"Black to Ghana" guides readers on some of the most popular places to visit throughout Ghana's 16 regions including lounges, slave dungeons and other sites of historical interest, parks and natural wonders, beaches, festivals, and shopping areas. It also includes step-by-step instructions on obtaining

travel documents and vaccinations, while preparing travelers with helpful tips on planning, budgeting and

packing.

second safest in sub-Saharan Africa, Ghana has become an attractive country to visit in recent years.
