TSDC was formed to unite special districts across Texas, advocate federally and statewide, and share resource development

Bills That Failed to Pass



While these bills did not pass, Roach & Associates actively tracked, analyzed, and monitored each one throughout the session. We engaged with legislative offices, followed hearings, and kept clients informed in real time—ensuring districts stayed ahead, even on bills that didn't become law.

Several bills that failed to pass would have imposed burdensome or restrictive mandates on municipal utility districts / water districts, and other special districts / related entities. Their failure is viewed as beneficial for local governance and operational flexibility:

HB 447: Traffic study delays for MUD bonds

HB 571: Lobbying restrictions

SB 1965: Limits to annexation

HB 638: Mandatory video recording

HB 391 & 2561: In-district meeting mandates

HB 336 & 1862: Law enforcement contract authority

HB 19, HB 3378, SB 1209, SB 533: Election date limitations

HB 1335: Infrastructure liability rules "call before you dig"

HB 1585, SB 1454, SB 2260: Restrictive housing finance reforms


Historic Funding Advances:

HJR 7: Allocates up to \$1 Billion annually for Texas Water Fund (Vote Nov. 2025)

SB 7: Ensures funding for New Water Supply initiatives

SB 1532: TWDB project transparency

HB 500: \$2.5B in infrastructure appropriations



Key Bills That Passed Continued...

District and Water Governance:

- HB 29: Water loss audit mandates
- SB 1583, SB 1662: Groundwater oversight & testing notices
- SB 612, SB 1253*, SB 790, HB 1318: Developer fee limits, service certification, billing rights

Boundary Control & Services:

HB 2512, SB 1844, SB 2965: Easier disannexation & service protections

Disaster Recovery:

• HB 3010: Rural infrastructure recovery grants

Election Clarity:

- <u>SB 1025</u>: 'THIS IS A TAX INCREASE' required in ballot language


