christianity have seen highly significant changes. That has been true for Lutherans too. One period covered the 15 years between the end of World War II in 1945 and 1960: Massive growth in membership, especially with children, huge building programs of churches and parish education facilities, movement toward greater Lutheran unity with the mergers of 1960 and 1962, greater ecumenical awareness with the formation of councils of churches, expansion of church colleges and universities, as well as social ministry programs, and the move from "mission fields" abroad to the formation of what then were known as younger churches.

The next period of massive change and dislocation took place between 2005 and 2020: Significant decreases in worship participation, sharp declines in membership in U.S. churches, signs of growing secularism in society, enormous loss of trust in clergy and church structures, inclination toward schismatic behaviors by some clergy and congregations, and the tendency especially in certain "evangelical" circles to ignore compassion for the needy, as Jesus taught, and instead to give allegiance to political leaders who urge division and hate, with some even viewing the teachings of Jesus as "socialistic".

Meanwhile, some churches, including the ELCA, have sought to become more inclusive and welcoming of all people. Substantial efforts of dialogue and mutual conversation have taken place not only between and among Christian churches but also in relation to Jewish and Islamic traditions. Full communion agreements for the ELCA and certain other churches have opened numerous arenas for common mission.

This quick overview is extremely abbreviated in terms of events throughout the past 35 years. Nonetheless, this birthday of the ELCA is to be an occasion for gratitude.

#### Let us pray:

Eternal God, we give thanks that by your Spirit you led those in generations before us to dream of a day of greater Lutheran unity for the sake of faithful witness and courageous outreach. In due time, the prayers of many generations yielded fruitful efforts leading 35 years ago to the formation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. We pray your blessing upon all ELCA members, congregations, deacons, pastors, and bishops in their life of faith and service. Especially bless our Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton and all who serve with her in the ELCA's churchwide ministries throughout this nation and around the globe. Guide the leaders of congregations and synods toward ever-greater commitment to our life together and deeper understanding of our church's mission of healing and hope. Remind us often by your Spirit of our unity with the whole Church on earth and in heaven. Continue to call us to greater unity in witness and generous dedication to merciful service. Send us forth with the power of your Word to make Christ known throughout the world, now and in the years to come. Amen.

What a history and what a story! May we remember and give thanks to God for bringing us to this place and time. May the presence and promises of our resurrected Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and the power of the Holy Spirit move us forward in faithful witness and service for many years to come!

"Christ is risen!" "Christ is risen, indeed!" "Alleluia!"



Pastor Linda and I were talking about the evolution of Women's Ministry in the Lutheran Church in our more recent history. The early days had groups called Circles, which met to either sew, quilt, or do good deeds such as packing boxes of

things for soldiers, or rolling bandages. In addition a luncheon was usually provided by the hostess. The social aspect may have included a round of bridge, as well as a Bible lesson.

We had Dorcas group, Phoebe group, and other groups as picked by the women who attended. The idea of a circle means it is closed to outsiders. Rolling bandages or other good deeds often meant that many women were not included, with primarily those is nursing or related fields being the prime members.

As a young child, I remember going with my mother to a group that did boxes for soldiers during WWII. The main concern was the boxes, and then the food, which usually included a cake, during a period when obtaining sugar, butter and eggs was difficult. Much of the conversation was how to make a cake with mayonnaise or the new (Wesson) oil. By the way, the chocolate mayonnaise cake is delicious.

In Los Angeles during war time, all things had to end before it was time for dark shades and no lights showing; block wardens assured that the curfew was obeyed and we were required to stay at home unless on a military base and could go to the Officers or NCO club.

Coming forward, what do you as members of our congregation, wish to see out of women's ministry? We currently have a monthly Bible study. For those of you who work, what would you like? Your feedback is important. Please let me know. I think it is important for women, as well as men, to have a Bible study or some type of group get-togethers to explore our faith as well to build friendships.

Now as we move to Easter, think about how we can celebrate this most important day of the year, the resurrection of Jesus, who died for our sins and who gives us hope through our faith in him. Father, God, who sent his son as God on earth for all of us.


# TO MISS THIS!
