ITEMS OF INTEREST

Chief McConnell...

- Purchased the portable building for the police department. The unit is installed and now awaiting interior remodeling.
- Attended an open house for the new El Paso County 911 District building.
- Two new police reserves were sworn in. Our current number of reserves is at 9 but this number constantly changes as personnel come and go.
- Attended a building facilitates meeting to discuss the current status of the committee activities.
- Met with Mayor Mendoza and Fire Chief Menendez regarding Fourth of July activities and fireworks safety in general.
- We upgraded and repaired our movies in the park speakers. We have been experiencing difficulties with poor audio so we purchased two new larger speakers that are capable of supplying enough audio to fill the park. This seemed to work well.



COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION



Our Communications department made a change in uniform. The new uniform consists of a black polo with a logo and jeans. The logo includes a headset with the Fire Department and Police badge. Above the headset is the phrase "Together as One".

A meeting was arranged with the Police Chief, Communications Manager, ESD1 and ESD2 Fire Chiefs to discuss preparations for the 4th of July. A Texas Crime Information Center/National Crime Information Center (TCIC/NCIC) audit was also conducted. The Communications Manager worked on the TCIC/NCIC guidelines and ensured the entries being audited were accurate, valid, and complete. In addition, the Communications Manager ensured the entire department was up to date on Omnix certifications.

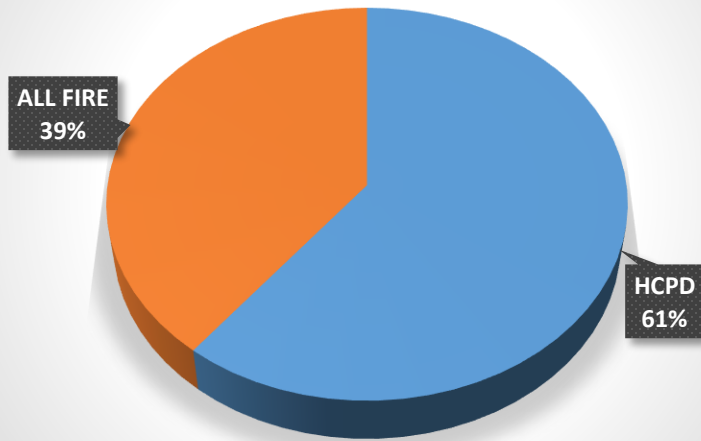
West Valley Fire Department responded to a tree on fire in Canutillo. The call immediately escalated to a metal shed and light pole on fire close to a residence. Upon arrival, West Valley requested assistance from Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority (MVRDA). The fire was extinguished after an hour. One firefighter suffered minor injuries.

Socorro Fire Department responded to the Petro truck stop in which an 18-wheeler fueling at the gas pumps left behind an unknown fluid. Citizens in the area reported their eyes were burning from the fluid. Upon arrival, Socorro Fire tested the fluid and advised it had acid-like characteristics. This incident required a multi-agency cooperation. El Paso HazMat, Socorro Police, and El Paso Sheriff's Office responded to assist with traffic control and to establish a perimeter to keep passerby's safe.

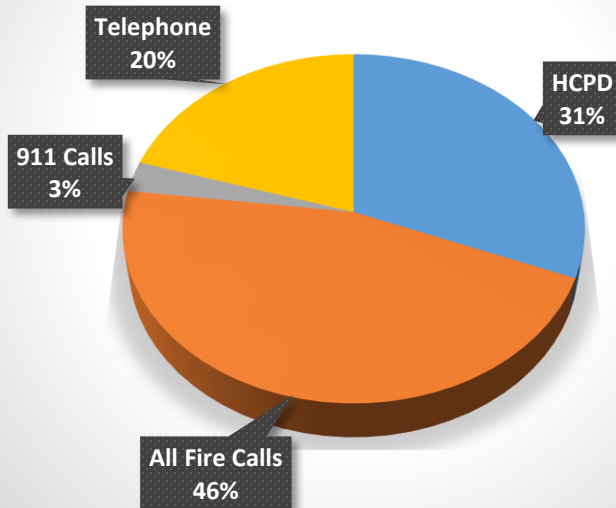

WARRANTS DIVISION & FLEET OPERATIONS

The Warrants Sergeant received 29 summons for service. Twenty-Nine of them were executed and none were returned back to the court. During the month of June, 26 people were arrested for traffic warrants and collections were made on some while others unable to post bond were booked into the El Paso County Jail.

Warrants sergeant reviewed twenty-five cases that were fax from CPS, they were reviewed and closed out or filed with the case that was opened due to the allegations of neglect.

The Warrants Sergeant took twelve vehicles to the shop for oil changes and repairs. Bailiff duties were done during court proceedings.

CRIME PREVENTION ACTIVITIES

HCPD Police Explorer Program

During the month of June, the post admitted 5 new cadets and 10 high school students who have been joining the members of the explorer program with community activities such as Movies in the Park in order to earn community service hours for their high school and early college academic programs.

The HCPD Police Explorers continued their monthly meetings training and building their skills via scenario-based training. During these scenarios, role players act as victims, offenders, and sometimes injured parties.

Activities for the month of June also included team building activities for the members of the HCPD Explorer program. Activities included marching, trust walks and other interactive activities in which the team members had to alternate between leading and following directives and instructions.

EMPLOYEE TRAINING

Blood Breath and Evidence (8 hours): Course will familiarize officers with the impact of breath and blood evidence of trying DWI and other impaired-driving cases. The course will explore the science of it, putting on expert testimony, and common defenses; abusive discovery motions, working with experts. Attended by J. Rodriguez, C. Zeiger, M. Nieto, J. Nunez, G. Rosas

Basic Civil Process (24 hours) : Course will cover the jurisdiction of courts which applies to civil process, officers responsibilities, criminal subpoenas, and rules of courts which apply to civil citations and subpoenas. Attended by Ortega, Zeiger, Rodriguez

Basic Telecommunicators Course (40 hours): The Basic Telecommunicator Course is designed to provide the beginning Telecommunicator with an understanding of situations encountered in an emergency communications environment and the basic skills necessary to collect information in both emergency and non-emergency situations. Domestic Violence Video (2 hours): Course will consist of how to capture video interviews of domestic violence victims/witnesses and much more. Missing and Exploited Children (8 hours): Course provides a basic overview of trends and background information relevant for a first responder or investigator responding to a missing or exploited child report. Attended by S. Braziel, J. Mejia

New Supervisors Course (24 hours): The new supervisors will learn about the relevant TCOLE rules and legislative changes, role identification, values, ethics, principals, leadership styles, communications basics, counseling techniques, liability issues, Civil Rights, Racial Sensitivity, Cultural Diversity, Special Investigative Topics, and the basics of the transition from line officer to supervisor. Advanced Human Trafficking (8 hours): Course is designed to increase the law enforcement communities awareness of the issue of human trafficking, through the exposure of information including: victim identification, investigation, rescue and prosecution considerations, referral and service providers availability, the critical need for development of a coordinated community response and the inter-connectivity of state, federal, and global trafficking concerns. Arrest Search and Seizure (16 hours): Upon the completion of this course, the student will be able to explain the various circumstances when authorized by law to arrest persons. The course will additionally provide the student with the skills to

describe and explain suspicious activity, and probable cause. The student will also be able to discuss the search warrant requirements, and explain the procedures for obtaining a search warrant among other topics dealing with arrest, search and seizure.
