Charge is a Necessary Part of Life

Change is very much a part of our everyday lives. Just look through some old picture albums, and change becomes a reality. Change is all around us. Children grow from infants into adults. The seasons change as the earth rotates around the sun. Gray hair and wrinkles emerge almost weekly. The clothes we wore ten years ago are outdated because new styles have emerged. The clothes we wore a year ago just don't fit how they used to. We lose jobs, relationships end, and, yes, churches transition.

The change in our biological bodies cannot be stopped (perhaps delayed) but not stopped. I have also discovered that the older I get, the less I like to change. I would venture to suggest that the same is often true for each of us. We don't like change. We like things to be familiar and predictable. We like to know what to expect when we wake up each morning. But the reality is that life is constantly changing. Change is inevitable. Change can leave us feeling lost and abandoned like we've been tossed overboard in the midst of a storm. We're tempted to run from change as though we can escape it.

As we all encounter major changes in our individual lives, and as the world around us continues to change, we need a place to find security and hope. The truth is, there is one thing that never changes, the one thing that stays the same, and that is our unchanging God. The Bible tells us in *Malachi 3:6* that God never changes. "For I the LORD do not change; therefore you, O children of Jacob, are not consumed." There is no transition, inconsistency, or change in our God. The same God who created the earth and placed it into space is the same one who met Abraham and Isaac on Mt Moriah. The same God who forgave David for his adulterous affair is the one who allowed His Son to be crucified in order to change the plight of humanity —"For the wages of Sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Romans 6: 23.

God does not change, and neither does His Word. All that he has said about himself remains true forever. Everything he has told us about why and how the world came to be, about what's wrong with the world, and about what he has done to save the world will never change. And because His word never changes, His promises for us remain true. (*Cont. on Page 2*)

This is what Paul was pointing out in Romans 8: 38-39: "For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." The unchanging nature of God and His unchangeable word are real things on which we can stake our lives. It is a rock big enough and strong enough for us to build a house on it and an anchor big enough and strong enough to hold our souls in the midst of life's changing waves and storms.

Because of these truths, when everything in life seems flipped upside down, we can say with the psalmist, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear though the earth gives way, though the mountains be moved into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam, though the mountains tremble at its swelling" (Psalm 46:1–3). Change has not avoided God's Church. Change must come, or death will be the result. Adjustments will need to be made. Some long-standing traditions might need to be critically evaluated to assess their effectiveness. Alterations and adjustments must be made to adapt to the changes around us. However, the gospel of Christ must never change. The tools used to present the gospel may change, but never the gospel because the gospel is always truth. No matter what changes we face, we need not get angry. We need not get upset. We need not become fearful. We need not despair. Our rock and anchor remains in our unchanging God, whose character and promises will remain fixed forever. Change is on the horizon. It will be challenging and at times, a struggle. Yet we must be steadfast in the fact that our unchanging God calls for change in order that His will may be done on earth as it is in heaven. I will be looking for you on Sunday morning.

Coming this Autumn

God Provides

This autumn, our Bible lessons follow the theme "God Provides" and remind us of the ways God meets our needs and God's call to us to help those who lack life's essentials of food, water, and shelter.

Food

Scripture recognizes that hunger, famine, and food insecurity make people vulnerable to a variety of threats. It also testifies to God's generous provision of food for humans and wild creatures and to human responsibility to help those who are hungry and in need. From God's provision of manna in the wilderness to divine provision during famine, from Jesus' feeding of thousands to teaching of a new way of being with the poor and marginalized through table fellowship. Scripture bears witness to God's graciousness and our responsibility as its recipients.

Water

Like food insecurity, water insecurity threatens human life and the earth's species of plants and animals. Scripture uses the water motif in many ways. Water is dangerous as it represents a metaphor for chaos, historical enemies, God's judgment, devastation of drought-stricken land, and personal distress. Water is also a gift from God for the flourishing of all creation, refreshment for the body and soul, and a source of eternal life embodied in Jesus. Thirst for water and provision of water are metaphors for the human relationship with God.

Shelter

In major cities and small towns across the country, many people have experienced homelessness. One of the significant causes of homelessness is rooted in childhood trauma. Mental illness, sometimes stemming from such trauma, is another contributing factor, among others. Exploring the theme of shelter in Scripture cannot find ancient analogies for what today is becoming a crisis compounded by economic and social vulnerabilities. Even so, we can imagine and extrapolate, based on related themes and texts, that the physical security of home is a relevant theological construct then as now. Although various texts may make it easy to rush to focus on spiritual shelter in God's presence, those who experience such a home in God find resources to extend hospitality and care through various means with those who are experiencing homelessness today.


