
COLLIERSTOWN SCHOOL BAGS READY FOR STUDENTS!

The Collierstown Presbyterian Women concluded their annual "School Bag Campaign" on Sunday, August 20. Each year the PW works with Church World Service to fill and deliver canvas tote bags with seven basic school supplies needed by students in the United States and around the world. The PW set as its 2023 goal to make 200 school bags, an increase of 23 bags over the 177 bags prepared in the 2022 campaign.

The church family was invited on July 23 to take canvas tote bags and fill them with the required school supplies or to make a financial contribution that could be used to purchase supplies for the bags or to pay for the shipping and handling costs incurred in sending them to students around the world. On August 20 a record breaking TWO HUNDRED AND FORTY-FOUR school bags were returned to the church sanctuary filling the first pew and the floor surrounding the organ. Special thanks to PW member Louise Tardy for making the sturdy and attractive canvas totes that were filled for the students that will receive these special gifts. (Louise has made over 5000 totes that have been used in the CWS school bag campaigns.) A team of PW members will check each bag's contents and package them for their journey to Church World Service who will handle their delivery to needy students. Each bag will be sent on its way with a prayer that the student who receives it will come to know Jesus. Many thanks to everyone who helped make this PW project a churchwide effort that will provide the supplies needed for learning to so many children.

ONE MORE THING...

The boxed Collierstown school bags will be taken to the Brethren Disaster Ministries building located at the Shenandoah District Office of the Church of the Brethren in Weyers Cave, VA. This location is an official pick-up point for Church World Service that is used by a number of churches and denominations in providing donations to CWS. The facility welcomes volunteers from youth to seniors and is handicapped accessible. It is equipped to assemble health kits, disaster buckets, as well as school bags for Church World Service. The CPC PW has volunteered to go to Weyers Cave to help with assembling CWS kits. Please pray for additional opportunities for the Collierstown congregation to help meet the needs of others by sending teams of volunteers to this location to assist in the work being done so close to home. 


NIGHT CIRCLE BIBLE STUDY SET TO BEGIN IN SEPTEMBER

RECIPE CORNER

UNSTUFFED PEPPERS -

LOOKING FOR A WAY TO USE ALL THOSE FRESH PEPPERS FROM YOU GARDEN. GIVE THIS A TRY

- 1 cup uncooked instant rice; 1 pound ground beef
- 2 medium green peppers, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1/2 cup chopped onion; 1 jar (26 ounces) marinara sauce
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt-free seasoning blend
- 1/2 cup shredded Italian cheese blend
- 1/2 cup seasoned bread crumbs; 1 tablespoon olive oil

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. Cook rice according to package directions.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large cast-iron or other ovenproof skillet, cook beef, green peppers and onion over medium-high heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in rice, marinara sauce and seasoning blend. Stir in cheese.
- 3. Toss bread crumbs and oil; sprinkle over the top. Bake until heated through and topping is golden brown, 8-10 minutes.

GERMAN POTATO SALAD

5 lbs. new potatoes	8 strips of bacon	1 small red onion
3 green onions thinly sliced	1 ½ cups water	½ cup white vinegar
1/3 cup canola oil	1 ¼ tsp salt	½ tsp pepper

- Place potatoes in a stock pot add water to cover, bring to boil. Reduce heat, cook, uncovered 15 mins or until tender. Drain potatoes cool slightly.
- Cut potatoes into slices, place in a large bowl, stir in bacon onion and green onions.
- In a small bowl whisk the remaining ingredients, until blended, pour over salad, and toss gently to coat.
- Serve warm refrigerate leftovers.

FRESH CORN SALAD

4 cups fresh or frozen corn, rinsed and drained; 1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved 1/3 c crumbled feta; ¼ red onion finely chopped; ¼ cup basil, thinly sliced; 3 T (extra virgin olive oil); Juice of 1 lime; Kosher salad; Freshly ground black pepper

Toss all ingredients together, season with salt and pepper, chill.

Information and support are available free to anyone diagnosed with a heart condition or disease and also for those who are the "caregivers" of heart patients!

Any age, any diagnosis... all can receive support and information free.

Hospitals that treat heart patients have welcomed volunteers who have previously undergone heart treatment including heart surgery and/or transplants. There is a volunteer group available at area hospitals, and here at CPC we have a volunteer among us that would love to share information with you: Kay Lewis.

Ten years ago, Kay Lewis had a heart attack while working in the yard. 6 weeks later she had cardiac triple bypass surgery in Roanoke. While recovering in the intensive care cardiac unit Kay received a visit from a Mended Hearts volunteer who had undergone the very same heart attack and bypass surgery 25 years before. These volunteers provide information and a visible hope to current patients trying to understand what life could be like after such a diagnosis or surgery. That one visit by a volunteer provided Kay more support and realistic hope than any doctor could predict!

Within months after surgery, Kay became a member of the Mended Hearts and soon thereafter became a trained volunteer to visit other patients and their families so she could give them the same sense of hope that she received. Kay has been very active for the past 10 years, and she is the current President of a chapter located near her Florida home. She also just completed a two year term serving nationally as the Assistant Regional Director for the southern region of the US. She is a trained accredited visitor for heart surgery patients, and is available to talk to other heart patients or their family members about their personal concerns of living with a heart condition.
