



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Forest City's Maureesa received an award for her "Outstanding Personal Involvement and Significant Contributions Toward the Betterment of Rutherford County."


She received this award as a result of her volunteer work and activities through the Hospice House of Rutherford County. This award was presented as part of National Volunteer Week, April 18-24, 2021.

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Communications Director **Terry Bedford** represented Universal Mental Health with Benchmarks' Karen McLeod and Paige Wiggs at the Direct Care Advocacy and Rally Day held at the North Carolina General Assembly. What was this all about? The rally consisted of a coalition of organizations across Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities, Aging and Mental Health providing residential, home and community-based health service who rallied at the General Assembly in support of increased wages for direct support workers.

HB 914 Support Our Direct Care Workforce would increase the hourly wages of direct support staff across a variety of medicaid services including Innovations and other home and community-based waivers, personal care services, ICFs, home health, nursing homes and other behavioral health community and residential facilities. This increased rate is intended to make sure that people who qualify for services have the needed direct support workforce. Increased rates mean providers can pay competitive wages, retain experienced Direct Support Workers and people who need support can receive the help they need.



Here are seven facts you should know before taking your shot:

- 1. No serious side effects were reported in clinical trials. Temporary reactions after receiving the vaccine may include a sore arm, headache, feeling tired and achy for a day or two or, in some cases, fever. In most cases, these reactions are good signs that your body is building protection.
- 2. Scientists had a head start. They are built on decades of research on vaccines for similar viruses. A big investment of resources and focus made sure they were created without skipping any steps in development, testing, or clinical trials.
- **3. You cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccine.** The vaccine gives your body instructions to make a protein that safely teaches you to make germ-fighting antibodies to fight the real COVID-19.
- **4. Concerns about safety are taken seriously. Very seriously.** The CDC and FDA are constantly monitoring safety, following federal safety guidelines, and updating North Carolinians with the best safety information. You can trust that the process has been careful and thorough.
- 5. A hundred million people in the U.S. have already received their COVID-19 vaccine.
- **6. It works. And once you're fully vaccinated, you're protected.** The vaccines are proven to help prevent COVID-19 and are effective in preventing hospitalization and death.
- 7. The vaccine does not affect fertility. Vaccination for those who are pregnant or wanting to become pregnant is recommended by the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG), the Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine (SMFM), the American Society for Reproductive Medicine (ASRM), and the Society for Male Reproduction and Urology. 

It's easy to enter—get your vaccine!

Anyone vaccinated starting June 10 will be entered TWICE to win Summer Cash. North Carolinians 18 and over who have received at least one dose of a COVID-19 vaccine are automatically entered into four drawings for a chance to win a \$1 million cash prize. Drawings will be held every other week starting June 23.

Already got your dose? Great! You're automatically entered.



Stay Alert & Be Aware of Your Surroundings

Watch for slip and trip hazards. Icy streets, rough pavement and sidewalks, unmarked curbs and poor lighting can set the stage for a bad fall as you walk in unfamiliar surroundings. Your shoes or boots should have soles with good support and grip.

Plan for safety. Wake up and get started early enough that you won't be tempted to speed or take other shortcuts. Likewise, allow enough time for safe travel before after-work engagements.

Learn to manage fatigue so you won't be traveling when you are drowsy. Get enough sleep, exercise and nutritious foods to maintain good general health and alertness. Avoid overuse of alcohol and other drugs, which decrease your level of alertness and contribute to fatigue.

When you walk, don't shut out your surroundings with a personal stereo or cell phone. Stay aware of your surroundings.

Heat Impacts: Vulnerable Populations



PREGNANT

Extreme heat events have been associated with adverse birth outcomes such as low birth weight, preterm birth, infant mortality, and congenital cataracts.



NEWBORNS

Newborns are extra sensitive to heat because their ability to regulate body temperature is limited.




CHILDREN

Young children and infants are particularly vulnerable to heat, as their bodies are less able to adapt to heat than adults. Those under four are especially vulnerable.



ELDERLY

Older adults, especially those who have preexisting diseases, take certain medications, live alone or have limited mobility are at higher risk for heat illness.



People with chronic medical conditions are more likely to have a serious health problem during a heat wave.



Marilyn Porter was an unforgettable Regional Director for the Eastern Region of Universal Mental Health Services. For her family and those who knew her, she was a dynamic personality with endless dedication to the people that she served. When you worked with Marilyn, you became family.

Marilyn came to Universal in September of 2011 and throughout her time at Universal, impacted countless employees and individuals that Universal supports. Her advocacy and spirit embodied the mission of "Caring People, Caring for People." Marilyn passed away on March 27, 2020 after a courageous fight with cancer. Her loss was one that was felt statewide. Marilyn Porter's legacy will live on though this scholarship.

The Universal Marilyn Porter Scholarship will be awarded annually in the amount of \$1000. It will be awarded to an hourly direct care staff through an application process. The applicant must commit to attend an accredited college (community college, university, etc.) within the year of the scholarship award.

The scholarship will be selected by a 6-person committee made up of Universal employees. The decision will be made based primarily on a short essay from the applicant. The scholarship decision will not be based on, race, color, creed, national or ethnic origin, gender as well as sexual orientation, religious preference, age, disability, or political affiliation.

If you are a direct care hourly staff at Universal, you can apply for the Universal Marilyn Porter Scholarship from July 1st through July 15th. A Scholarship committee will then announce the recipient on August 1, 2021.


