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INTRODUCTION: THE BIBLE AS A KINGDOM TEXTBOOK

THE SEVEN COVENANTS: A DIVINE CURRICULUM

To understand the Kingdom of Yahweh, we must approach the Bible as a divine syllabus. There are seven major covenants in Scripture, each representing a stage in the education of Yahweh's sons. Each covenant builds on the previous, revealing a fuller picture of the Kingdom, until finally it is transposed from the visible to the invisible—from the shadow to the substance.

1. The Sabbath Covenant – Genesis 2:2–3

2. The Adamic Covenant – Genesis 3:15–24

Following mankind's disobedience, Yahweh introduces a promise—a Seed who will crush the serpent's head. This covenant does not just pronounce judgment; it reveals the beginning of Yahweh's redemptive government. The Kingdom will come through suffering, and through a man. This covenant sets the stage for understanding spiritual warfare, atonement, and the coming of the King.

3. The Noahic Covenant – Genesis 9:1–17

After the flood, Yahweh renews His covenant with humanity and institutes human government. This stage teaches law and order among the nations. The rainbow becomes a sign not just of mercy, but of global responsibility. This covenant reveals Yahweh's intent to preserve the earth until all things are fulfilled.

4. The Abrahamic Covenant – Genesis 12, 15, 17

Here, Yahweh selects a man to become the father of many nations. He promises a land, a lineage, and a blessing. But more than that, Abraham becomes the prototype of covenant sonship—believing Yahweh and receiving righteousness. This covenant introduces faith, inheritance, and nationhood, and foretells that through Abraham's seed, the whole world will be blessed.

5. The Mosaic Covenant – Exodus 19–24

At Sinai, the Kingdom begins to take governmental form. Israel becomes a nation under Yahweh's rule, with a divine constitution—the Torah. This covenant includes law, calendar, worship, and priesthood. It reveals the structure of the Kingdom and sets Israel apart as a holy nation to model Yahweh's government to the world.

6. The Davidic Covenant – 2 Samuel 7

The Kingdom receives its royal house in this covenant. Yahweh promises David that one of his sons will reign forever on His throne. This points to Yahshua (Jesus), the Messianic King, who embodies the fusion of divine authority and human lineage. This covenant affirms the eternal rulership of

the Son of David and the future restoration of the Kingdom.

7. The Renewed Covenant – Jeremiah 31:31–34; Hebrews 8

Often called the “New Covenant,” this is not a destruction of previous covenants but their fulfillment and transposition. The laws move from stone tablets to hearts. The priesthood is transformed into spiritual intercession. The temple becomes the assembly of believers. The Kingdom is now within, awaiting its final external manifestation at Yahshua’s return.

Transposition: From Physical to Spiritual

The word transposition means to transfer something from one position to another. In biblical terms, it means to elevate the Kingdom from its physical expressions into its final spiritual reality. Every law, every feast, every priest, every sacrifice was a shadow of something greater. In the Renewed Covenant, the Kingdom is no longer bound by geography or ethnicity—it becomes universal, internal, and eternal.

This does not mean the Torah is abolished—it is fulfilled. It is not thrown away but raised to a higher plane. Yahweh’s Kingdom government is now being written on hearts, producing obedient sons who walk not by compulsion but by internal transformation.

Time: The Divine Classroom

Time is not just a passive setting—it is an active tool in Yahweh’s teaching strategy. The Sabbath covenant introduced Kingdom time, and every subsequent covenant unfolds within its cycles. The feasts, the weeks, the jubilees—they are all divine appointments in the classroom of time.

Abolished the Law – replacing Torah with lawlessness disguised as grace.

Substituted Passover with Easter – replacing Yahweh’s appointed time with a pagan fertility rite.

Created a False Messiah – replacing the human Messiah, Yahshua, with a Greco-Roman idol named Jesus Christ (Hesus Krishna).

This system leads to two prophetic tragedies:

The Transgression of Desolation: rejecting the true identity of the Messiah.

The Abomination of Desolation: placing an image in the heart and calling it “God.”

The Bible is the textbook of the Kingdom.

The seven covenants are the curriculum.

The Sabbath is the calendar.

Transposition is the goal.

Babylon is the obstacle.

Only when we return to the covenants, embrace Yahweh's Name, honor His Sabbath, and follow His true Son will we graduate from religious confusion into Kingdom maturity.
