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# Introduction

This report is designed to provide statistical information illustrating the Horizon Police Department's operations and administrative functions. The statistical information reported will provide staff with guidance for operational planning, workload assessment and statistically compare our productivity to the previous year. It serves to make necessary adjustments in policies and procedures to meet state and national standards for accreditation.

### **Demographics**

The Horizon City Police Department is comprised of 30 officers and 20 communication specialists. The Police Department are entrusted to patrol approximately 8.5 square miles and provide public safety services for approximately 22,000 residents. Our communications Division is charged with providing emergency phone and dispatch services to the Police Department and approximately 170,000 residents for Fire and Emergency Services under Emergency Management District #1 and Emergency Management District #2.

### **Staffing**

The Chief of Police oversees the Assistant Chief and the Communications Manager. The Assistant Chief of Police oversees the 2 Lieutenants and oversees the Detectives and other investigative personnel. The Patrol Lieutenants oversee the Patrol Sergeants. The Communications Shift Supervisors report to the Communications Manager. The Department consists of primarily Four operational divisions.



# **Patrol Division**

The Patrol Division is commanded by Lieutenant Jesus Ortega. It is comprised of 2 Lieutenants, 3 Sergeants, 3 Corporals and 12 Patrol Officers. They operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week on rotating shifts. The shifts rotate every 56 days while days off rotate every 28 days.




# **Community Outreach**





### Notable Activities for CID, Traffic, Forensics & Warrants Section:

Our forensic technician, Bernadette Ortega identified several cases which could possibly be ready for disposition of evidence. The verification of this case's disposition at the District Attorney's Office could mean that the items could be disposed of, and our evidence room would reclaim valuable storage space. A major



goal for 2024 is to identify these cases and reclaim as much evidence room space as possible. Doing so would prevent the added city expenses of acquiring feasible off site storage or expanding the current evidence room

#### **Traffic Division**

Officer Eric Delgadillo assumes the responsibility of enforcing commercial vehicle regulations, conducting thorough inspections to address both minor administrative discrepancies, colloquially referred to as "paper" infractions, and more significant lapses in essential safety equipment maintenance.

His contribution is instrumental in mitigating potential risks that could result in severe accidents. Officer Delgadillo's efforts contribute significantly to upholding road safety standards and ensuring compliance within the commercial transportation sector, as evidenced by his commitment to addressing and rectifying regulatory violations.

Every detailed roadside inspection can take upwards of 2 hours to complete. During the month of December, Officer Eric Delgadillo conducted 12 inspections and found 3 commercial vehicles not road worthy.

We are pleased to introduce our new motorcycle officer, whose role extends beyond traditional ticket enforcement. The strategic advantage of employing a motorcycle officer lies in their exceptional maneuverability through traffic, facilitating the efficient clearance of congested areas and prompt response to emergencies.

The motorcycle's nimble mobility further enables the officer to swiftly traverse the city, providing valuable assistance to fellow officers during calls for service. This enhanced responsiveness and versatility contribute significantly to our overall law enforcement capabilities and community safety efforts. The addition of a motorcycle officer has proven to be an asset in addressing dynamic situations and optimizing our resources for effective public service.

#### **Warrants Division and Bailiff**

Officer Abraham Diaz assumes a multifaceted role within the law enforcement department, serving as the Court Bailiff and the Warrants Officer. His contributions make him an indispensable member of our law enforcement



team. As the primary point of contact for matters pertaining to the municipal court, convened biweekly, Officer Diaz ensures the seamless functioning of court proceedings.

During the month of January, our fleet underwent a major technological upgrade. Officer Diaz oversaw the installation of the Axon integrated camera system which unifies the dashboard camera/body camera/license plate reader system in our vehicles to the technology worn by the officer while on patrol. With this advancement, our agency is able to go further in transparency and incident-review by means of an intelligent hive camera system which automatically activates based on nearby activation by another officer, vehicle, or by the removal of the officer's firearm or taser from their duty belt.

# **Communications Division**

The Communications Section is overseen by the Communications Manager and is comprised of 3 Communications Shift Supervisors, and 14 Communications Specialists.



<u>Departmental Significant and Notable</u> <u>Accomplishments</u>



### Mobile for Public Safety (MPS) Training

Mobile for Public Safety provides law enforcement personnel in the field with the tools they need to respond immediately, regardless of their location. This extension to Intergraph's Computer Aided Dispatch (I/CAD) makes incident, mapping, and location data available in the filed improving officer's productivity and safety, enabling background checks at the scene, updating officer location and availability status, and reducing the amount of radio traffic in dispatch. The information provided in the course is beneficial to both dispatchers and officers to know the overall system and capabilities. In addition, the course helps to expand the dispatcher's situational awareness and helps both the officer and the dispatcher when system issues arise.



### **Basic Instructor Course**

Shift Supervisor's Stephanie Cortes and Anthony Dominguez attended a weeklong Basic Instructor Course 1014 taught by the Department of Public Safety held at 6055 Threadgill. During the course, trainees learned the processes needed to research, develop, and present material in a measurable presentation. The course taught



trainees how to create lesson plans and instructor biographies approved by the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement (TCOLE). Trainees were assigned to create two lesson plans which had to be presented in front of classmates. The first lesson was a 15-minute presentation. The second lesson was a 30-minute presentation.



On Tuesday, June 4, 2024, Officer V. Hernandez, and Detective A. Labrado met with the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) assistant director of Marketing and additional staff regarding the future Heroes Day that will be taking place the first week of September. The goal is for all first responders to come together once again for the second time in a row and be honored throughout the entire game. During the first meeting, other agencies such as El Paso Police Department, Sunland Park Police Department and the Army personnel attended the meeting. The goal is to get as many agencies involved to interact with the El Paso community in order to show them what we do and provide them with opportunities within different departments. Officers will continue to attend following meetings to better prepare for the big final event where thousands of people will attend.



### Movies at the Park – June 8 & 21

On Friday June 7, 2024, Horizon City Police Department held the first Movies at the Park of the year. The movie shown for the day was Trolls Band Together. Movies at the park is an outreach event that consists of an



inflatable screen being put up and showing a movie with a projector. The event begins at 6:00PM and usually ends by 10:00PM. Those officers working the event begin gathering all the equipment since 4:00PM and stay afterwards to put everything back. Mostly all of the administrative officers participated in the event and several Explorers also helped with the event as well at the Public Works Department. During the event, there were games for children to be a part of that were coordinated by one of the officers and prizes were given to the winners. The games consisted of different water balloon games. Multiple vendors and food

trucks participated in the event and were able to promote, recruit and sell their merchandise at the event. On June 21<sup>st</sup> the featured film was MIGRATION. Two more movies remain in the program and will be shown during the month of July.



On Saturday, June 8, 2024, Horizon City Police Department along with SK8 4KIDS non-profit organization



hosted the very first HCPD SK8 Series. The event took place early in the morning and lasted until the afternoon at our local Desmond Corcoran Park. There we multiple vendors at the event, selling and promoting their businesses. Food trucks were also at the event for people to purchase fresh drinks or food as they watched the competition. SK8 4KIDS oversaw registering people who were interested in participating in the competition which consisted of different categories such as beginners,

intermediate, advance and females. Some of the sponsors for the event

consisted of Raising Cane's Chicken, Hooters, The Sushsi Plug, Urban Air Adventure Park, 99 Skateboards, and Meta Power. It was a great turnout at the very first competition and we look forward for the next one. We look forward in strengthening our relationship with everyone in the skating community and we hope to continue having these types of events as we greatly value the passion these young individuals have for the sport.

# **Ruidoso Drop-off Donations**



On Thursday, June 20 and Friday, June 21, 2024, Horizon City, its residents, Horizon City Police Department and Horizon Fire Department came together for a great cause. After learning of the tragic fires happening in the Ruidoso, New Mexico area, the whole community and first responders took it upon themselves to establish a donation drop off at our local Walmart Supercenter. Munoz Trucking was kind enough to lend one of their tractors as well as a trailer to take the donations as well as proving a driver to take all donations and drop them off at Ruidoso for all those in need. Officers with



the police department, city employees, Munoz trucking personnel, firefighters, and residents assisted by working and/or volunteering their time to take on the donations being dropped off by our community. HCPD and HCFD shared a flyer with the community stating what the priority items needed were. ### **Explorer Program**

For\_the month of June, Officer V. Hernandez and Lt. Valdez were able to meet three times with the Explorer Program. The first meeting consisted of these young individuals assisting officers at our very first showing of Movies at the Park. They met with officers at Horizon City Police Department at 4:30PM and continued

assisting at the park until 10:00PM. These young individuals assisted by showing presence and reporting any issues they would come across. The second meeting was held at Horizon City Police Department where the Explorers took a friendly test to refresh them on their ten codes and phonetic alphabet. Officer Hernandez introduced these young individuals to Driving While Intoxicated cases. Officer Hernandez briefly explained these young individuals how officers handle a DWI case and was able to show them videos. During the third meeting, these young individuals met with Lt. Valdez for the second showing of Movies at the Park at our local Desmond Corcoran Park.

Communications Shift Supervisor Sheila Tarango and communications specialists Irlanda Huerta, Julie Nava, and Mirna Sierra attended the Understanding Targeted Cyber Attacks training at the El Paso 911 Regional Communications Center. Attendees were provided with basic concepts related to targeted cyber attacks. The training focused on the attacker's methods used during each phase of a targeted cyber-attack. Strategies were also provided for preparation, response, and recovery from a targeted cyber-attack. Everyone is susceptible to be a victim of a cyber-attack. Cybersecurity awareness and understanding is key to protect oneself from a cyber-attack.

During the month of June, our detective squad achieved significant milestones by successfully closing several sensitive child and sexual abuse cases, ensuring that the accused perpetrators were brought closer to justice. Additionally, our task force-assigned detective continues to collaborate with the FBI Major Crime Unit, aiding in the resolution of cases under federal jurisdiction.

This initiative not only fosters community engagement but also provides our dedicated detectives with a much-needed breather from the intense critical thinking and tragic situations they encounter daily.

While on a routine traffic stop, Officer Trevino was almost struck by an oncoming vehicle who failed to properly yield to him. Officer Trevino then conducted a traffic stop on that vehicle to further investigate. After meeting with the driver, he admitted that he wanted to crash his vehicle into someone or something. Officer Trevino determined that the driver was going through a mental crisis and got him the help that he needed. If it wasn't for Officer Trevino's quick thinking, the young man could have taken his life or the innocent life of another.
