

His organ installations had a definite Ron Downer style, which was neat and workmanlike. Ron was a really nice and friendly guy. I am glad I had the good fortune to know him.

Ron Downer had a lot of friends, fellow organist enthusiasts throughout the organ world. He had a list of fellow organ enthusiasts telephone numbers. The list filled a small book! Ron kept in frequent contact with many on the list, so he was always aware of the latest organ enthusiast news

His Mother worked in the office of the Southern Pacific Railroad where he spent much of his free time as a youngster with crews at the SP round house in South San Francisco. Ron's dad's second job was as a church organist. No wonder Ron became a steam and organ enthusiast!

He built an organ studio behind his parents' home and installed a 3-manual Wurlitzer, which grew to over 20 ranks including many 16-ft extensions. Several young enthusiasts learned the basics of organ restoration and installation by helping Ron work on that organ.

Ron always had a least one pet dog and usually named them after an organ Ron was a charter member of NorCal. While he didn't work on the organ crew, he made significant donations of parts to the club's Wurlitzer installation in the Berkeley Community Theater, and was always available to offer advice.

He is survived by his wife **Alexis**, a sister in Redding and a nephew out of state.

Ron will be buried at sea by *Neptune Services* in August. There will not be a public service.

Remembering **Jon Johnston** — Jon was a well known and respected pipe organ technician, tuner, voicer, and finisher.

He apprenticed to the brilliant **Paul Schoenstein** where he learned skills that he would exhibit throughout his life. Jon was also an accomplished theatre organist who shyed away from public playing but wowed all who were lucky enough to hear him play. He had the rare gift of 'perfect pitch' which gave him amazing tuning skills.

He had a wild sense of humor that often caught you off-guard in moments and situations where you dared not laugh out loud. For nearly 20 years Jon cared for and tuned the *Avenue Wurlitzer*. Visiting artists would comment on the tight tuning and finishing for which Jon was largely responsible.

Jon was a great teacher who shared his extensive knowledge with everyone who sought it. Those of us in NorCal who knew Jon for 50 years will miss his humor, talent, and kindness.

School's out, and lots of things are happening at BCT. From looking at the organ crew's report (a new feature for the Windsheet to help keep our membership informed regarding the great things our talented organ crew is working on), you'll notice that we're doing some 'Spring Cleaning' of sorts.

Over time, we've accumulated many ranks of pipes and other organ components, and we really need to get them organized, and get what we don't need into hands of others who can put them to good use. The crew has done a super job in the inventory process!

We also want to minimize the amount of storage space that we're utilizing in the BCT, in light of looking forward to building a strong relationship with the new theatre management, as well as the school district itself.

My recent discussions with Al Wilright, Operations/Facility Manager, indicated that the 'follow-on' project for BCT, which includes handrails and safety curbing in the auditorium, should be completed sometime this summer, which would then allow for the 'release' of the Berkeley Community Theatre to public use. That would be tremendous news, and allow NorCal to once again plan for a concert season. Keep those fingers crossed!

On another note, Berkeley High School has received funding through donations to hire a technical manager to support the theatre. The position will be filled beginning with the 2012-13 school year. This is welcome news for NorCal and hopefully will allow our scheduled concert seasons to continue

Because part of the funding for the stage manager position will come from Federal Perkins Vocational Education funds, the position will involve teaching this course to BHS Students in addition to the management duties.

In other happenings, it was wonderful to see a good turnout of NorCal and Sierra Chapter members at the national ATOS convention held in Los Angeles. This was my first opportunity to hear all of those great instruments (with the exception of Old Town Music Hall, where I performed last year). That, on top of seeing the amazing automobile collection at San Sylmar, and a fantastic day at Universal Studios (no, that wasn't on the convention docket), made for a fantastic week. Even better was the chance to meet and chat with theatre organ aficionados from all over, including the two chaperones of the Rye Academy students from the UK. In my mind, the convention was absolutely terrific, and I'm also looking forward to another great one next year in Atlanta. Hope to see you there!

ORGAN CREW REPORT

Even though the concert season is still in limbo, the organ crew headed by **Bill Schlotter,** still meets every Saturday to maintain the *NorCal Wurlitzer*. Along with the usual maintenance, this summer the crew has embarked on a project that has been long overdue; that is to inventory the many organ parts that have been donated over the years.

Every crate of organ pipes and parts were counted, sorted, and their condition noted. Parts destined for the completion of the *NorCal Wurlitzer* (yes, there are still more pipes to add) will be stored in the upper relay room, and the rest will be sold to individuals or donated to other chapters for their organs. **Bill Coale** is working with ATOS to establish a national pipe organ parts registry so that chapters can coordinate the exchange of material. The good news is that we have already sold several ranks of pipes, and there are some more impending sales.

You are always invited to come and see the organ crew in action on Saturdays from 10:00am to 5:00pm. Because we are not always sure the theatre will be available to work on the organ, call the NorCal answering machine at (510) 644-2707 for status prior to leaving home for your visit on Saturday.
