A Christian's View on Valentine's Day

How we can use a secular holiday to celebrate God's love

There is no right or wrong way for *Christians* to conduct themselves on Valentine's Day that is different from any other day of the year. There are, however, attitudes and actions that we should adopt in honor of the day of love. You can find the internet littered with articles and entries on the origin of Valentine's Day: who St. Valentine was, or if he inspired the holiday. Those are trivial details. As it is today, whether or not it was ever religious, Valentine's Day is a secular holiday for which Hallmark sells a lot of greeting cards, candy stores sell a lot of chocolate, and florists sell a lot of bouquets. It is not important that you support, condemn, or ignore the consumerism associated with Valentine's Day. It is important, however, that we, as Christians, consider how and why we should celebrate Valentine's Day rather than restrict our views to the romantic exploitation of the secular world.

James 1:27 says, "Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world." On Valentine's Day, if there is a void in someone's life where love should be, that emptiness is magnified by expectation. Think about your widowed grandmother or your divorced uncle. Seek out those who don't have a home or a family or those who are caught in a cycle of poor decisions. Take the time to express love to those who feel unloyable.

1 Thessalonians 5:18 says, "Be thankful in all circumstances." Valentine's Day is a reminder of how we have been loved and who has loved us. Let your parents and grandparents know that you are grateful to have them as examples of how to love your own children and spouse. Call your friends to tell them how much you appreciate the love you've shared through laughter and the things that you have done together. A faithful source of love is precious, and whether it is familial, platonic, or romantic, it has the capacity to inspire, encourage, and heal.

Song of Solomon 3:4 says, "I have found the one whom my soul loves." Celebrating Valentine's Day with your significant other is not wrong. I hope that I have not given you that impression. Romantic love is a gift from God, and he wants us to revel in the love that He shows to us by giving us another person to know and love in a holy, intimate way. Yes, Valentine's Day can be a cheesy time to celebrate your relationship. I say go ahead and cheese it up. Too often, we ignore the opportunity to share Christ's love through the simplest actions. Our faith sends us into the world to love unconditionally, but if we are not exhibiting that love, how are we going to make disciples in His name? Let Valentine's Day serve as a reminder of God's love and the command He has given us to show love to others.

Music's role in facilitating the paradox of Lent: An individual journey best achieved in community.

Excerpts from an article on <u>The Presbyterian Outlook</u> by **Anne McNair** director of music at First Presbyterian Church in Savannah, Georgia.:

As we embark on our Lenten journeys each year, we often think of those journeys as personal and private. We enter into a somewhat solitary season of reflection, prayer, fasting, reading and meditation. Indeed, the liturgical season of Lent gives us opportunities for personal reflection like no other time in the church year. The hymns that we sing have the power to strike a chord deep within that often shape our theological and spiritual approach to being a faithful child of God. So, the hymns that we choose to sing are vitally important and must be selected with care.

A new Lenten hymn, written in October 2017 by J. Barrie Shepherd, retired senior minister from First Presbyterian Church in New York City. This hymn called "Deep in the Heart of Winter" better reflects the balance between an individual Lenten journey within the context of community:

Deep in the heart of winter, when days seem cold and bleak, Our faith calls us to enter this space of seven weeks. We turn to prayer and fasting, take scripture as our guide, Prepare our souls for Easter, and joyful Eastertide.

A time of deep reflection, a time to search the heart. Yet more than introspection calls us to do our part. We turn our thoughts to others, our kin both far and near, Our families, sisters, brothers, the ones we hold most dear.

Our prayers reach further out now, and think of all whose needs Cry out for our attention, yearn for our faithful deeds. The sick, the poor, the hungry, all those who are oppressed, Those folk our Savior taught us to see as truly blessed.

So mark these days as holy, our truly Lenten time. Let every seeking soul be restored, renewed, refined. Till in our Savior's footsteps, beneath his cross we pray, Then meet him in the garden, rejoice on Easter Day.

A key phrase in that hymn (the phrase that actually made me take notice and examine my own approach to the Lenten journey) is: "A time of deep reflection, a time to search the heart. Yet more than introspection calls us to do our part." As I prepare for Lent, I want to do my part to help provide the members of my congregation with opportunities for an individual journey within the context of community. It is my prayer that their collective journeys will enable them to contribute their individual gifts to a common effort to make a difference in the broad community of God's people. Singing hymns during Lent is an important way to provide opportunities for members of our congregations to engage fully as the worshipping body and to inspire them to the work of the church. In collaboration, pastors and musicians are in a unique position to guide their congregants' Lenten journeys by selecting excellent hymns for them to sing.

There are many time-tested hymns appropriate for Lent in "Glory to God." Some of Court Street's favorites that were sung for our Lenten services are:

Lord, Who Throughout These Forty Days ~ No.269 Take My Life and Let It Be Consecrated ~ No. 399 Love Divine, All Loves Excelling ~ No. 384 Take Up Thy Cross ~ No. 415 O Master, Let Me Walk with Thee ~ No. 430 Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing ~ No. 400 For the Beauty of the Earth ~ No. 92 My Jesus, I Love Thee ~ No. 172

During our individual and corporate journeys as God's faithful people, may we be inspired by the hymns that we sing during Lent, listening for God's voice in the music that surrounds us. May we sing with gratitude for individual insights received during our Lenten journey, as well as for the opportunity to worship in community. May we carry God's light into the world around us, ever widening that community of love and faith.


