### Horizon City Police Department Monthly Report

This report is designed to provide statistical information illustrating the Horizon Police Department's operations and administrative functions. The statistical information reported will provide staff with guidance for operational planning, workload assessment and statistically compare our productivity to the previous year. It serves to make necessary adjustments in policies and procedures to meet state and national standards for accreditation.

### **Demographics**

The Horizon City Police Department is comprised of 30 officers and 20 communication specialists. The Police Department are entrusted to patrol approximately 8.5 square miles and provide public safety services for approximately 22,000 residents. Our Communications Division is charged with providing emergency phone and dispatch services to the Police Department and approximately 170,000 residents for Fire and Emergency Services under Emergency Management District #1 and Emergency Management District #2.

### **Staffing**

The Chief of Police oversees the Assistant Chief and the Communications Manager. The Assistant Chief of Police oversees the 2 Lieutenants and oversees the Detectives and other investigative personnel. The Patrol Lieutenants oversee the Patrol Sergeants. The Communications Shift Supervisors report to the Communications Manager. The Department consists of primarily Four operational divisions.

- Communications Division overseen by the Communications Manager

### Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is commanded by Lieutenant Jesus Ortega for day shift and Lieutenant Kaycee Valdez for night shift. It is comprised of 2 Lieutenants, 3 Sergeants, 3 Corporals and 12 Patrol Officers. They operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week on rotating shifts. The shifts rotate every 56 days while days off rotate every 28 days.






### Month to Month Comparison





### **Criminal Investigations Division**

#### **Investigations**

Lieutenant Kaycee Valdez assumes responsibility of our Criminal Investigations Division, where a team of dedicated professionals is responsible for examining a broad array of criminal cases. This unit is comprised of three detectives who handle cases ranging from misdemeanors to more serious felony offenses.

Their job involves digging into these cases, collecting evidence, and working closely with various partners to bring investigations to a conclusion. Lieutenant Valdez and her team are committed to upholding the law and ensuring the safety of our community through their hard work and dedication.

- On October 24-26, 2023, CID Detectives attended a conference on Crimes Against Children. The two-day training classes prepared our officers with tools to investigate these horrible crimes.

### **Traffic Division**

Officer Eric Delgadillo is entrusted with the responsibility of overseeing the meticulous enforcement of commercial vehicle regulations. His duties encompass the diligent inspection of commercial vehicles, where the spectrum of potential violations uncovered spans from relatively minor administrative discrepancies, often referred to as "paper" infractions, to significantly more perilous instances of negligence in maintaining essential vehicle safety equipment.

These critical equipment violations, if left unchecked, have the potential to culminate in catastrophic accidents, underscoring the essential role Officer Delgadillo plays in ensuring road safety and regulatory compliance within the commercial transportation sector.

Every detailed roadside inspection can take upwards of 2 hours to complete. During the month of October, Officer Eric Delgadillo conducted over 20 inspections and discovered over 40 violations.

### Forensics Unit

Bernadette Ortega is an outstanding asset to our team, serving as our Crime Scene and Evidence Lead. Her remarkable experience sets her among the top professionals in the state. Officer Abraham Diaz also works alongside her in the Crime Scene and Evidence department, contributing their skills to handle forensic evidence and conduct thorough crime scene investigations. Together, they uphold the highest standards of forensic work.

### Warrants Division and Bailiff

Officer Abraham Diaz fulfills a multifaceted role within the law enforcement department, acting as both the Court Bailiff and the Warrants Officer. Officer Abraham Diaz plays a crucial role in our law enforcement team. He's the go-to person for handling matters related to the municipal court, which is held twice a week. In this role, he ensures everything runs smoothly in the court.

In addition, he's responsible for serving summonses. These are notices given to people involved in cases with witnesses or juveniles, and he handles them as needed, making sure they reach the right people. Officer Diaz's hard work in these areas shows his dedication to keeping our community safe and our law enforcement operations running smoothly.

Officer Diaz also takes care of executing traffic warrants, collecting bond, and making sure those who need to appear in court are brought in. To keep our police vehicles in top shape, he regularly drives them to maintenance services.

### **Traffic Division**

Officer Eric Delgadillo is assigned to conduct traffic enforcement and accident investigations. He is assigned as our only motorcycle officer.



Horizon City National Night Out!

On Tuesday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2023, Horizon City Police Department along with the community celebrated Horizon City's biggest event of the year, National Night Out. National Night Out is an event that takes place annually across the world to promote law enforcement and community partnerships to make our communities safer and enhance our relationships. Like previous years, Horizon City Police Department and Horizon City Fire Department worked closely with each other along with 50+ community partners and 10+ different law enforcement agencies to have a successful event for our community. What took several weeks of preparation began by having Naval Air land their helicopter and Horizon City Police Department Honor Guard Team present the colors followed by Vianey Molina singing the National Anthem as skydivers landed. Pastor Wes Phillips provided everyone with a prayer and District Attorney Bill Hicks addressed our community. During the event there were multiple presentations to include Horizon High School Dance, Lucha Libre, Horizon City Athletics, Eastlake High School Cheer, Eastlake High School Dance, Drumlines (Horizon vs. Eastlake), Fire Department vs. Police Department Tug-o-War, Fire Department and Police Department Hot Dog eating contest. In between presentations, people would gather at the center of the stage and enjoy themselves along with family and friends as they danced throughout the night. Raffles were also being announced at the stage for people to get the opportunity to win prizes from different businesses. A twelve-minute firework show was displayed at the end of the event, where the community, local businesses, fire departments and law enforcement agencies celebrated the end of a successful night. There was an estimate of 1,000 people at this year's National Night Out and we are glad our biggest event of the year continues to grow, and more relationships are being built between the community and our law enforcement agencies to better help protect and serve.








### **Online Interview**

The interview consisted of letting the public know about the race and how it benefited the foundation. Officer Sierra also got to inform the radio station about the importance of law enforcement and community policing. The founder of the race, Carla Hernandez, also spoke on the partnership they had with HCPD and the appreciation for the police department as it had helped their foundation multiple times at different functions. This is the second year that HCPD has assisted with this event and the first time speaking with a radio station to promote such an event. Tu Luz Radio also included HCPD on the back cover of a local magazine as one of the sponsors for the race with the promotion of the event.



### **TxDOT Car Seat Check-Up Event**

On Friday, October 6<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Community Relations Officer (CRO), V. Hernandez assisted the Texas Department of Transportation with a Car Seat Check-Up Event that took place at our local Walmart. Monica O'Kane with TxDOT advised CRO Hernandez their yearly Child Passenger Safety Technician Certification Training took place the first week of October and Friday was their testing date to get certified and can provide education to families in the community. CRO Hernandez and TxDOT staff met early Friday morning to set up and met with Walmart staff who were kind enough to donate over \$600 worth of car seats. CRO Hernandez conducted a livestream video on Horizon City Police Department's Facebook page encouraging people to stop by to receive proper education on how to safely install their children's car seats. The students that participated in the Child Passenger Safety Technician Certification Training included El Paso Fire Department, Constables, Department of Public Safety and El Paso Police Department. The event took place for approximately two hours and approximately 15 to 20 kids got their car seat properly installed.



### Cancer Run

On Saturday, October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Officers from HCPD assisted in the annual Breast Cancer Awareness race with Lulu's Foundation Seeds of Love. Officer Sierra was able to reserve Horizon Mesa Park for the event and assist with traffic control for the day. The race consisted of a 1.5-mile fun run and a competitive 3-mile race with a \$500 prize for first place. Officer Sierra planned the route alongside Public Works to determine the roadblocks and locations officers needed to be present for traffic control. The event took place from 8am-11am with the fun race being the first half of the event and the competitive race beginning shortly after. The route for the race began at the intersection of Desert Wind and Desert Mist and marked with cones and barrels at the halfway point for runners and competitors to return. During the event, officers handed out water and checked on the runners to ensure they were able to continue competing. After the race, officers were welcomed to hang out at



the park and meet and interact with the public.



#### Youth Corp Hiking Day

On Tuesday, October 10<sup>th</sup>, officers from HCPD took out the Youth Corp. program to the hiking trails at Huevo Tanks State Park. Officer E. Perez, Corporal B. Avitia, Crime Scene Investigator B. Ortega and an intern with prior military experience accompanied the group in case of any medical emergency during the hiking trail. The hiking trail began with a small presentation about the rules of the park and what precautions were needed to have a safe hike. The group was divided into 4 to maintain a closer look in case any situation occurred. The hike took approximately two and a half hours. During this time, some kids from the group pushed themselves to overcome obstacles such as fears of heights and experienced what overcoming that obstacle felt like. After the hike, the group was taken to lunch at Dave and Busters. At Dave and Busters, the Youth Corp. got to play at the arcade, eat lunch and interact in a more social manner with their fellow peers and mentors. This field day was done as an expression of gratitude towards the Youth Corp. for the help they had provided HCPD throughout the year at events and functions.



### HCPD 4<sup>th</sup> Car Seat Check-Up Class

On Friday, October 13<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Officers with Horizon City Police Department conducted their 4<sup>th</sup> Car Seat Check-Up Event that took place at City Hall. The goal of being able to provide the best service to our community and conduct these types of classes for parents to safely transport their children continues to be an important role at Horizon City Police Department. During this 4<sup>th</sup> class, Officers noticed a smaller number of parents and children showing up, but officers were glad to be able to provide the proper education for their children's safety. Officers were able to provide education for five kids between the ages of 9 months old to 5 years of age. Officers also provided education to one expecting mother and were able to provide three brand new car seats to three kids. Horizon City Police Department continues to promote these Car Seat Check-UP Classes through the police department's Facebook page and will continue to provide their services by

appointment twice a month.





### **Resilience Fitness Studio Grand Opening**

### Sex Offender Home Verifications

During the home verifications, officers were able to verify information on eight individuals. Horizon City Police Department will be conducting additional home verifications in the future to keep track of every registered sex offender that lives within city jurisdiction to keep all our children safe and decrease the possibility of them reoffending.



### Eastlake High School Work Fair

On Wednesday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, 2023, Officer Sierra, Officer Hernandez, and Dispatcher Rendon attended Eastlake High School for their annual Work Fair. Socorro Independent School District gathered over 2,200 students from the high schools and took them to Eastlake High School to attend the work fair. Employers from all over El Paso partook in the outreach to show students what their career options were once they graduated. The presentation began with the introduction of Dispatcher Rendon and a description of what being part of the Emergency Communications team was since that position began hiring at the age of 18. It was then followed by the police department explaining that once they were the appropriate age, they can apply to be sent to the Sherrif's Office Academy to obtain their Basic Peace Officer License. ### FTO School
