His manager, Michelle, stated that she "has never seen anyone complete a cart of returns as quickly as Christian."

Recently, along with his Employment Specialist Jessica Ward, Christian completed the Pathways training program. The Wal-Mart training staff worked with Jessica to adapt the training process to accommodate Christian and his abilities. Because of these accommodations, Christian was able to complete this rigorous training program. Christian was honored at a graduation ceremony where he was awarded a certificate of completion.

Shortly before graduation, Christian was recognized with the "Happy to Help Award." He was chosen to receive this award by the management for his consistent hard work. 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Staff Spotlight

Bill Jenkins is a Peer Support Specialist in the Asheville office of Universal Mental Health Services. He is deserving of this spotlight because he consistently lives the motto, "caring people, caring for people." Bill simply goes "above and beyond" the status quo.

For example, Bill accompanied his Peer to see Dr. Marder last week and learned that his Peer had unusually high blood pressure due to not having money to purchase medication. Immediately upon leaving that appointment, Bill went to the pharmacy and had the prescriptions filled.

Bill consistently demonstrates a willingness to go "above and beyond" standard expectations of his job. As his Supervisor, I am grateful to know that I can depend on him to respond to a call, even if it happens to be on the weekend or after 5 o'clock. (Recently, on a Friday night around 7pm, I became aware of a Peer who was barricaded in his room with PTSD paranoia. I asked Bill to check on that person and the next thing I knew Bill had gone to his family care home and talked that Peer out of his room and back into services at UMHS.)

A couple months ago, Bill had surgery to remove two feet of his colon and before that he had surgery on his wrist. Two days before his procedure, he showed up to help a woman move. He used his own truck and did not get to bill for his time because the woman was being served by another Peer Specialist through Universal Mental Health. The place the woman moved from was infested with bed bugs, drugs and prostitutes.

Through all this, Bill has maintained or exceeded productivity requirements.



Bill Jenkins is a physical manifestation of the Universal Mental Health motto, "caring people, caring for people" and I am grateful and proud to be on his team!

Making a world of difference in people's lives In the IT Insider from July 2016, the Internet of Things was discussed and defined. As a refresher, according to Wikipedia, the Internet of Things (IoT) is the network of physical objects - devices, vehicles, buildings and other items—embedded with electronics, software, sensors, and network connectivity that enables these objects to collect and exchange data. This connectivity of Internet-connected devices is great for convenience! Want to know what's in your fridge? There's an app for that (if you have the right fridge.) Want to see what's going on in your house when you are away? There's a camera and an app for that! Want to track your teenaged children? There's an app for that. Need to have an injection of insulin at the same time every day? There's a device and an app for that.


With this connectivity comes the potential for exploitation. Can you imagine having an insulin pump that is controlled thru Information Technology? If so, can you imagine that there is someone out there, possibly someone from Russia, or possibly that kid next door with too much time on his hands, that would like to be able to wreak havoc on someone's insulin pump? It can be done. Security of these devices is paramount. We rely on the manufacturers to develop strong enough security for their devices to keep us safe.

But that does not always happen. Surely, you've heard of the worldwide ransomware attack that happened within the past few weeks. That attack, and others like it, leveraged what's called a botnet. What is a botnet you ask? A botnet is a collection of internet-enabled devices that have been "hacked" and "taken over" to do the dirty work of hackers. So, those

connected fridges, cameras, and insulin pumps (that last one is a stretch, but you get the idea) were taken over by a hacker and made to send requests and create internet traffic to increase internet activity that could take down a website, parts of the Internet, send spam emails, and an array of other things.






1 - Enter every conversation assuming you have something to learn, and sometimes that means setting aside your personal opinion. The famed therapist Scott Peck said when the person senses this acceptance, he or she will become less vulnerable and be more likely to open up.

2 - Use open-ended questions. If I ask you, "Were you terrified?" you're going to respond "Yes" or "No." Let the other person describe the feeling. He or she is the one who knows. Try asking things like, "What was that like?", or "How did that feel?" You're going to get a much more interesting response.

3 - Don't equate your experience with theirs. It's not the same. All experiences are individual. And, more important, it is not about you. You don't need to take that moment to prove how much you've suffered or how great you are.

4 - People don't care about the names and dates, all those details that you're struggling to come up with. They care about what you're like and/or what the two of you have in common.


