Here are my thoughts on prepping for the upcoming trip to north Idaho:

The single best read is Timothy Egan's <u>The Big Burn: Teddy Roosevelt and the Fire that Saved America</u>, published in 2009. Most libraries should have it or it's easy to get online. Egan grew up in Spokane and is a great storyteller. He tells the story of the fire season well and the historical changes it caused. Stephen Pyne also wrote about the 1910 fires, but I remember his book as being pretty dense and hard to read. There is also a pictorial history of the 1910 fires put together by Stan Collins. I will try to find a copy and bring it with me.

The PBS American Experience series did a one-hour documentary based on Egan's book, also called <u>The Big Burn</u>. I haven't seen it, but I intend to watch it before we go. I'm guessing it's easy to find to stream free or rent. Libraries will also have it in DVD or CD version.
