After an eight-year heroic battle with Melanoma, Bert Atwood passed away on June 16th at his lakefront home in Clearlake. He will be missed. He was a member of NorCal almost from its beginning.

Prior to his affiliation with NorCal, Bert acquired a large Robert Morton organ. He designed his beautiful Clearlake home with pipe chambers to accommodate the organ. Realizing the amount of labor and maintenance required for the organ, Bert opted to buy a four manual Allen organ and donated much of the Robert Morton to the Bob Hope Theatre in Stockton. Bert retained the percussions, traps, and swell shades which were added to the Allen.

Several organ work parties occurred over the years to improve upon an already wonderful organ installation. Bert and Ann were wonderful hosts.

Bert received treatment at UCSF in San Francisco. Many of those treatments were the beginnings of new successful treatments that are now common practice. His contribution has helped many lives. Unfortunately, the melanoma returned again and could not be cured. He died peacefully at home, surrounded by his family and friends. We will miss Bert, his limericks, his puns, and his ever-present friendship.

A celebration of his life was held at his home at Clearlake on June 29th. Many organ friends and friends of the Atwood family attended. A memorial was held on their dock. After the memorial, **Kevin King** played the organ.

We will miss you Bert.

RICHARD HILLS CONCERT Sunday June 21, 2015 Art Woodworth

My thoughts on some of the selections - of course they were all excellent:

The score for "High Society" was written by **Cole Porter**. Richard's medley included "You're Sensational", "Well, Have You Ever", and "True Love".

"Cheeky Chappie" was a very British style tremolo-off novelty number with an infectious melody line. The "Mame" medley filled out the first half quite nicely, including the haunting "If He Walked Into My Life Again" and ending of course with "Mame."

The "Boots and Saddle" included short pieces of many familiar tunes from our American past ranging from "Home on the Range," to Cole Porter's "Don't Fence Me In."

"Shooting Star" was another lively British novelty number. The Irving Berlin medley included most of the Fred and Ginger numbers, such as "Let's Face the Music and Dance," and "The Piccolino." The medley also included "They Say That Falling in Love is Wonderful."

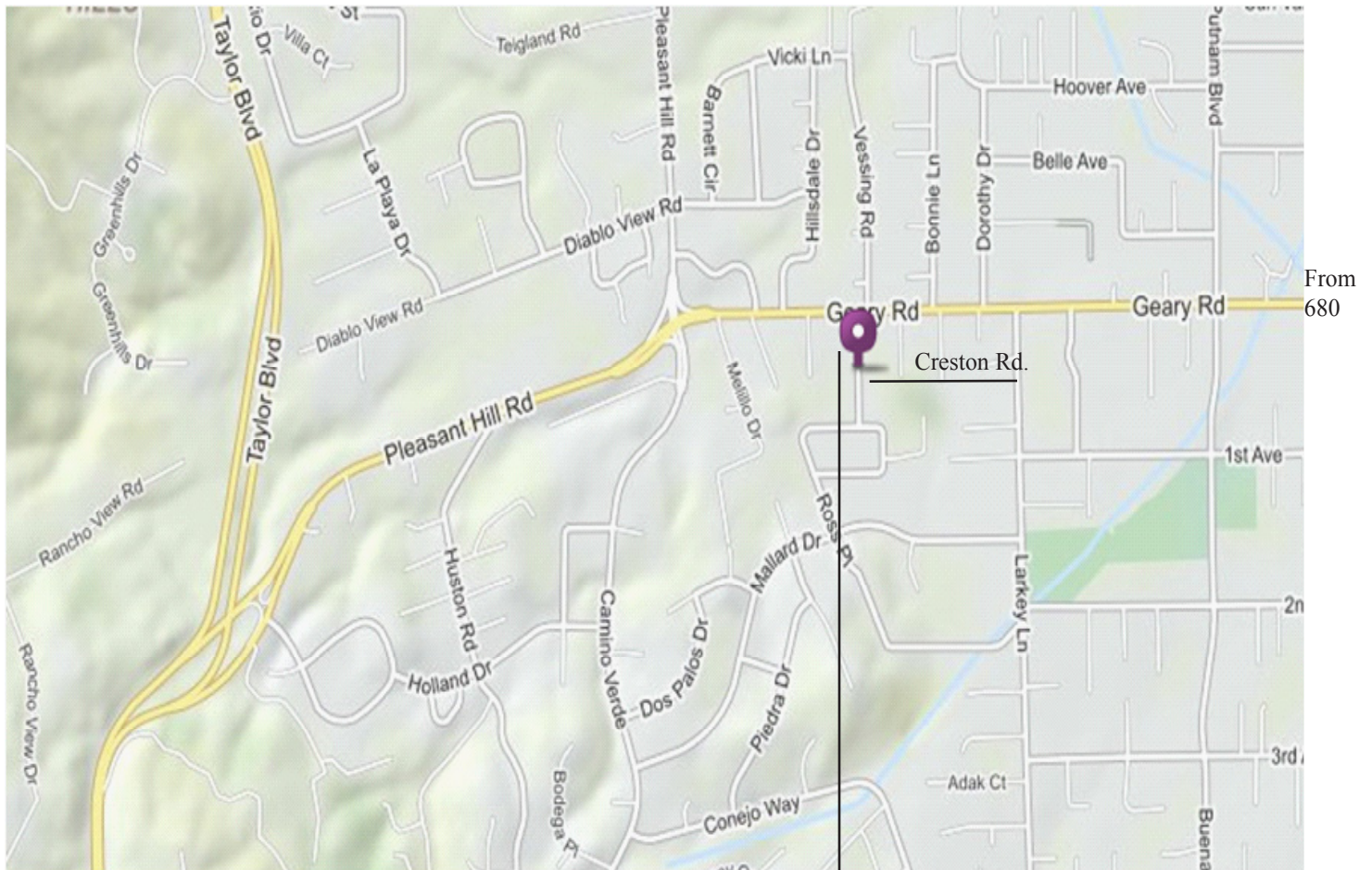

Creston Road intersects Geary Road. The simplest way is from highway 680. Take the "Treat Blvd.-Geary Road" exit. You want to go west from the freeway up Geary Road. My street, Creston, is almost exactly one mile west of 680 up Geary Road.

You can also get there from highway 24 by taking the Pleasant Hill Road North exit off 24, go north on Pleasant Hill Road over the little hill, stay to the right and it turns into Geary Road. My street is just past the little Palos Verdes shopping center.
