INTRODUCTION

- Medication Administration is a serious responsibility. A
 person administering medication must know the nature
 of each medication given. The dictionary defines the
 term medication as a substance or mixture (other than
 food) that is used to prevent disease, aide in diagnosis of
 disease, treat a disease, restore or maintain normal
 function.

IMPORTANT POINTS

Wash hands with soap and water to prevent germs or infection before and after giving medications and each time hands are contaminated.

Physician's orders are required for EACH medication



You **ARE** legally responsible for medications or treatments administered and the documentation that goes with it.





IMPORTANT POINTS

- Medication may be given in a grace period of **ONE** hour before or **ONE** hour after dosing time. This allows flexibility in schedule and activities
- Delay in administration may cause a life threatening incident
- Storage
 - * Store oral meds SEPARATELY from topical external meds
 - Fer person served refrigerated meds must be kept in **SEPARATE LOCKED** compartments away from food.

- **DOCUMENTATION** must match Dr. orders **EXACTLY**
 - If order says PRN can NOT document "as needed"
 - If order says 1 in am , 1 in pm document those words exactly



ROUTES OF ADMINISTRATION

- Oral (by mouth)
- Sublingual (under the tongue)



- Insertion (inserting drug vaginally or rectally)
- Instillation (into a body orifice)



ROUTES OF ADMINISTRATION

- Topical (external application)
- Inhalation (into respiratory tract)
- Parenteral (by injection) prohibited by

FREQUENTLY USED MEDICAL ABBREVIATIONS

- # qod or QOD = Every other day
- # qd or QD = Once a day
- # bid or BID = Twice a day
- \mathscr{I} prn or PRN = As needed
- # qhs or HS = Hour of sleep/bedtime

ABBREVIATIONS CONT...

- # pc or PC = After meals
- Otc or OTC = Over the counter
- # tid or TID = Three times a day
- # qid or QID = Four times a day
- \mathcal{F} po or PO = By mouth



ALWAYS

- SHAKE inhalers before each use unless contraindicated
- Check medication and dosage information following the <u>SIX</u> rights when administering
- Administer medications only as trained
- ALL ordered medications must be documented accurately on Medication Administration Record (MAR)



ALWAYS

- Report any error according to agency policy
- Ask if you have questions or are unsure about how to give a medication or what is to be given
- Know and adhere to laws and agency policies.


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First Aid for Seizures (Complex partial, psychomotor, temporal lobe)

Blank staring




Chewing

Wandering




Shaking

First Aid for Seizures

(Convulsive, generalized tonic-clonic, grand mal)





REASONS TO CALL AMBULANCE

- A seizure that lasts more than 5 minutes
- No "epilepsy" or "seizure disorder" identification
- Slow recovery, a second seizure or difficulty breathing afterwards
- Pregnancy or other medical diagnosis
- Any signs of injury or sickness.



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
