




#### **ITEMS OF INTEREST**


- Chief McConnell attended an online animal services presentation from the City of El Paso. The city has limited the number of animals accepted into their animal shelter because of significant budget cuts and COVID-19. These operational changes have caused changes to our ability to accept animals, except in emergent situations. Additionally, El Paso County has transferred its animal field services program from the Sheriff to a newly created county animal welfare system. A meeting is scheduled in July to determine how the county is dealing with the operational changes at the city animal shelter and how that affects Horizon City.
- Chief McConnell met with the new facilities architect several times during the month.
- Chief McConnell attended a presentation from the El Paso District Attorney's
  Office concerning the First Chance Program. The program provides for
  alternative handling of minor marijuana possession cases under 2 and 4 ounces,
  and drug-free zone.
- Chief McConnell and ESD1 Chief Menendez met with Elite Transport Service to share information concerning their services to Horizon City. We intend to meet monthly to maintain a positive working relationship between our operations.

















#### **COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION**

### Together as One

The Horizon, Socorro, and Clint Fire Departments responded to a mobile home fire in Sparks.



Multiple callers advised the mobile home was fully engulfed involving an electric pole. The El Paso Electric Company and a County Fire Investigator were requested shortly after the fire department's arrival. The El Paso Sheriff's Office deputies assisted with road closures and traffic control. The fire was extinguished, and the units cleared the scene.

The Horizon and Socorro Fire Departments responded to reports of a structure fire in Sparks. Once on the scene, units encountered an electrical issue stemming from an extension cord. The fire was extinguished before the fire department's arrival.

The West Valley Fire Department responded to a structure fire in Canutillo. The Mesilla Valley Regional Dispatch Authority was contacted to request mutual aid. Once on the scene, the fire crew found a mobile home fully engulfed. The Red Cross was contacted due to the total loss of the home and belongings. A fire marshal, El Paso Electric, and Texas Gas Service also responded to the scene.

The Socorro, Horizon, and Tribal Fire Departments responded to a structure fire in Socorro. Officers with the Socorro Police Department arrived at a business that was showing smoke coming from the air conditioning unit on the roof. The Socorro Police assisted with blocking oncoming traffic on Horizon Boulevard. The electric company was requested for damage to an electrical pole, a fire marshal responded, and all other units cleared the scene.

The Montana Vista Fire Rescue responded to a vehicle fire on a dirt road in Montana Vista. Callers advised of a large fire and explosion sounds coming from the vehicle. Once on scene, Montana Vista Fire crews advised the vehicle was fully engulfed. The El Paso Sheriff's Office and a fire marshal unit were requested to the scene. The fire was extinguished, and the scene was referred to deputies with the El Paso Sheriff's Office.

The Montana Vista Fire Rescue reported a motor vehicle accident in front of the Montana Vista Fire Department station. Fire crews were on the scene immediately and advised of a single-vehicle rollover and extensive damage. Deputies with the El Paso Sheriff's Office assisted in shutting down east and westbound lanes of Montana Avenue. The Texas Department of Transportation responded in reference to approximately 300 feet of guardrail damage. All fire units cleared, and the scene was released to the El Paso Sheriff's Office.

The Clint, Socorro, and Ysleta Del Sur Pueblo Fire Departments responded to a structure fire in San Elizario. Upon arrival, fire crews advised the living room of the vacant home was on fire and initiated an offensive fire attack. Three firefighters entered the structure and began an interior attack. All personnel safely exited the building. Fire crews then initiated ventilation on the structure. The fire was extinguished, and the scene was referred to the Fire Marshal.

The Socorro, Horizon, and Ysleta Del Sur Pueblo Fire Departments responded to a residential structure fire in Socorro. Multiple callers advised of a small storage shed fully engulfed. Arriving units confirmed that the small structure was engulfed, and the fire was spreading to brush nearby. The fire was extinguished, and the scene was released to the El Paso Sheriff's Office.

#### **COVID-19 ACTIVITIES**

The police department has resumed mostly normal operations with the inclusion of PPE. None of our employees have tested positive. Chief McConnell helped facilitate the COVID-19 testing in Horizon City by arranging a suitable location.

Our officers continue to respond to every call for service in real-time and with the necessary staffing to address the need. We have been able to obtain the required PPE for our employees. PPE supplies are easier to purchase at this time compared to the beginning of the pandemic.

#### INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Thirty seven support tickets were submitted, completed and closed, including three major projects. The two remaining tickets have been escalated to Tyler support and awaiting a response. The major projects included:

- Installation of Zoom, YouTube, Google Account for court department
- Installation of Watch Commander for the detective
- Nuance Dragon Demo installation
- Pushing Tyler update

In addition to the major projects above, IT staff responded to a variety of tech support requests.

#### **WARRANTS DIVISION & FLEET OPERATIONS**

The warrants officer received two summons from the court for service. There were no arrests for outstanding traffic warrants. Twelve Child Protective Services cases were reviewed, closed, or filed with the corresponding case due to allegations of neglect. Bailiff duties were conducted during court proceedings via zoom. The bailiff assisted with maintaining the six feet social distancing while people were entering the court. Five patrol units were taken to the shop for maintenance.

#### **CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS/EVIDENCE**

Detectives Rodriguez and Labrado investigated cases ranging from an accident involving property damage, aggravated assault, fraud, thefts, sexual assaults. Sexual assault cases continue to increase. The detectives presented two cases to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. Lieutenant Ortega signed 51 cases at the District Attorney's Office and were accepted for prosecution. Lieutenant Ortega attended several meetings via zoom with EPPD, Border Patrol, District Attorney's Office on the First Offender's Program, and Texas Department of Transportation. Lieutenant Ortega attended the monthly crisis negotiation training.

#### **FORENSICS UNIT**

The evidence technician conducted six open records requests for video from the officer's body cameras. The District Attorney's Office submitted 13 requests for videos for cases ranging from DWI to assaults. The Texas Department of Public Safety crime laboratory reopened, and the technician submitted 13 drug and blood kits for analysis.

The special ops section continued to assist several local churches in the Horizon area with traffic control during their food distribution. Observations were also conducted for statistical data for DDACTS.

Sergeant Mitre received an extension to renew her child safety seat certification due to the issuing entity closing down for the month due to COVID-19. Sergeant Mitre conducted two car seat inspections. The first inspection was conducted at Walmart when a member of the community approached Sergeant Mitre for assistance. The second inspection took place during a food pantry distribution event.
