Matthew 28

"I Am Always With You"

1 After the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to look at the tomb. 2 There was a violent earthquake, for an angel of the Lord came down from heaven and, going to the tomb, rolled back the stone and sat on it. 3 His appearance was like lightning, and his clothes were white as snow. 4 The guards were so afraid of him that they shook and became like dead men. 5 The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. 6 He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. 7 Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." 8 So the women hurried away from the tomb, afraid yet filled with joy, and ran to tell his disciples. 9 Suddenly Jesus met them. "Greetings," he said. They came to him, clasped his feet and worshiped him. 10 Then Jesus said to them, "Do not be afraid. Go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me." 11 While the women were on their way, some of the guards went into the city and reported to the chief priests everything that had happened. 12 When the chief priests had met with the elders and devised a plan, they gave the soldiers a large sum of money, 13 telling them, "You are to say, 'His disciples came during the night and stole him away while we were asleep.' 14 If this report gets to the governor, we will satisfy him and keep you out of trouble." 15 So the soldiers took the money and did as they were instructed. And this story has been widely circulated among the Jews to this very day. 16 Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. 17 When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. 18 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. 19 Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, 20 and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."



A Note from the Pastor, Rev. Kevin Channell . . .

“The Christmas story has a great cast of characters: Mary, Joseph, Gabriel, shepherds, the Innkeeper, even the donkey, a star. We find them represented on cards, and in store fronts, and Christmas ornaments. They are embellished into our psyche. Christmas is filled with festivities and Hallmark movies, Scrooge, and Santa Claus, trees, presents, and carols. But what about Easter?

Easter brings a different mood. Easter is stark. Easter is gloomy. There are no festivities building up to the holiday. We do not find store fronts decorated with symbolism of the Biblical Easter. We have had to create our own domesticated symbols of eggs, and bunnies. The days leading up to Easter are filled with terror, confrontation, earthquakes, beatings, and a public execution. Easter is about death.

But Easter is also about something else, something that cannot be depicted by earthly symbols, or logic, or experience. Easter is about resurrection, new life, and resurrected life. It began in the dark. A woman or some women go to a cemetery and find an empty grave. She or they encounter an angel or angels and are told that Jesus has risen. Mary Magdalene encounters her Lord risen from the dead. The disciples, in a locked room, are visited by the resurrected Christ. Two disciples traveling a dusty road on their way to Emmaus, walk with the one who was dead but is now raised. Jesus, even broke bread with them and they recognized him.

As it has been said by others before me—if it is true, there is nothing left to say. If it is not true, there is nothing left to say. However, whether you believe it to be true or not, life in this world has never been the same. Death is no longer the enemy it once was. Easter is the witness of power of life in the face of death. Hallelujah. Amen.



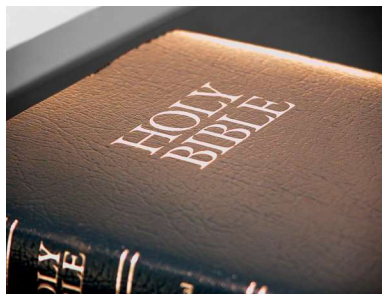


Wednesday Bible Study with Pastor Kevin

Come join us at 7:00pm on Wednesday evenings, for a time of prayer and study of God's word for today. Pastor Kevin.



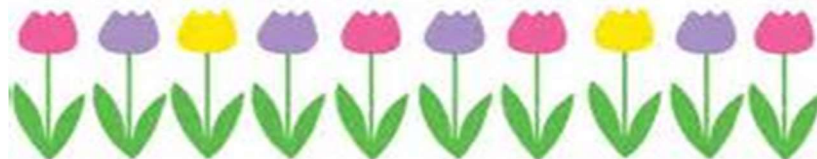

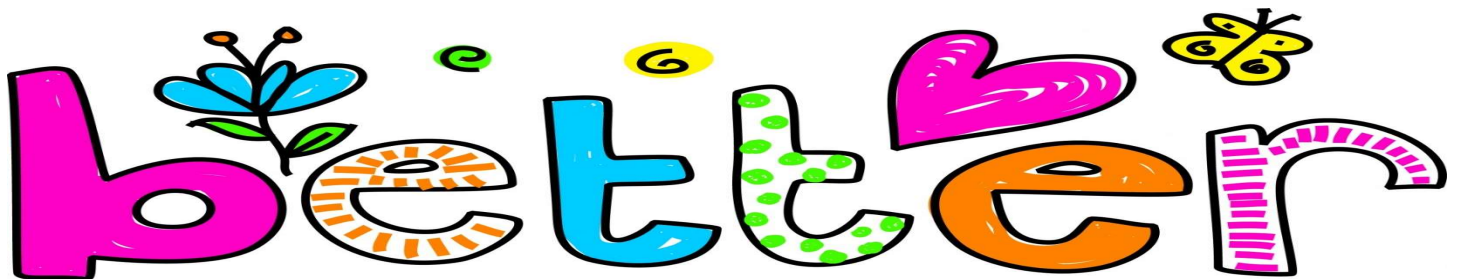
From the Witness and Congregational Care Committee:

Session Committee Updates

The Witness and Congregational Care Committee provided two initiatives during the month of March. They were:

1. A virtual World Day of Prayer Service on Friday, March 5. The twenty-five minute Service was prepared and led by Rev. Kevin Channell. It offered a time of prayer for creation, the nations, people of the world, and for the Church. The service was available on YouTube and on Facebook.
2. 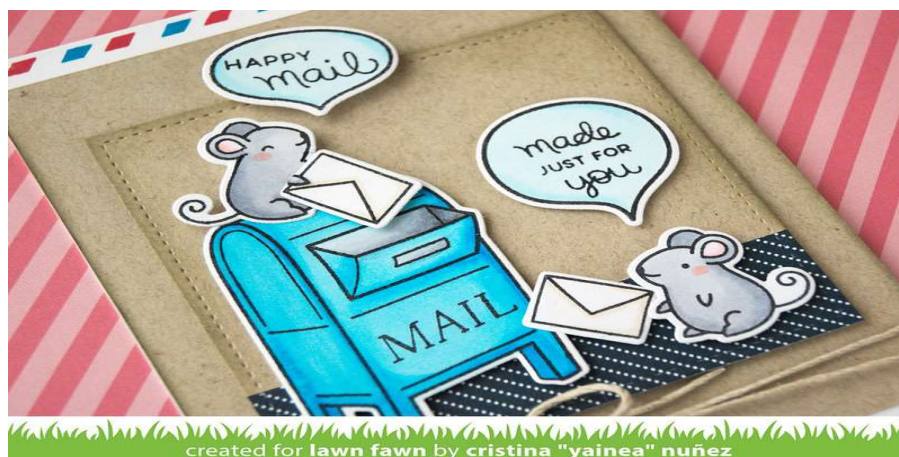
STAY IN THE LOOP!"

When there is a prayer request or concern:

1. Contact Pat Deacon, Reverend Kevin Channell, or any member of the prayer chain.
DO NOT leave a request on an answering machine.
2. Continue calling until you talk to a prayer chain member describing the nature of the request.
3. Once the request is received, it will be passed to all members of the chain and prayers of intercession will begin immediately and continue until the need is resolved.
4. If a requested concern is resolved or changes, please repeat this procedure to assist the chain as it continues to pray.

EASTER PRETZELS

Pretzels - A Long and Twisted History!!!!

What do you think of when you hear the word "pretzel"? Picnics and parties and late night snacks?

Actually, pretzels began as a Lenten food. Many early Christians of the Roman Empire did not eat milk, eggs, or fat during Lent as a way of showing religious devotion. Since bread was an important staple in their diet, they had to make it using only flour, salt, and water. They rolled the dough into slender ropes, shaping them in the form of two arms crossed in prayer. With the right hand on the left shoulder and the left hand on the right shoulder, these were called "bracellae", a Latin word meaning "little arms".

In later centuries, the Germans changed the word for crossed arms of dough to "brezels". That's how we got the modern day word pretzels.

For hundreds of years pretzels were eaten only during Lent. With the arrival of Easter, they would disappear for another year. It wasn't until the 1800s that people began to eat the tasty little breads all year-round.

In the United States, the Pennsylvania Dutch make soft pretzels. They are served warm and are yeasty and delicious. They are easy to make, and it's fun to twist the dough into the tradition "little arms".

You might want to invite a group of friends over for a pretzel making party at your house during this Lenten season. A recipe for the soft pretzels is below.

Combine: 1 tablespoon yeast
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon sugar
1½ cups warm water

Stir in 4 cups flour. Mix together. Knead.
Shape onto greased cookie sheets, brush on
beaten egg. Sprinkle with coarse salt.
Bake in oven at 425* for 12-15 minutes.
Enjoy!!!!



HE is Risen!

EMPTY TOMBS



Empty tomb rolls or Resurrection rolls as they are often called are a delicious and memorable way to teach children about the resurrection of Christ. And as an added bonus, they're delicious as well! These rolls are the perfect way to begin Easter morning.



Ingredients:

- 2 packages of crescent roll dough
- 8 marshmallows
- 3 T butter, melted
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 4 T sugar

Icing:

- 1 c. powdered sugar
- 1 T softened butter
- 2 – 3 T milk
- 1/4 tsp vanilla

Combine icing ingredients until well mixed; icing should be thin enough to drizzle easily. Pour icing into a small zip-lock bag. When the rolls are ready to be iced, snip a very tiny corner from the bottom of the plastic bag and drizzle icing over the rolls.

Directions:

Melt butter in small bowl and set aside. Combine cinnamon and sugar in another bowl, mix well and set aside. Open crescent roll tubes and unroll the dough. Separate one triangle of dough and place flat in front of you.

Show the marshmallow and explain to the children that the color white represents purity we have in God's eyes when Jesus has washed away our sins. Read **Isaiah 1:18** and **John 3:1-3**.

Take a marshmallow and dip in melted butter, then roll in cinnamon/sugar mixture. Place the coated marshmallow at the wide end of the triangle of dough and gently roll up; work dough around marshmallow and pinch edges to seal well. Take a second triangle of dough and place the covered marshmallow at the wide end and again roll up and pinch to seal. You will have covered the marshmallow with two triangles of dough and it should be well sealed.

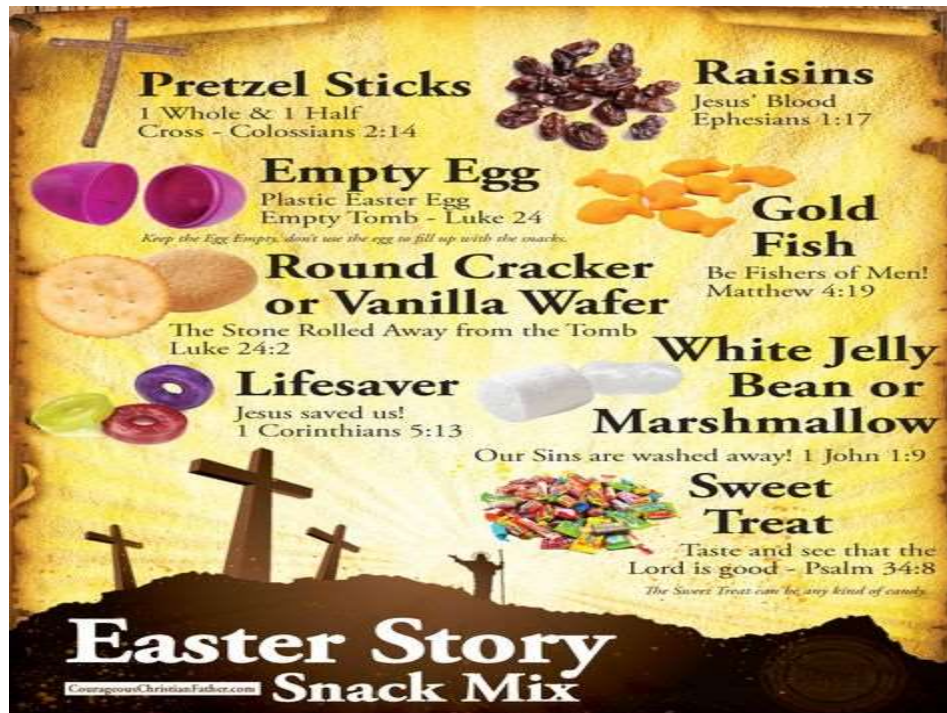
As you are coating and wrapping the marshmallow explain that the marshmallow represents the body of Jesus which was annointed with oil (butter) and spices (cinnamon/sugar) before being wrapped in cloth (dough) and placed in the tomb. Explain that the tomb was them sealed tightly (pinching the dough thoroughly to seal). Read **Matthew 27:57-60**.

Place on a lightly greased baking sheet or silpat. Repeat until all of the marshmallows have been covered. Bake at 375° F for 14 to 18 minutes or until golden brown. Let cool slightly and drizzle with icing.

When you are ready to serve the rolls, give each person one and explain how the tomb was empty and Jesus had risen from the dead. Let everyone experience the empty tomb when they break open their Empty Tomb or Resurrection Roll. Read **Matthew 28:1-9**.



EASTER STORY SNACK MIX



ROAST LEG OF LAMB

INGREDIENTS

1/4 c. plus 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil, plus more greasing
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 tbsp. minced rosemary, plus 2 sprigs
1 tbsp. minced thyme
1 (6 lb.) leg of lamb
kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
2 heads garlic, cloves peeled
8 oz. cipollini onions
2 lemons, halved

DIRECTIONS

- Heat oven to 400°. In a small bowl, combine 1/4 cup oil, garlic, chopped rosemary, and thyme.
- Place lamb in a large roasting dish, then season all over with salt and pepper.
- Brush herb oil all over lamb (you won't use it all right now). Roast 30 minutes.
- Meanwhile, in a medium bowl, stir together whole garlic cloves, onions, rosemary sprigs, and lemons with 1 tablespoon oil, salt, and pepper.
- Reduce oven to 350°. Spread garlic, onions, rosemary, and lemon halves evenly around lamb, then coat lamb in more herb oil. Add ¼ cup water to roasting dish, then roast for 1 to 1 ½ hours more, until meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part of the roast registers about 145° to 150°.
- Let lamb rest 15 minutes before carving and serving.

Potato Potluck Dish

2 pounds potatoes, diced	2 teaspoons onion powder
2 teaspoons minced garlic	2 cups sour cream
2 ½ cups condensed cream of mushroom soup	2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
⅔ cup shredded mozzarella cheese	

Directions

Bring a large saucepan of salted water to a boil. Place potatoes in the saucepan and cook until tender but firm, about 15 minutes. Drain and cool.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9x13 inch baking dish.

In a large bowl, mix the potatoes, onion powder, minced garlic, sour cream, cream of mushroom soup and Cheddar cheese. Pour into the baking dish. Sprinkle with mozzarella cheese.

Bake in the preheated oven 45 minutes, or until browned and bubbly.

Foolproof Rib Roast

1 (5 pound) standing beef rib roast	2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon ground black pepper	1 teaspoon garlic powder

Directions

Allow roast to stand at room temperature for at least 1 hour.

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees. Combine the salt, pepper and garlic powder in a small cup. Place the roast on a rack in a roasting pan so that the fatty side is up and the rib side is on the bottom. Rub the seasoning onto the roast.

Roast for 1 hour in the preheated oven. Turn the oven off and leave the roast inside. Do not open the door. Leave it in there for 3 hours. 30 to 40 minutes before serving, turn the oven back on at 375 degrees to reheat the roast.

The internal temperature should be at least 145 degrees Remove from the oven and let rest for 10 minutes before carving into servings.

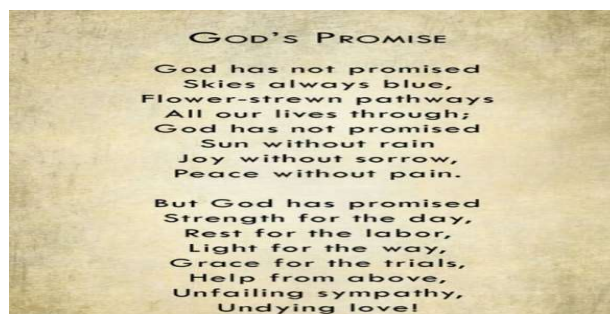
