WHAT SHOULD BE THE FOCUS OF CHRISTIANS ON THANKSGIVING?

The original thanksgiving celebration was held by the Pilgrim settlers in Massachusetts during their second winter in America in December 1621. The first winter had killed 44 of the original 102 colonists. At one point their daily food ration was down to five kernels of corn apiece, but then an unexpected trading vessel arrived, swapping them beaver pelts for grain, providing for their severe need. The next summer's crop brought hope, and Governor William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621, be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still alive. These Pilgrims, seeking religious freedom and opportunity in America, gave thanks to God for his provision for them in helping them find 20 acres of cleared land, for the fact that there were no hostile Indians in that area, for their newfound religious freedom, and for God's provision of an interpreter to the Indians in Squanto. Along with the feasting and games involving the colonists and more than 80 friendly Indians, who added to the feast by bringing wild turkeys and venison. Prayers, sermons, and songs of praise were important in the celebration. Three days were spent in feasting and prayer. From that time forward, Thanksgiving has been celebrated as a day to give thanks to God for his gracious and sufficient provision. President Abraham Lincoln officially set aside the last Thursday of November, in 1863, "as a day of thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father." In 1941, Congress ruled that after 1941, the fourth Thursday of November be observed as Thanksgiving Day and be a legal holiday. Scripturally, we find things related to the issue of thanksgiving nearly from cover to cover. Individuals offered up sacrifices out of gratitude in the book of Genesis. The Israelites sang a song of thanksgiving as they were delivered from Pharaoh's army after the crossing of the Red Sea. The book of Psalms is packed full of songs of thanksgiving, both for God's grace to the Israelite people as a whole through his mighty deeds, as well as for his individual graces to each of us. In the New Testament, there are repeated admonitions to give thanks to God. Thanksgiving is to always be a part of our prayers. Some of the most remembered passages on the giving of thanks are the following: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God." Of all of God's gifts, the greatest one he has given is the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ. On the cross of Calvary, Jesus paid our sin debt, so a holy and just Judge could forgive us our sins and give us eternal life as a free gift. This gift is available to those who will call on Christ to save them from their sin in simple but sincere faith. For this gift of his Son, the gift which meets our greatest need, the Apostle Paul says, "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!" We, like the Pilgrims, have a choice. In life there will always be those things that we can complain about but there will also be much to be thankful for. As our society becomes increasingly secular, the actual "giving of thanks to God" during our annual Thanksgiving holiday is being overlooked, leaving only the feasting. May God grant us the gift of gratitude every day for all he gives us! God is good, and every good gift comes from him. For those who know Christ, God also works everything together for good, even events we would not necessarily consider good. May he find us to be his grateful children!



Musical Musings

Anthems for November



November 4th ~ All Saints Sunday

" Requiem Aeternam" by John Rutter

Composed in 1985 for a United Methodist church choir and orchestra in Dallas, Texas, Rutter's Requiem follows the tradition of the Anglican Requiem, which omits the Roman Catholic "Dies irae" (Day of Wrath), inserting instead settings of Psalm 130 and 23, which focus on reassurance and comforting the living. The first movement, "Requiem Aeternam", begins with a musical depiction of grief and loss – but soon proceeds prayer confident in the promise of comfort as the choir sings, "Lord, have mercy; Christ have mercy; Lord, have mercy."

"Out of the Deep"

An Anglican addition to the Requiem Mass, this setting of Psalm 130 uses a solo cello in word-painting the text, "Out of the deep have I called unto thee, O Lord." Interestingly, Rutter chose to employ a sound influenced by the blues for this setting – a kind of classical blues, if you will.

"Sanctus"

A lively counterpart to the more lyric movements we will perform this day, Rutter's *Sanctus* contains a theme whose first notes are remarkably similar to the opening theme to the original *Star Trek* series.

"Pie Jesu"

This movement from the Roman Catholic version of the Requiem Mass is characterized by the most exquisite of soprano solos.

November 11th ~ Twenty-fifth Sunday after Pentecost

"Love Divine, All Loves Excelling," by Ned Rorem (1923-)

Pullitzer Prize – winning American composer Ned Rorem has written in just about every classical musical genre, and is well known for his writings about music. His setting of "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" is characterized by soft dissonances and the occasional harmonic surprise.

November 18th ~ Twenty-sixth Sunday after Pentecost

"Little David, Play on Your Harp," by Moses Hogan (1957-2003)

Moses Hogan's fun and energetic arrangement of the traditional spiritual "Little David" draws on a combination of texts from First Samuel, a reference to Joshua son of Nun, and curiously, a stern admonition against gambling.

"Praise Him," by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

An adaptation of the spectacular opening chorus to Bach's Cantata 207, "Praise Him" is a glorious way to celebrate the bounty of God's creation. For this chorus, Bach actually recycled a movement from his first Brandenburg concerto, written five years prior to occasion for which Cantata 207 was composed.

November 25th ~Christ the King Sunday "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates," Healey Willan

English/Canadian organist and composer Healey Willan is best known for his religious music, which comprises the majority of his compositional output of some 800 works. His musical style often hearkens back to earlier periods of music history. For example, "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates" takes on a likeness to some chorale settings of Bach.





LYNCHBURG, Va. (WSET) -- More than 4,000 runners and walkers hit the streets of Lynchburg this weekend for the Virginia 10 miler.

One of those walkers was Irby "Hot Sauce" Hudson.



This is the second time the 79-year-old has taken on the 4 miler. Hudson is legally blind, so he walks with his daughter. He says his favorite part is all of the good music. "It don't seem like any big deal to me a lot of people say 'I can't believe you still doing all that' and I say well that's what keeps you young," Hudson said. "Other than my eyes I still feel the same way I did when I was thirty years old." Hudson plans to do the 4 miler until his legs give out, and he says he's got at least 40 more years until that happens.


