

Asphyxiation; Doctor and Policeman Injured When Oil Lamp Explodes

WASKESIU, July 8 .- Bodies of two men who died cleaning out a well at Nesslin Lake, on the west boundary ul l, hue s HE). of Prince Albert National Park, were recovered last night and two of the rescuers were badly scorched and will go to hospital. The men-Constable Phil Hughes of the R.C.M.P. and Dr. G. E. Martin of Regina, were burned in an explosion which occurred as they attempted to peer into the well by n-Jo 9, the light of a coal oil lamp. Both were seriously injured,

The bodies were recovered by Tony Panter, father of the hired man. George Panter's body was sprawled across an engine in the well and the warden's body was floating on the surface of the water. It is believed they met death on Monday. Cause of death has not

been definitely fixed yet, but is believed to have been caused by asphyxiation from gas fumes.
