Reflections on Lent

The season of Lent has not been well observed in much of evangelical Christianity, largely because it was associated with "high church" liturgical worship that some churches were eager to reject. However, much of the background of evangelical Christianity, for example the heritage of John Wesley, was very "high church." Many of the churches that had originally rejected more formal and deliberate liturgy are now recovering aspects of a larger Christian tradition as a means to refocus on spirituality in a culture that is increasingly secular. Originating in the fourth century of the church the season of Lent spans 40 weekdays beginning on Ash Wednesday and climaxing during Holy Week. Originally, Lent was the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, a time of concentrated study and prayer before their baptism at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community. Today, Lent is marked by a time of prayer and preparation to celebrate Easter. Since Sundays celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, the six Sundays that occur during Lent are not counted as part of the 40 days of Lent and are referred to as the Sundays in Lent. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for his ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling. Christians today use this period of time for introspection, self-examination, and repentance. This season of the year is equal only to the Season of Advent in importance in the Christian year, and is part of the second major grouping of Christian festivals and sacred time that includes Holy Week, Easter, and Pentecost. Lent has traditionally been marked by penitential prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Some churches today still observe a rigid schedule of fasting on certain days during Lent, especially the giving up of meat, alcohol, sweets, and other types of food. Other traditions do not place as great an emphasis on fasting, but focus on charitable deeds, especially helping those in physical need with food and clothing, or simply the giving of money to charities. Most Christian churches that observe Lent at all focus on it as a time of prayer, especially penance, repenting for failures and sin as a way to focus on the need for God's grace. It is really a preparation to celebrate God's marvelous redemption at Easter, and the resurrected life that we live, and hope for, as Christians. Ash Wednesday, the seventh Wednesday before Easter Sunday, is the first day of the Season of Lent. Its name comes from the ancient practice of placing ashes on worshippers' heads or foreheads as a sign of humility before God, a symbol of mourning and sorrow at the death that sin brings into the world. Ash Wednesday is a somber day of reflection on what needs to change in our lives if we are to be fully Christian. Perhaps during the Lenten season, we should stop praying for others as if we were virtuous enough to do so. Perhaps we should take off our righteous robes just long enough during these 40 days to put ashes on our own heads, to come before God with a new humility that is willing to confess, "*Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner.*" Maybe we should be willing to prostrate ourselves before God and plead, "*Lord, in my hand no price I bring; simply to the cross I cling.*" That might put us in a position to hear God in ways that we have not heard him in a long time. And it may be the beginning of that healing for which we have so longed.

Anthems for March



March 1ST ~ First Sunday in Lent

“Begone, Satan!” by Jan Bender (1909-1994)

Holland-born church musician Jan Bender was influential in establishing liturgical trends in Germany after World War II. His setting of “Begone, Satan!” is quite clever. Bender depicts Satan by emphasizing a dissonance which in Medieval times had been outlawed by the Church – the tritone, once known as “the Devil’s interval.” In contrast, Bender removes all such tension when he employs a tune and text by Martin Luther in earnest supplication to Jesus Christ for protection against “the devil’s wiles and cunning.”

March 8TH ~ Second Sunday in Lent

“He, Watching Over Israel,” from *Elijah*, by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

This beautiful chorus from Mendelssohn’s acclaimed oratorio *Elijah* assures us of God’s watchfulness, and his willingness to strengthen us in time of need.

March 15TH ~ Third Sunday in Lent

“God Is a Spirit,” by Alexander Kopylov (1854-1911)

A student of Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov, Alexander Kopylov was a respected symphonist and composer of songs. His chorus, “God Is a Spirit” is a moving example of his writing for the Russian Orthodox church.

March 22ND ~ Fourth Sunday in Lent

“The Lord Is My Shepherd,” by Henry Smart (1813-1879)

An example of the richness of the Court Street United Methodist choral library, this gem by English organist and composer Henry Smart is reminiscent of works by Schubert. Sadly, and although Smart was widely respected in Britain as a composer, his work is now largely forgotten.

March 29TH ~ Fifth Sunday in Lent

“Psalm 130,” by Paul Manz (1919-2009)

Best known for his choral anthem “E’en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come,” mid-west composer and organist Paul Manz was twice named one of the “Ten Most Influential Lutherans.” His setting of the psalm is compelling and beautiful.


