JONAS NORDWALL CONCERT NOVEMBER 2, 2008

What a great start to NorCal's 2008-2009 concert season! Jonas Nordwall never disappoints his audience, but I truthfully thought that this was the most exciting concert I've seen Jonas perform. As can be seen from the Playlist below, Jonas transcended the usual categories of music we hear at theatre organ concerts. Yes, there were show tunes (from Sound of Music to Jumbo). Yes, there was blues (12-bar blues style). Yes, there was classical (Saint-Saëns, Mendelssohn, Grieg transcriptions). Yes there was jazz. Yes, there was nostalgic music (Ellington, Jesse Crawford). Yes, there was ragtime (can you say 'Scott Joplin'?). Yes, there were novelties (Jingle Bells á la George Wright, featuring our tuned sleigh bells!). And that was just the beginning!

Jonas knows our NorCal Wurlitzer, having graced us with several concerts, over the years. It shows, in his deft use of its distinctive voices, to create just the right emotional impact for every phrase.

Jonas made a brief announcement about the Young Organists Workshop and Youth Camp that he, **Donna Parker**, **Jelani Eddington**, **Clark Wilson**, and **Jeff Weiler** devote so much of their time and effort to.

To top it off, this was the première of our new keyboard video projection system, thanks to the engineering skills and hard work of **Frank La Fetra**. The system worked flawlessly and added a new layer of enjoyment to the concert, permitting the clear visibility of the artist's fingers on the manuals, projected on a 10-foot wide screen at the right edge of the stage.


On a different note (you'll pardon the expression), how many of you were aware that one of the most extensive collections of popular and light-classical sheet music in the country is located right here in Oakland? The **Paramount Theatre Music Library** (Jean Cunningham, Librarian) consists of ten distinct collections, with a total of approximately 100,000 entries dating from the 1850s to 1980. The major source of early music is the Walter J. Rudolph Library collected by Rudolph during his fifty years as a vaudeville orchestra leader in San Francisco.
