Did you know Flo Traywick helped make this happen?

Reported by The News and Advance in the June 25th edition:

More than 40 people turned out Monday afternoon for the unveiling of the city's newest historic marker (left) dedicated to diplomat James Rives Childs, a Lynchburg native who served as a code breaker in the U.S. Army during World War I. Childs became a Foreign Service Officer in 1923 and served in the position until he retired in 1953. While serving as charge d'affaires for the American Legation in Tangier, Morocco, during World War II, he helped 1,200 Hungarian Jews escape the Holocaust with visas to Spanish Morocco. President Harry Truman presented Childs with the Medal of Freedom in 1946

to honor his service.
