Reflections for the New Year

At the end of December 1772, an Anglican priest in the poor parish of Olney worked by candlelight on his New Year's Day sermon. He would preach on the text of 1 Chronicles 17, verses 16 and 17. That passage was David's response to God after Nathan informed him that his descendants would be enthroned forever as kings of Israel. David, the once poor shepherd boy, the man who would have repented of adultery and murder, responded to the news by saying, "Who am I, O Lord God, and what is my family that you have brought me thus far?" That pastor was John Newton, and those words struck a deep chord in his heart. In those last days of 1772, Newton found himself running out of empty pages in his journal, a bound book of 300 pages holding 16 years of entries. As he came to finish that journal and start another, his mind was drawn to the pages of his past: the story of his life from his days as an unregenerate slavetrader to becoming a child of God. Newton would have remembered when his rebellious spirit got him thrown off numerous ships, publicly flogged, and ousted from His Majesty's Navy. He would have remembered the shipwrecks and the mutinies—and then the transformation of his heart by the power of the Gospel. As Newton considered those days gone by, he would have asked as David did, "Who am I, O Lord that you have brought me this far?" As was his habit, Newton set to work composing a hymn to illustrate his New Year's Day sermon. In that hymn, he would tell his poor congregation of low-paid artisans about the dangers and snares he had faced. He would reflect on the amazing grace that had saved a wretch like him. Those now-famous words of "Amazing Grace," first sung in the small parish of Olney on New Year's Day, 1773, lingered in obscurity for many years. Even as Newton counseled the young William Wilberforce and encouraged him to stay the course in the long battle against the slave trade, the words to "Amazing Grace" were little sung in England. But the Olney hymnal, later published by Newton, caught on in the Americas. The words of "Amazing Grace" would surface again some 80 years later in a book that would change the course of this nation, *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. In it, the slave, Tom, at his lowest point, sings the words of "Amazing Grace." Two verses hardly sung today were sung by Tom: "And when this mortal life shall fail and flesh and sense shall cease, I shall possess within the veil, a life of joy and peace." These words of the ultimate hope in God, even in the face of deep injustice, forever entwined the words of "Amazing Grace" with the plight of the slaves. But it all began in that dark little study in the waning days of a year gone by, when one man took the time to reflect on God's goodness to him. This New Year we would all do well to pay tribute to Newton by imitating his gratitude to God and his heart for the lost. We would do well also to set aside some time to reflect on what God has done in our lives how he has delivered us from slavery to sin. And we would do well to consider how we, in this new year of 2020, can sing God's praise with our lips and with our lives.

Musical Musings Anthems for December



January 5TH ~ Ephiphany Sunday

"Lullay, My Liking," by Gustav Holst (1874-1934)

The great British composer Gustav Holst, perhaps best known for his orchestral work *The Planets*, composed a great deal of choral work that remains in the canon today. His setting of the Middle English text of "Lullay, My Liking" is simple, effective, and sometimes chilling.

January 12TH ~ First Sunday After the Epiphany ~ Baptism of the Lord

"Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies," arranged by Healey Willan (1880-1968)

English-born Healey Willan is now hailed as one of Canada's greatest composers. Willan taught at the Toronto Conservatory of Music for many years. His arrangement of "Christ, Whose Glory" is a favorite in our Chancel Choir's repertoire.

January 19TH ~ Second Sunday after the Ephiphany

"Agnus Dei," from Messe Solennelle, by Charles Gounod (1818-1893)

Nowadays perhaps best known for his setting of *Ave Maria*, in which he composed a melody over an existing keyboard work by Bach, relatively few of Gounod's works are regularly performed now. Nonetheless, he wrote in nearly every idiom: opera, orchestra, chamber music, choral, and solo voice; and his influence on composers such as Gabriel Fauré and Charles Debussy cannot be underestimated. Gounod's *Messe Solennelle*, composed in 1855 for chorus, soloists, and orchestra, marked a departure from his earlier and more austere masses to a style more influenced by opera.

January 26TH ~ Third Sunday after the Epiphany

"One Thing Have I Asked of the Lord," by J. Melvin Butler (1945-)

J. Melvin Butler serves as organist/choirmaster at St. Mark's Episcopal Cathedral in Seattle, Washington. He studied at Oberlin Conservatory and Eastman School of Music. His setting of "One Thing Have I Asked of the Lord" is eclectic, containing passages varying from ethereal, quirky, dissonant, peaceful, and triumphant.

"Rise and Shine!", arranged by Rollo Dilworth (1970-)

Award-winning composer Rollo Dilworth currently serves as Director of Choral Activities and Music Education at the North Park University School of Music, and as Minister of Music at Martin Temple African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in Chicago, Illinois. Dilworth's research interests are in the areas of African-American music and music education curriculum and instruction. His arrangement of "Rise and Shine!" creatively combines two different spirituals: "Rise, Shine, for Thy Light Is A-Comin", and the well-known "This Little Light of Mine."


