George Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation

Thanksgiving is one of my favorite times of year. For a brief while the world is grateful. People are kind and patient; willing to look beyond themselves. There's a collective sense of gratitude. What better place to be than a country who, from her conception, devoted time to thankfulness. Every year I take a few moments to read through the earliest Thanksgiving proclamations. It speaks not only to the priorities of our founders, but the foundations of our cultural heritage. Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation encouraged prayer, reflection, thanks, and above all, humbleness for the abundance these great states were so fortunately granted.

By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation.

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor— and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness. Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be— That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks—for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation—for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war—for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed—for the peaceable and rational manner, in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted—for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us. And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions—to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually—to render our national government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed—to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord—To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us—and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best. ~ By: *George Washington*

However you celebrate, may you enjoy Thanksgiving not just as a day of football, turkey, naps, and pie, but may you find a moment to reflect on the gift of life and the love of God. May your gratitude be an ongoing action and not merely a fleeting thought and may you give God thanks for your many blessings.

Musical Musings

Anthems for November



November 5th

Selections from *A German Requiem*, by Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

Brahms composed his *German Requiem* in 1865, shortly after the death of his mother, which affected him deeply. There is some speculation that the work also reflects the composer's grief over the loss of his close friend Robert Schumann, nine years earlier. Unlike the traditional Roman Catholic Requiem, Brahms carefully compiled scriptures for this work which focus on the living. The overriding theme of the *German Requiem* is expressed in the passage from the Beatitudes Brahms chose for the first movement: "Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted." Brahms was quite moved when he learned some years later that Robert Schumann had planned a work of the same title.

November 12th

What Gift Can We Bring?, by Jane Marshall (1924-)

A faculty member of Southern Methodist University, Jane Marshall has been recently recognized by the Fellowship of United Methodist Musicians for her contributions to church music. This is her choral arrangement of hymn #87 in the United Methodist Hymnal, which she also composed.

November 19th

I Will Rise, by Randall Speer (1964-)

Written in one day after a night of dreaming the music, I Will Rise employs elements of Gospel and Spiritual to the irregular phrase lengths of the Beatitudes. The central theme is one of gratitude, but also of picking one's self up and continuing on (rising, standing, and walking).

November 26th

Psalm 100, by Heinz Werner Zimmermann (1930-)

German composer Heinz Werner Zimmermann is best known for, among other things, his sacred motets with plucked double bass. These works, of which Psalm 100 is representative, demonstrate his deep fascination with jazz idioms.


(Tote bags will be available in the Bishop Early Hall while supplies last.)


