THE ATWOOD HOME

—by Bert Atwood

“Our Great Room is a multi-purpose room designed to serve as Living Room, Dining Room, and Music Room. The acoustics in the room turned out to be quite nice. You can stand in one corner with your back to the rest of the room, speak in a normal voice, and be heard clearly anywhere in the rest of the room. This was not due to any great sound engineering – but it was based

on a number of ‘Rules of Thumb’.

I give great credit for the acoustics to **George Thompson** who was Editor of the *Theatre Organ Journal* for twenty years starting in the summer of 1961. George lived in the Salinas area as did I and I was privileged to play his Wurlitzer on numerous occasions. This was about 40 years ago and even then I was dreaming about a home on Clear Lake complete with Theatre Organ. George’s Rules of Thumb were:

Make the listening room as big – volume wise – as possible.

Have a cathedral ceiling.

Have a loft.

Do not have all walls parallel to one another.

Although we ended up installing an Allen

GW-4, the house was built for real pipes and thus has real pipe chambers made of 8-inch concrete blocks with all voids filled with concrete grout. The chamber ceilings are one continuous slab of concrete. The upper 10 feet of the chamber walls are finished with ultra fine plaster to reflect sound waves. I added one Rule of Thumb on my own by making the distance from the chambers to the opposite wall 31½ feet (just under the 32 foot wave length of a 16 foot open pipe pedal note). The room is roughly 26 feet wide.

Going back to George’s Rules of Thumb,


we made the room big by making it multi-purpose *and* by making the eave height 10 feet rather than the standard 8 feet thus increasing the volume 25%. The cathedral ceiling peaks at 19[ft] and there are lofts at both ends of the room which add significant volume to the room. And last but not least, we designed the wall between the Great Room and Loggia to be angled so it isn’t parallel with the opposite (Entry) wall (see sketch). I learned the word ‘Loggia’ visiting the Vanderbilt Mansion is Newport, Rhode Island many years ago.

The floor is carpeted but we have no


curtains or drapes in the room. I like some of Allen’s Virtual Acoustics added but others – **Kevin King** in particular – don’t think they’re needed.

Many friends and family have contributed to the organ project. Major contributors that are familiar to theatre organ society members include **Bill Schlotter, Chris Nichols, Tom De Lay, Bert Robinson, Elbert Dawson, Wes Cavett, Kevin King, John Nelson, Dwight Beacham, Neal Wood** and my wife Ann. I give many thanks to them and all the other unnamed contributors.

Special thanks also to **Herk Deifenbacher** who helped design and build the house and always encouraged me whenever I questioned my ability to complete the project.”
