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

at Bert and Ann Atwood's




Please bring your own picnic lunch. We will have


a barbecue set up for those who wish to cook. We will provide condiments and cold soft drinks, wine, and beer.

## NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Tt's time once again to nominate Directors to the Nor-Cal Board.

The following Directors' terms expire December 31, 2005: Bill Schlotter completes his second term and is thus ineligible to be renominated; Warren Lubich has indicated that he does not wish to be re-elected, and our current Chairman, Kevin King completes his first term and has agreed to be re-nominated. That leaves two Director's positions open for three-year terms.

Nominations of candidates for the Office of Director may be made by any Active member of Nor-Cal. Submit nominations in writing, to be received, **not later than October 10**th to Chairman Kevin King, for forwarding to the *Nominating Committee*.

Nominations must be signed by no fewer than two Active members of Nor-Cal, and include the name of the nominee with his or her consent to be nominated and agreement to serve, if elected.

Nominations close on October 10th.

### JOHN LAUTER CONCERT REVIEW

Our August Nor-Cal concert took place at the beautiful Castro Theatre in San Francisco.

Upon entering, it was immediately clear that the Castro management is doing some wonderful things to the theatre. There was evidence of new decorative painting, gold leafing, cleaning, lighting, etc. The theatre looked terrific.

We arrived early, (doors opening at 8:30 a.m.) and settled in ready to hear the truly grand Castro Wurlitzer. Our artist for the morning was **John Lauter**. John is from the Detroit area. He has played extensively in that area with concerts at the Detroit Fox, Oriental Theatre in Chicago, Krughoff and VanDerMolen residences, Mundelein near Chicago, as well as the Denver Paramount and previously for Nor-Cal at the Castro. We have been trying for quite a while to arrange to have John back to play for us. Somehow there were always schedule conflicts. It was very nice to finally have him back at the Castro to play for us.

To ask any organist to play a concert at that hour is demanding a lot, believe me. John came through as the pro he is, playing a nicely varied program utilizing the full range of the Castro Theatre Wurlitzer. John's program included rousing marches, favorite ballads, bouncy novelty numbers, as well as some lesserknown numbers I had not heard before. We heard music written by Robert Farnon, Duke Ellington, Cole Porter, as well as a medley by his favorite composer George Gershwin. He also included a dedication to his wife Amy, who was there visiting the Bay Area for the first time, by playing the song Once In Love With Amy.

John worked hard to keep all of our sleep deprived, red eyes open. The audience was sleepy and quiet, but very appreciative of John's musical offerings. Perhaps he should have opened with *You're the Cream in My Coffee* or *Java Jive*. I could have used a medley of favorite "caffeinated tunes".



Things back here at home continue to progress. It won't be very long now before our own Nor-Cal Wurlitzer jumps from 35 to 41 ranks of pipes. The organ crew is nearing the completion of adding the additional six ranks of pipes in the center chamber. Some of these ranks are truly rare items

In some cases less than a handful of these particular ranks were ever made by the Wurlitzer Company. We should all be proud that we have a real museum collection of rarities at Berkeley. ### DIRECTIONS TO THE MONTEREY STATE THEATRE

Better figure on an hour and a half or more drive from San Jose. (Mapquest says 75 Minutes and 69 Miles from I-280/680 and 101 via 101/156). Two recommended routes are:

### SCENIC ROUTE (slow, but beautiful)

Take Hwy 17 through the Santa Cruz Mountains to State Hwy 1, following signage to Monterey. Take the exit toward Monterey and the ramp toward Fisherman's Wharf / Peninsula College, merge onto Fremont St., which becomes Munras Ave. Turn slight right onto Alvarado St. Note the many one-way streets! The Monterey State Theatre will be in the second block, on your right.

### ALTERNATE ROUTE (much faster)

Take **Hwy 101** or **I-280** through San Jose, then **Hwy 101** through Gilroy to **Hwy 156** in Prunedale and follow the signs to **Monterey** and then as above to the Theatre.

### SUMMARY OF AUGUST 2005 BOARD of DIRECTORS MEETING

This is a summary of the minutes of the Nor-Cal Board meeting of Aug. 9, 2005:

Treasurer **Don Siefert**, reported that we have \$93,641.36 in our bank accounts and cash on hand. He has reviewed the Nor-Cal books with an accountant friend who says that our books are in the form of a running journal. The accountant has noted that we do not have a petty cash journal.

Program Chairman **Warren Lubich** announced the following confirmed events:

August 14 (9:00a.m.): **John Lauter** at Castro Theatre.

November 13: Tom Hazleton at BCT.

December (TBA) Annual Business Meeting.

April 8, 2006: Morton Madness, **Jim Riggs.** 

May 14, 2006: Lew Williams at BCT.

The previously scheduled October event at the Grand Lake Theatre will not take place.

It was suggested that there be a stage door social at BCT in January.

#### **Berkeley**

Crew Chief **Bill Schlotter** reported that the organ is two wires (one ground wire and one trem wire) away from being a 4/36. The new rank is a musette. It will need to be voiced. Wind lines have been installed from the regulators to the chests for the next five ranks. The two tremulants need to be connected to the chests. Wiring for these ranks is well underway.

Work on the outside trap shelf is underway.

The 6-volt "ah-oogah" type auto horn has been installed in the bottom of the piano, next to the air-raid siren.

#### **Salinas**

Bill Schlotter said that Central Indiana Chapter arrived on August 7th to remove the former San Francisco El Capitan Wurlitzer from the Salinas Fox Theatre. The agreement was that they would also take the Paramount Theatre Publix #1 relay but they have no interest in it. Tom DeLay is working with them on Nor-Cal's behalf. We will need to have a work party to remove items Nor-Cal will be retaining. These include several pipe chests, some ranks of pipes, and a 10 HP blower. Much of it is sellable.

#### Nor-Cal 2003 Tax Returns

It appears that the 2003 returns have now been prepared and submitted. **Anthony Gravante** has advised Chairman **Kevin King** that he now has everything he needs to prepare the 2004 returns.


