SERVING OTHERS

Love your neighbor as yourself. (Matthew 22:39)

The Christian life is one of service to others, where we show love and kindness to everyone, even to those who do not treat us well. We can serve others in many ways, and we should ensure that we use every opportunity that we can. One of the most valuable ways to serve others is to show them that we care. Giving our time and encouragement to someone will often be more valuable than even the most generous gift. When others need our help most, we should make a special effort to show them that we care. By providing love and support we can make a real difference in the lives of others. Paul has reminded us that helping others when they are struggling is fundamental to the gospel. In many cases we will not be able to solve someone else's problems by ourselves, but we can advise them on what they can do for themselves, or what others can do for them. Quiet and wise guidance will often be invaluable, and provides a real service to others. Telling others of the good news of Jesus is the prime example of how informing and educating others can help people change their lives. Letting others know about our own experiences, in a sincere and loving manner, can help people to discover the truth of the Christian gospel. "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:19) There are several careers which have traditionally been associated with service. Those working in the fields of medicine, education and the armed forces have always been respected for the help which they bring to others through their work. However, it is important to realize that every job provides a service to others. Even though we get paid for our work, we should still realize that it is providing a service. The spirit of service should be seen in all aspects of our work. Our work will often serve those who can afford to pay for our help and skills. However, there are many people who cannot meet their physical needs with their own money. We can serve these people by ensuring that they have the resources they need. By supporting causes and movements which contribute to the wellbeing of others, we can be part of changing peoples' lives for the better. James said: "Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and well fed,' but does nothing about their physical needs, what good is it? In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead." A final way to serve others is to pray for them. By asking for God to help them and provide for them we can make a real difference in people's lives. Each of us can serve in all of the ways which have been discussed above. Just because we serve in one way does not mean that we cannot also serve in others. We should remember the advice of John Wesley to: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as you can."

Musical Musings **Anthems for May**



May 6th: Sixth Sunday of Easter

"Greater Love Hath No Man," by John Ireland (1879-1962)

Considered "the English Impressionist," John Ireland eschewed the sounds of British folk-song embraced by his peers, opting instead for a compositional style more influenced by French and Russian palettes. Although there is little of impressionism evident, his motet, "Greater Love Hath No Man," is listed among his best known works.

May 13th ~ Seventh Sunday of Easter ~ Ascension Sunday

"Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates," by Healey Willan (1880-1968)

English/Canadian organist and composer Healey Willan is best known for his religious music, which comprises the majority of his compositional output of some 800 works. His musical style often hearkens back to earlier periods of music history. For example, "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates" takes on a likeness to some chorale settings of Bach.

May 20th ~ Pentecost Sunday

"All People At This Hour," by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

An English version of the German sacred song, "Kommt, Seelen, dieser Tag," "All People At This Hour" is a melody Bach set to music for a Leipzig hymnal published in 1736. Little else is known about this particular piece, except that Bach himself did not write the tune.

"Let Thy Holy Spirit," by Pavel Chesnokov (1877-1944)

The great Russian conductor and choirmaster Pavel Chesnokov wrote over 500 compositions, about 400 of which were sacred works. The Russian revolution and the establishment of communist rule curtailed any further creation of sacred music, and so the remaining 100 or so of Chesnokov's compositions are secular. When Moscow's Cathedral of Christ the Savior (site of the world premiere of Tchaikovsky's 1812 overture) was destroyed under Joseph Stalin in 1931, Chesnokov was so deeply upset that he gave up composing altogether. The cathedral has now been rebuilt, work completed in the late 1990's.

<u>May 27th ~ Trinity Sunday</u> "I Bind Unto Myself Today," traditional Irish

A rousing and perennial favorite at Court Street for Trinity Sunday, "I Bind Unto Myself" employs the Irish hymn ST. PATRICK'S BREASTPLATE.



The United Methodist Church turns 50!

April 23 marked our 50th anniversary as a denomination. In 1968, at the Uniting Conference in Dallas, the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church (EUB) merged to form a new denomination, The United Methodist Church. 10.3 million Methodists and 750,000 members of the EUB Church merged into one of the largest Protestant denominations in the world, representing 53 countries.

Wait, isn't the church much older — like more than 200 years old?

Well, yes and no — it's complicated! Our roots go back to the original churches — The Methodist Episcopal Church of America — which began in 1784. Since that time, multiple splits and mergers have occurred. The current iteration, The United Methodist Church, dates back to 1968 when The Methodist Church joined with the Evangelical United Brethren Church (EUB). The EUB Church was formed in 1946, by the merger of the Evangelical Church (formerly the Evangelical Association) and the United Brethren in Christ, a church with roots reaching back to 1767 that formally organized in 1800. The Evangelical Association was formally organized in 1800 by German-speaking Christians. The founders of both churches were influenced by John Wesley and the Methodist movement.
