What is dysphagia?

People with dysphagia have difficulty swallowing and may even experience pain while swallowing (odynophagia).

SYMPTOMS

While often varied, common symptoms include:



Coughing during or immediately following eating or drinking



Wet or gurgly sounding voice during or after eating or drinking



Extra effort or time needed to chew or swallow



Food or liquid leaking from or remaining in the mouth



Recurring pneumonia or chest congestion after eating



Weight loss or dehydration, due to decreased food/liquid intake

CAUSES

- Head and neck cancer
- Stroke
- Head or neck injury
- Cerebral Palsy
- Parkinson's disease (PD)
- Birth abnormalities (e.g. cleft)
- Esophageal infection or irritation
- Dementia



DIAGNOSTIC TESTS

The most commonly conducted tests used by speech-language pathologists include:

MODIFIED BARIUM SWALLOW (MBS)

Real-time visualization of the oral and pharyngeal structures and function of swallowing as the patient ingests various consistencies of food or liquid that contain barium.

FLEXIBLE ENDOSCOPIC EVALUATION OF SWALLOWING (FEES)

An endoscopic procedure providing visualization of the pharyngeal and laryngeal structures before and after the swallow.

TREATMENT

Treatment depends on the cause, symptoms, and type of swallowing problem. A speech - language pathologist specialized in swallowing disorders may recommend:

- Swallowing exercises to improve muscle movement
- Swallowing postures, often involving the rotation or tilting of the head
- Modified diet, recommending solid and liquid textures that are easier & safer to swallow
- Referral to a physician to consider alternative treatment options
