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THE SILENT KILLER... Diabetes is now (according to WHO), the leading cause of death and disability in Mexico. Since the economic progress of the 70s and 80s numbers have risen steadily. As wages rose, the average daily intake of calories for many did also. The introduction of cheap and popular, but less healthy food and drink options combined with a genetic predisposition among the population, has contributed significantly to the epidemic. Silent as it sneaks up on its victims, diabetes can go undetected for years. However, once discovered, managing it particularly for the poor, is no small feat! The cost of medication, treatment and transport to appointments is one thing, then following a diabetic diet is another. People who earn less than \$20 a day and work 8-12 hours often have to eat whatever they can afford or what's at hand for them. Working in the barrios we see the effects of this on individuals and families on a daily basis.



Jesús 12, (who has autism), narrowly managed to avoid amputation of her foot recently. She received treatment for her diabetes through limited insurance at the factory where she works. V&O helped by paying for custom shoe inserts and a walking cane, which were not covered. She's now back at work.

With awareness of some of the more avoidable causes of diabetes on the rise, we hope and pray its prevalence, particularly among the poor, will see a decline in the future.

UPDATE ON LUCERO (from last month). For a year Lucero helped care for her brother who died in February from meningitis. During that time her work and her own health took a back seat and consequently her foot was amputated (due to diabetes). Depression and anxiety set in for Lucero until several weeks ago, when a friend shared her situation with us and some folks in a local church. Together with them we've been working with Lucero who is making great progress in overcoming her fears, learning to put her faith and trust in God, and becoming mobile again. This week V&O is



covering the cost for handrails to be fitted in the stairway to her house, while she practices walking with crutches. Ultimately we're hoping Lucero can be fitted with a prosthetic leg. Please pray she continues growing in her confidence and strength to make that a possibility. Thank you!!
